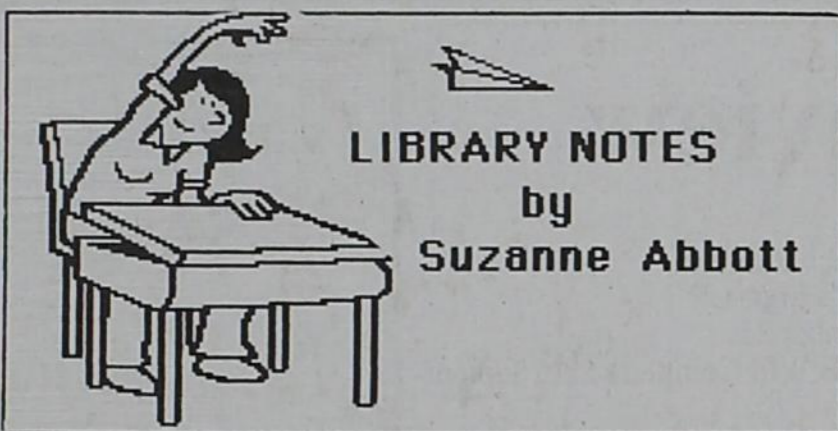
Couple To Celebrate 50th Anniversary

Home Economically Speaking

WHAT IS THIS ABOUT ENDOTHELIUM AND HEART DISEASE?

The importance of having a healthy coronary endothelium was emphasized in two leading articles in *The New England Journal of Medicine*.

According to Dorland's Medical Dictionary (1981), the endothelium is the layer of epithelial cells (joined by small amounts of cementing substances) that line the cavities of the heart, blood and lymph vessels, and serious cavities of the body.

Persons with coronary artery disease have blockages in one or more arteries. A narrow opening in the artery is easily shut down with a buildup of cholesterol in the blood vessel. This can result in a loss of blood flow to the heart. Nutrition of the heart depends on having enough blood flow to it. A stenosis is what happens when the blood flow through the vessel is blocked. A smooth muscle stenosis (blockage) occurs when blood flow cannot get through the blood vessel. Ischemia is a shut-off of the blood supply to the local area and prevents tissue healing.

Now new research findings are telling us that LDL cholesterol is not just our only problem, but that "oxidized cholesterol" is a problem.

When the LDL cholesterol is oxidized, it will attach itself to the inner wall of an artery where it contacts the endothelium which is the inner-most layer of the three layers in a blood vessel. In time, more cholesterol builds up in the endothelium, until it eventually blocks the blood vessel. The cholesterol block (or plaque) interferes with the blood flow directly and indirectly may inhibit factors that would normally be responsible for making the blood vessels relax so blood can pass through them. When the layer of smooth muscle in the blood vessel contracts or if a physical blockage such as a blood clot closes the vessel, blood flow through the artery will be diminished. Blood can pass through the vessel only when the smooth muscle relaxes and if there is no large blood clot present. The relaxation of the smooth muscle has to be opposite of when the muscle contracts and doesn't allow blood to pass through. One effect of oxidized LDL cholesterol is to interfere with the smooth muscles ability to relax.

According to the articles in the *New England Journal of Medicine*, atherosclerosis may be brought on or caused by the (bad) LDL cholesterol becoming oxidized or having hydrogens removed.

removing a pair of hydrogens from the molecule (oxidation) is thought to be one of the steps that leads to the beginning of atherosclerosis. The oxidized LDL cholesterol damages the "endothelium-mediated relaxation in isolated arterial segments." A damaged endothelium contributes to vasospasm and myocardial ischemia (heart restriction that shuts off the blood flow) in persons with coronary artery disease. Researchers found that cholesterol lowering therapy (lovastatin) improved the endothelium-mediated responses in coronary arteries of patients with atherosclerosis. This could possibly relieve the ischemic symptoms (ischemia is a shut-off of the blood supply to a local area and prevents tissue healing.) Reducing the amount of oxidized LDL cholesterol helped prevent formation of more of the atherosclerotic plaque which could possibly prevent the need for costly surgical procedures for many people.

Abnormalities of blood lipid levels often have "endothelial vasodilator dysfunction which may contribute to ischemic cardiac events." Having a healthy endothelium is important in keeping good blood vessels and arteries or "vascular integrity."

Researchers found that lowering the high serum cholesterol level with diet (the American Heart Association's Step 1 Diet) and/or medication (lovastatin and cholestyramine or lovastatin and probucol (antioxidant therapy) can restore endothelium function. The cholesterol-lowering therapy may be part of the reason for the national reduction in the number of adverse coronary events, but it is important to first try to lower your cholesterol by having a healthy weight, following the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food Guide Pyramid in making food choices, and having enough of the right kinds of exercise daily.

Again, the "bottom line" of these reports is that we still need to know "our numbers," lower serum LDL cholesterol if it is high, work to get the HDL cholesterol up higher if it is low, eat according to the food guide pyramid, and exercise regularly. The exercise can be just taking walks on a regular basis, walking up and down stairs, and other routine activities, but try to include at least 30 minutes of total exercise over a day's time every day. The American Dietetic Association advises health people to eat right and make tracks (walk regularly).

