The Motley County Democratic Convention was held at 6:00 p.m. April 21, 2012, at Hotel Matador. Lanhon Odom, candidate for Texas House of Representatives, District 68, accompanied by his wife Angie, spoke to a group of 10 citizens following hors d'oeuvres, coffee and tea.


Odom spoke to the group on the issues of education, water, and healthcare. "We should live up to the commitment Texas made to fund classroom education and protect the Texas Re-

tirement Fund," he said. "The teacher profession should be the highest paid job in the state."

Odom called water management one of the most important issues facing the state of Texas. "The I-35 corridor east thinks the drought is over," he said, adding, "The big urban areas have to be part of the solution."

There were drastic cuts to the state budget in 2011 in healthcare, especially for rural healthcare providers, he said. "The state has dropped their contribution to healthcare across the board, and more cuts are promised in the 2013 session," he said. "It's time to stop playing politics and seriously address our State's pressing issues."

to serve as Temporary Secretary of the convention. Elaine Hart agreed to serve as Temporary Secretary.

The Chair announced the sign-in requirement which contains an oath that officially affiliates the voter with the Democratic Party. Roll call showed that five voting precincts were represented. Voting Precincts 1, 5, and 6 (Matador) had seven citizens attending, consisting of Joan Patton, Lucretia Campbell, Elaine Hart, Winifred Darsey, Jessie T. Sims; Lewis Fair, and Carol Campbell. Voting precinct 2 (Flomot) had two partici-

pants, E. G. and Barbara Reed; and voting Precinct 4 (Roaring Springs) had one representative present, J. N. Fletcher. There were no representatives of voting Precinct 3 (Northfield) in attendance.

In the next order of business, a call was made for a motion to nominate a Permanent Chair and Secretary of the convention. Carol Campbell and Elaine Hart were selected by unanimous vote.

A call was made to select a delegate to the Democratic State Convention to be held in continued on page 2



The Chair then opened the convention up to discuss resolutions to be submitted to the Democrat State Convention. A Resolution is a document used to help facilitate the business of the Democratic Party, thereby supporting a Party Platform.

Following discussion, the following resolutions were adopted by unanimous vote:

Whereas, the Texas public education system is at risk due to lack of statewide obligations to fund commitments already in place;

Be it resolved that the state of Texas be required to fully fund public education as well as protect the Teacher Retirement Fund, thereby fulfilling its moral and constitutional obligation to students and teachers.

Whereas, any solution to the current and future water shortages must include open

Be it resolved that all groundwater conservation districts post minutes of their meetings in local newspapers of each county affected by the said conservation district.

Whereas, last year's legislative cuts to healthcare funding were a "knock-out punch" for some rural healthcare providers,

Be it resolved that the state of Texas be required to re-establish the list of qualified providers that were excluded in the 82nd Legislative Session, including funding for Planned Parenthood which provides healthcare and programs for poor women and children in the State of Texas.

The General Primary Election is set for May 29, 2012. Two Democratic candidates are on the ballot for re-election, Elaine Hart as Tax Assessor-Collector; and Chris Spence as Motley County Sheriff.

support of certain public policies. Tom Edwards submitted the following resolution in the form of a motion:

Voting Precinct 2 will vote at the Community Center in Flomot; and Voting Precinct 3 will vote at the Church of Christ in Northfield.

There are two locally concan ballot in the General Primary Election. Incumbent County Commissioner Franklin Jameson, representing Precinct 3, is being challenged by Mike Hackler. Incumbent Commissioner Roy Gene Stephens is being challenged by former county judge Ed. D. Smith. In addition, Devin Ballard has filed for County Sheriff on the Republican ticket against incumbent Democratic candidate, Sheriff Chris Spence. Tom Edwards is on the ballot seeking a 4-year term for County Attorney.

Our Library has received a wonderful selection of vintage book reviews. Melodye Shore of the Dallas area put out an announcement a few weeks ago to the state library association that she would like to donate this prized family collection to a library. The association, in turn, sent out an email to libraries all over Texas telling of Ms. Shore's wishes. The email instructed those libraries with an interest to write Ms. Shore. I thought it may be too late, that some big library somewhere had probably already secured the donation, but decided to go ahead and write to Ms. Shore saying that our Library would like to have a collection such as this to add to our genealogy department. Well, in just a few hours, Ms. Shore telephoned me saying that I had the winning email! She stated that as she read my email she knew right away that our little library was the right place for her collection.

The clippings arrived and will be carefully placed into plastic. sleeves and cataloged for our patrons to read. The reviews were written by Sarah Chokla, a longtime columnist for the Dallas News. Some date back to 1929. In one such column, dated Nov. 17, 1929, Ms. Chokla says, "The biography of Mr. Punch - our old friend of Punch and Judy fame - hits the middle road fairly between the glorifiers and the debunkers. Octave Feuillet, though plainly an admirer of her subject, is nevertheless an

impartial recorder. She does not delete those passages in which Mr. Punch appears to disadvantage – she does not conceal even the unkind rumors of some who say that at the commissioner's supper Mr. Punch became drunk."

