"If we are to meet the state's water requirements in the future," he added, "we must have conjunctive use of our ground and surface waters. The quality of our groundwater is of such importance that it cannot be over-emphasized. This program, I believe, is of such importance that it must maintain its high priority among our programs."

study by the Water Development Board, the Texas Water Quality Board, and Texas Tech University covering the possible nitrate pollution from commercial cattle feedlot operations in pletion, Shurbert said. Results of the study will be published by the Board in FY72.

The study was directed by Dr. William D. Miller, chairman of the Geoscience Department of Texas Tech. Seth Burnitt of the Texas Water Development Board was coordinator of

"The water studies and investigations program is an important function of the Water Development Board," the Board's vice chairman said. "Much meaningful data is obtained through this program. This data is vital as we go forward in the development and protection of our water resources, and it means much to us on the High Plains as we plan the wise use and management of our declining water

machines should always be shut off before anyone attempts to unclog or adjust them.

"Children should be kept away from machinery and all workers should be taught to stay clear of the moving parts of agricultural machines," Smetana warned.

"Tractor overturns accounted for 16 of the deaths involving machinery last year,' he continued. He said these deaths might have been avoided if the tractors involved had been equipped with protective frames or protective cabs and safety belts.

"But the best way to prevent this sort of thing is to prevent tractor overturns themselves," Smetana advised.

He explained that agricultural workers could avoid tractor upsets by slowing down for turns, expecially on slopes and on rough, muddy ground. Slow speeds should also be used near ditches and embankments, according to the safety expert. He also cautioned tractor operators to watch for hidden hazards and obstacles, and not to overload the vehicle.

"One of the most important rules to follow." commented Smetana, "is to give proper, thorough training to young or inexperienced drivers and workers in the safe operation of all farm machinery.'

"One more thought about machines. Operators of slowmoving vehicles need to periodically check the condition of their SMV emblems. Damaged or fading emblems must be replaced. The orange flourescent centers of the emblems fade and will only last about two years," Smetana continued.

There are two possible solutions, either the entire emblem can be replaced, or the SMV's center can be covered with an easy-to-apply pressure sensitive triangle overlay,' he stated.

Water was the next accident villain discussed by the Texas Safety Association spokesman.

'Water-oriented accidents claimed 31 rural Texas lives last year, he said. "The deaths came in boating, swimming and fishing accidents on Texas farms and ranches. The most important safety step rural families can take in this area is to teach every member of

the family how to swim. Stock







In response to many inquiries concerning the effect of the court decision which held unconstitutional that portion of the Safety Responsibility law prohibiting a hearing on the issue of fault prior to suspension after an accident, DPS Director Col. Wilson E. Speir issued the following statement:


