I was riding with an agricultural agent, and he said: "That is the only profitable way to grow cotton. A few hundred rows of cotton and a row of oil wells."

The scars of old wagon roads still remain across the ridges in the Foothill Country, and it is possible to find sunken places in the earth that were once dugouts. These were once homes of pioneers where families lived and dreamed and hoped for no greater luxury than survival.

The measurement of time is not relevant to life except as applied to the timing of machines and events in a modern world. Billions still measure it with no greater concern than light and darkness and the passing of the seasons. Daylight Saving Time is the theory of a cult which is attempting to squeeze more hours out of the pulp of a day.

The world has too many odors and science adds new ones with alarming regularity. Some are changeless, however, and laden with long ago memories. This must include the fragrance of lilacs blooming in the sanctuary of a dew-drenched dawn.

Don't despair of prayers being answered until you are firmly convinced in your heart that they will be.

This congested country must look again at the railroads equipped with modern technology. They once created a miracle in transportation and they continue today to serve millions and support a mighty segment of the nation's economy but their potentials have not been exploited. The railroads own the priceless possession of right of ways between strategic points. They are rich fields which have not been properly cultivated or have lain fallow too long.

HALF-WAY to eternity, the three man crew of stricken Apollo 13 splashed down in the Pacific Friday and are safely at home.

The three astronauts James Lovell, Fred Haise and John Swigert, were 205,000 miles in space Monday when a mysterious explosion on the moonship knocked out the electrical power and part of the oxygen supply in the Odyssey command ship.

The free world was apprehensive that the three men might never be able to return to earth. The successful return was made possible by the great engineering talents of Houston Space Center and the expert training of the astronauts.

Had the explosion occurred later, the return to earth would have been impossible. The three men splashed down in the Pacific on target, much to the relief of an anxious world and in answer to the prayers of millions.

## Hospital Memorial Rooms Rate Listed

Several inquiries have been received regarding the furnishing of a room in the Motley General Hospital, as a memorial to an individual or organization.

A cost of such a memorial has been established, according to Fred Wallace, administrator. It will be \$1,066, with a suitable plaque being furnished by the hospital.

Memorial rooms will be furnished in Danish furniture and will include an electric bed, desk

chest with mirror, lounging chair, bedside table and overbed table. Mr. Wallace said plans are still being made to try to open the hospital by the first of May, but that a number of obstacles still remain to be overcome, to keep the date.

He said it is probable that the hospital may open the X-ray use, and laboratory facilities for outpatients, before the hospital is open to the public, in event of unforeseen delays.

## Death, Destruction In Wake of Storms

Shores near Clarendon where 10 or more lives were lost and many remain on the critical list. An entire trailer camp was demolished.

The twisters, one reporter said "too many to count," struck eleven towns, followed two definite paths from the New Mexico line to the north east over a 200 mile stretch. Towns hit were Whiteface, Whitharral, Cotton Center, Plainview, Lazbuddie, Claytonville, Silvertown, Hedley, Clarendon, Pampa and Kress.

The string of howling twisters were the worst in the area since a tornado struck Silvertown, May 15, 1957, killing 21 persons and injuring 80.

The massive storm cell was just a part of a turbulent weather pattern that struck Texas Friday. Winds clocked officially at 100 miles an hour hit Dimmitt before the tornado system formed.

Light rain fell here most of the day. On much of the Plains area fog and showers prevailed before the storms struck.

## Dinah Tilson in Whiteface Storm

Mrs. Stella Tilson of Matador received word Sunday morning that her granddaughter, Miss Dinah Gene Tilson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom G. Tilson of Dallas, was in the tornado at Whiteface, where she teaches.

Miss Tilson was in the school auditorium, directing the senior play, when the tornado struck. The auditorium was severely damaged, with broken glass flying everywhere. The house where Miss Tilson lived was destroyed except the room she occupied. Her car and another car at the house were destroyed.

Miss Tilson herself, escaped injury.

## TIME CHANGE HERE SUNDAY

Like it or not DST will be with you Sunday. If you don't set your watch and clocks ahead an hour at 2 a.m. Sunday you will be late for church, and you may miss a television program later in the day.

It will be legal, however, if you want to move your timepieces ahead before you retire Saturday evening, so as to be in step with Daylight Saving Time, Texas, like most of the states in the union will observe the change.

Rural areas in general do not agree with the time change, but have no voice in the decision. Two Matador grocery firms, Spot Cash Grocery and Billy's Grocery, have announced that after the time change, they will open at 8:30 and close at 6:30 p.m. daily, except Saturdays, when the stores will close at 7:30.

### County has Five March Accidents

(Special to Tribune)

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Motley County during the month of March, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area. The summary was released by Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Lubbock.

These crashes resulted in two persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$10,600.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1970 shows a total of 16 accidents resulting in four persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$20,320.00.

The final entry in the 1969 Texas traffic records has been entered and closed. An all-time record of 3,551 persons killed, an estimated 223,000 suffered injuries, and an estimated property loss of \$955 million was sustained.

Since the death count of 2,254 in 1960, Texas has gained steadily each year. The Sergeant stated, "If the number of deaths continue to increase as they have since 1960 by 1978 they will have increased 100 per cent."

### Mesquite Control Chemical Studied

The chemical used for mesquite control, 2-4-5-T, has been under Congressional restrictions and review recently, according to Ervin Willard, District Conservationist with the local Soil Conservation Service office.