Another column dated, March 23, 1930 reads, "In a decorated blue folio which any child would cherish, appear the "Hums of Pooh," those little songs which Winnie the Pooh bear has hummed in Mr. A.A. Milne's books about him. "The Hums of Pooh" is the sixth of Milne song books in which youngsters and their mothers and fathers and kindergarten teachers rejoice If Mr. Milne is kind, he will let Pooh make up some more songs - new songs that have not been printed before."

There are many other columns written by Ms. Chokla about books from long ago. As soon as this project is complete I will announce it here. We thank Ms. Shore for sharing this collection with the Motley County Library!

I would also like to announce that we now have two new Dell Laptop computers! We were able to purchase the new computers with a grant from the Tocker Foundation. One of the **Rabies Vaccination Clinic** Rabies is still a major concern for animal owners in our area. There have already been several confirmed cases of rabies in our area this year. After 6pm, Dr. Fuston will administer coggins tests on horses if you need it. If you have a horse that needs current coggins testing, please call the Extension office before April 27 to make arrangements for testing.

The Motley 4-H Club will also be spraying pets for ticks and fleas if needed. This will be a free service, but donations will be welcome.

Make plans to bring your animal to the Matador Volunteer Fire Department between 3 and 6pm for their annual rabies vaccination and flea and tick dip.

#### Drought Tolerance in Wheat

AMARILLO – Maybe it's in the shoot, maybe the root. Texas AgriLife Research scientists are on a quest to find where different wheat varieties popular in the High Plains get their drought traits collected in the last few years show these three cultivars have different responses to water stress; however, the basis of their adaptation remains unknown, he said.

Determining the mechanisms of adaptation to drought conditions is very important, Liu said, because in 2011 alone, drought stress resulted in the loss of more than 240 million bushels of winter wheat with a cost of about \$1.33 billion in the Southern Great Plains.

"We conducted this experiment in the greenhouse to understand how these three varieties respond to water differently and at different stages," he said. "Currently, we are at the harvesting stage. We have already collected samples from different growth stages for laboratory analysis and now we will collect samples to estimate grain yield and shoot and root biomass on each of these three varieties. In the lab, we will do gene-expression studies to understand what kind of gene is behind each of these varieties controlling their different drought-tolerance mechanisms."

Dr. Srirama Krishna Reddy, AgriLife Research post-doctorate research associate in Amarillo, said, "We want to understand what mechanisms exist in the plant – whether in the root system or the shoot system. Several physiological and molecular tools will be used to discover the mechanisms behind the drought



DCP signup underway – Producers have until June 1, 2012 to file for the 2012 DCP contract. Please make an appointment with the office.

Dr. Shuyu Liu, AgriLife Research small grains geneticist in Amarillo, is working with a group of scientists on an Ogallala Aquifer Program-funded project to identify key genetic regulators of drought tolerance.

"We are trying to understand the drought-tolerant mechanisms in wheat varieties," Liu said. "In this study, we are looking at three widely planted varieties in the High Plains, TAM 111, TAM 112 and TAM 304.

"Based on breeders' observation, they found that TAM 111 is very good at both irrigated and dryland," he said. "TAM 112 is much better under prolonged dryland conditions, such as 2011. TAM 304 is very good under irrigated conditions, but not under dryland."

### MCISD Board Takes Action on Improvements of School Facilities

At the April 10th MCISD Board meeting, members took action on several items concerning improvements and remodeling of the school facilities and buildings.

The board voted to begin accepting bids on new flooring for the school hallways, cafeteria, elementary and secondary bathrooms, Vo-Ag classroom, gymnasium hallway and locker rooms, three elementary classrooms, and possibly the administration offices.

The board also voted to purchase lockers for the basketball dressing rooms, resurface two of the tennis courts, and buy a water reel to water the football field and practice field.

The board has been discussing the improvements since the February board meeting and had a representative from a flooring company give a presentation at the April meeting, Superintendent William Cochran said. "The new flooring will greatly improve the appearance and learning atmosphere inside the building."


The lockers will be a welcome addition for the junior high and high school students, Cochran said. "This will give our students a place to secure their workout and street clothing during and after workouts."

The resurfacing of the tennis courts will give students and community members alike a chance to participate in a lifetime sport on regulation courts, Cochran said. "The court on the east side will still be available for basketball."

The water reel will be a more economical and efficient way to water the football field and practice field, Cochran said, adding, "At this time the school is using outdated irrigation pipes to water the fields." "I believe our school board has done an excellent job at looking at the needs and improvements of our school facilities," Cochran said. "Motley County ISD has a very healthy fund balance and the money to pay for the improvements will come out of this fund. I believe MCISD has a bright future and these improvements will only enhance that future."


Ancient Israel had placed God in to a minor position and lived their lives before Him attending to a few rituals but