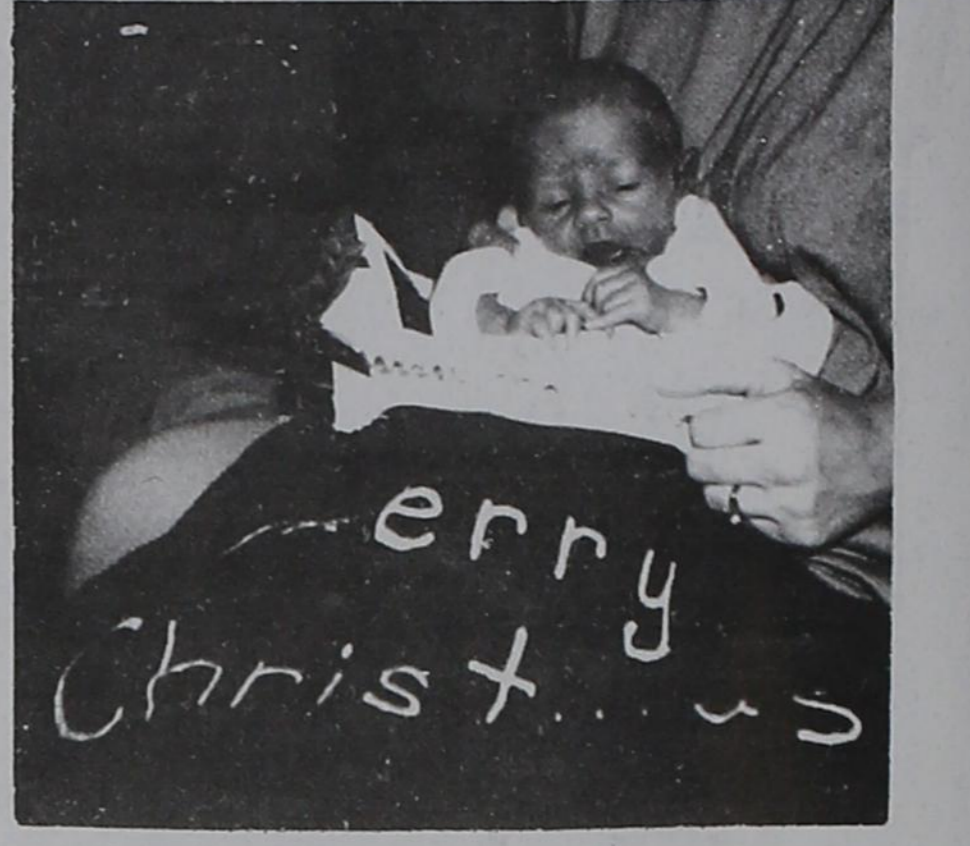

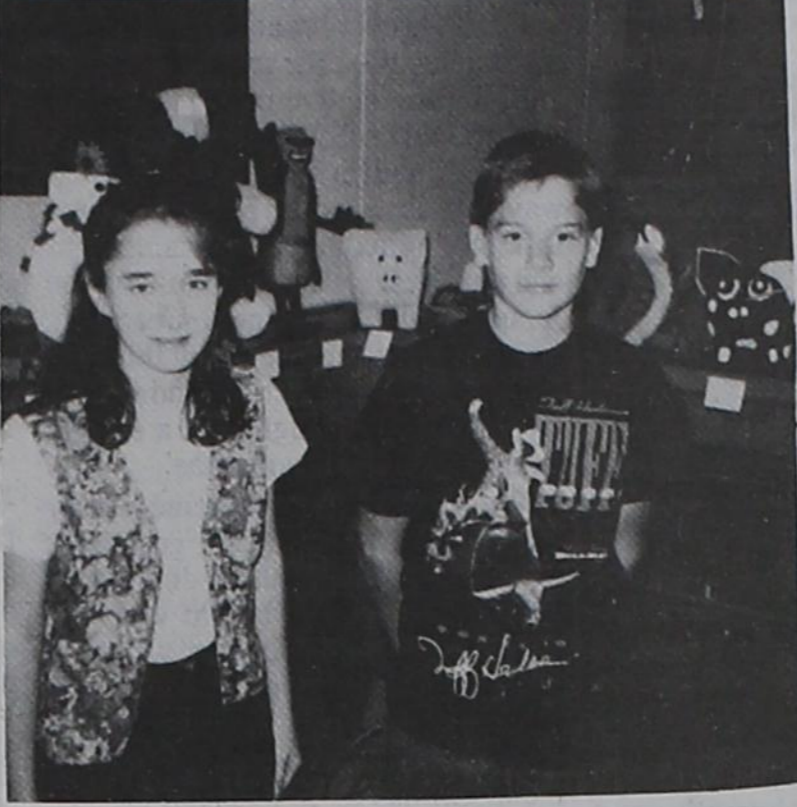

 After graduation Robert plans on attending college at Texas Tech University and become a Veterinarian.

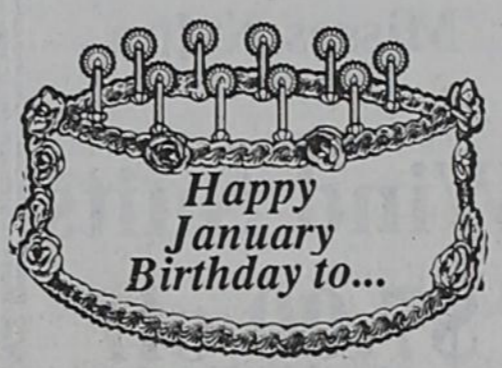
College English Course To Be Offered At Motley County ISD

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Sarpalius Says He Will Not Seek Election

Former Congressman Bill Sarpalius announced that he would not seek election to the 13th Congressional District. Sarpalius cited pending business opportunities as reasons not to pursue his former congressional seat.