A Congressional hearing is scheduled for April in Washington, to review the use of the chemical. Willard said it is expected that the chemical will be allowed on all land not directly being used as a food crop. This would allow the continuation of the annual spraying program of Motley County farmers and ranchers, which is vital to the control of the mesquite tree.

Motley County farmers and ranchers should continue their plans for aerial spraying this spring, according to Willard.

### EDITORIAL

#### "Heatly Probe Produces Mouse"

IT WAS Plutarch who originally spoke about a mountain laboring and bringing forth a mouse.

Over the past three months in Texas, Federal grand juries in San Antonio and Lubbock mountainously labored and didn't even come up with one rodent—a task thrust upon them in what generally is believed to be a political side skirmish.

Reference is to an investigation into charges that friends of veteran State Rep. W. S. Heatly violated a spate of "civil rights" laws, in which, by the way, there was no racial angle. The probe was based on reports that some residents of the legislative district didn't cotton to ambitions of Heatly's opponents to unseat the longtime chairman of the House Appropriations committee and said so. Long drawn-out—and expensive, to the taxpayers—sessions of grand juries in both the Alamo City and here failed to substantiate cries of illegality.

Political buffs over Texas were fascinated by the unprecedented spectacle of the Federal govern-

ment poking its nose into a purely State matter and into a party primary, to boot. So they voiced suspicions that the investigation was politically inspired. Noting that it all began under the tutelage of a Republican Federal District Attorney, Seagal Wheatley, in San Antonio, comment ran that the probe was promoted by State GOP leaders to discredit a prominent State Democratic official in a crucial election year. Later, the word was spread that the whole thing originated in Washington, where a former State Democratic office-holder who switched to the Republican party, assistant Attorney General Will Wilson, of Dallas—heads up such matters.

Whether either of the stories is true, in whole or in part, nobody knows. The fact remains, however, that the San Antonio grand jury did not come up with anything after its long, drawn-out probe and that the ball then was tossed to a new grand jury here. After several days of sessioning on the subject, interrupted by recesses, the result was the same in Lubbock as it was in San Antonio. Nobody found reason for indictment of anybody supposedly "violating the civil rights" of Heatly's opponents, Leon Williams, a Quahok Democrat, and Zack Fisher, a Memphis Republican.

Regardless of the origin of the double-jointed investigation, a good many Texans were surprised that the Federal camel attempted to crawl under a tent in purely a State matter. Further, it was difficult to understand why the whole business began in San Antonio—scarcely a citadel of political purity—when Federal grand juries meet regularly in points much closer to Heatly's nine-county 80th District, specifically Lubbock, Amarillo and Wichita Falls. It didn't smell like roses from the very beginning.

Representative Heatly's post as Appropriations chairman of the House is one of great power. It also is one in which its holder can and often does make powerful enemies of individuals and groups to whose efforts to grab off State monies he has to say "no." Thus the moves against him invited even more than the usual amount of suspicion.

How all the legal huffing and puffing will affect this year's election in the 80th District will not be fully known until the votes are counted. However, District 80, stretching Northeast of Lubbock 'way over to Vernon, is in the main populated by people not normally enthusiastic over outside interference in their affairs. Heatly, unopposed for the past six years, has been successful in holding his post without serious threat since 1965 and currently is seeking a ninth term. He has held the important and much sought-after Appropriations chairmanship longer than any other legislator in modern Texas history.

Of more import than the personal ambitions of the individuals involved is the fact that the Federal Government bullfrogged into the matter. While all it managed to accomplish was a waste of time and money, the Government's action at the very least indicates that proponents of more and more Federal authority will continue to attempt added domi-

nation in purely local affairs. Since State government in Texas is fully able to look after its own business in this area, we think gratuitous Federal intervention has nothing to recommend it.

### COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

The use of manure can result in alkaline reaction of the soil and increase possibility of diseases such as Irish Potato Scab and Scurf of Sweet Potatoes. Commercial fertilizers do not in themselves prevent disease, but a health plant is less susceptible to attack.

When watering, the garden soil should be watered regularly to a depth of 3 to 4 inches. Plants should not be watered late in the evening as this will allow foliage to remain wet for long periods of time and allow diseases to develop. Early morning waterings result in quicker drying and less chance of disease. Sprinkling the foliage should also be avoided.

Vegetables should be grown only once in the same location every 3 to 5 years. Vegetables in the same family such as carrots, sweet potatoes and beets should not follow each other because they share many common diseases.

Only seed which has been properly stored should be used. Poor quality seed will result in poor stands and seeds should not be stored from season to season because of the threat of disease transmittal. Seeds can be treated with fungicides to reduce the amount of seedling disease in vegetables, and be sure to wash hands thoroughly after using the

fungicide to avoid possible health hazards. Fungicides must cover the entire leaf in order to be effective.

The material can be applied either as a spray or dust. Dusts have been observed to give better coverage of the lower leaves, but the spray provides better overall coverage. Dusts should not be applied on windy days or when the foliage is wet.

Finally, pay attention to the variety. Many varieties do well in other areas, but won't perform satisfactorily here. Publications are available on these subjects.

Have you noticed some food cans are white on the inside? Researchers have found that some kinds of foods, especially those that are highly colored in the natural state, will keep their attractive appearance better if they are canned in enamel-lined cans. This enamel lining has no other effect on the food, reports Jimmie Kay Ulom, Extension foods specialist.
