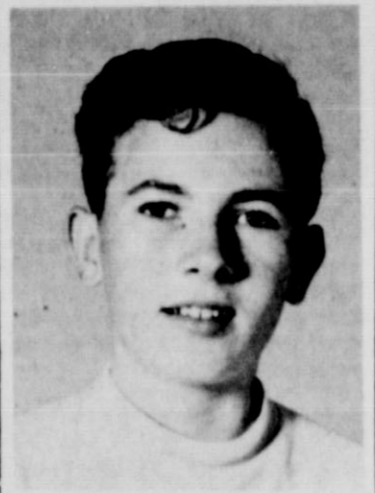

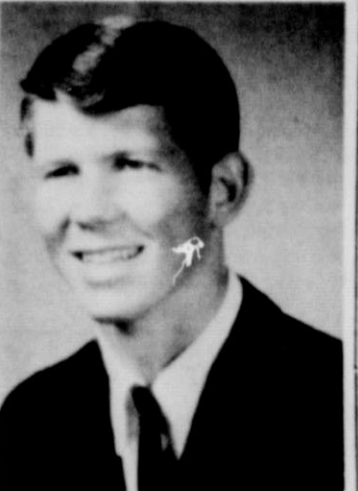
**STANLEY MARTIN**

Following graduation, Stanley plans to attend South Plains College at Levelland.



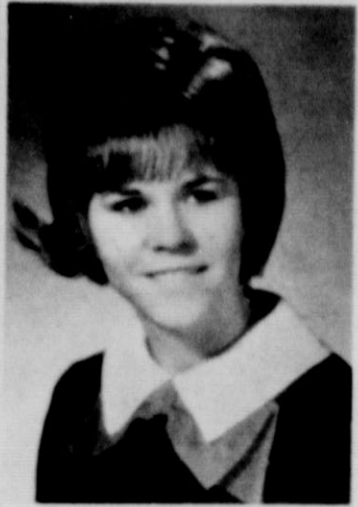
**GLEN MOSS**

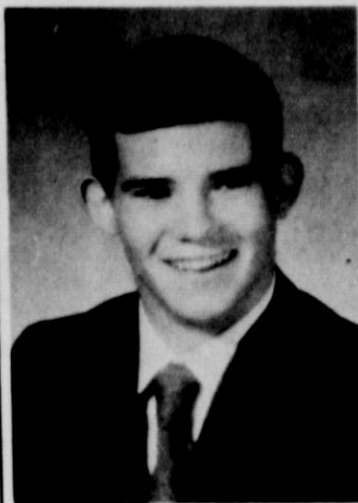

Mary's plans for the future include attending South Plains College and majoring in Business Administration.

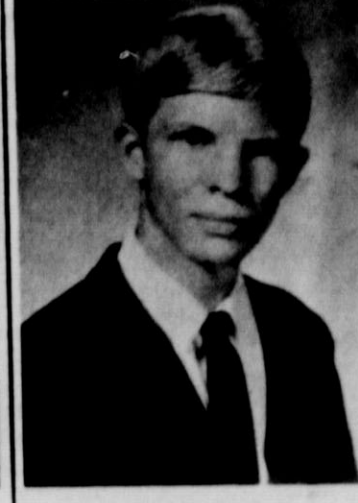


**LAURA JACOBS**
