Hundreds of Americans—Tex ans included-are poisoned or die every year from the odorless, tasteless and colorless killer, says the Texas State Department of Health. As in most cases, these deaths are preventable.

Just last week four persons died in Canada of carbon monoxide poisoning when the exhaust of an automobile was piped under a house in an effort to kill skunks. > Carbon monoxide poisoning can occur anytime, but it generally is thought of as a cold weather threat since homes, automobiles and business establishments are 'buttoned up" against the cold. Texans begin using more fuel to heat their homes, offices and cars when fall arrives.

Every time a person burns gasoline, kerosene, wood, natural or manufactured gas, coal, coke or oil-anywhere-in a heater, car, appliance, bonfire or grill, he has started a potential carbon monoxide factory. Hibachi grills, used with charcoal, are dangerous in closed-up areas. A car engine, running in an average sized garage approximately five minutes, can produce a lethal concentration of carbon monoxide

The poison slowly gets into a person's bloodstream, rendering him weak and groggy and finally results in death unless the exposd person is moved to fresh air before it is too late. Hospitalization often is necessary for victims lucky enough to live.

How can you avoid poisoning? Check automobiles regularly for leaks in exhaust pipes, mufflers and their connections.

Have your heating checked thoroughly.

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



What is quantum theory?

Waves on a pond are mo-tions of the water. Sound waves are motions of the air through which they travel. A hundred years ago scientists believed that light waves, too, must be the motion of "something." They called that something ether. They believed it existed because waves, they said, must have something in which to travel. Today scientists have tried to understand the nature of radiation itself. One generally accepted theory is called quantum theory



Scientists believe that radiation is emitted in the form of tiny quantities, or quanta, of energy. ("Quanta" is the plural of "quantum.") Quanta travel in the form of packets, or bundles, of waves. Thus, the tiny quantities of energy are believed to be wave packets. Quantum theory has been very successful in leading scientists to a fuller understanding of the nature of

radiation and of the many ways in which radiation can be used by mankind.

What is a "Lucy Stoner"?

Lucy Stone was 28 years old when she graduated from Oberlin College, Ohio, in 1847. Because her father did not approve of college education for women, Lucy had to teach school for 9 years in order to lege. She decided to devote her life to correcting what she considered to be the many injustices in society and the law. Soon she became an eloquent speaker against slavery and for civil rights. For years she wore bloomers instead of dresses to protest against the awkward and uncomfortable women's fashions of the

When Lucy Stone married, she continued to use her own name as part of her protest against the laws that made a wife legally inferior to her husband. Ever since, a married woman who keeps her maiden name has been known as a "Lucy Stoner."

What is a tsunami?

Sometimes you hear people speak of tidal waves. A much better name for them is "tsunamis" (from the Japanese words for "harbor" and caused by tides. Tsunamis are caused by earthquakes under the oceans. The earthquakes create waves that travel across the sea at speeds up to 500 miles an hour. When they reach land, they may pile up into walls of water as high as 60 feet. They can do very great damage.

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
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
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
