## Legion Warned of 'Ugly Americans'

"It's easier to talk about what's wrong with a situation than about what's right," Judge Forrest Campbell declared in an address before the American Legion and Auxiliary, Monday night in the Legion hall.

He sounded a warning as he spoke on the subject, The Ugly Americans. "Although," he said, "my thoughts are along a differ-

ent line than those in the book by the same name."

The program followed the customary covered dish supper, with invocation by Rev. Larry Heard. J. R. Whitworth led the group in singing "America," and in the Pledge of Allegiance. Post Commander J. M. Thacker presided and introduced as special guests, Vice-Commander of Dist. 18 Dennis Holland and Mrs. Holland, of Dodson. Also introduced was Fred Wallace, new administrator of the Motley General Hospital.

Mrs. D. P. Keith, Auxiliary President presented Miss Mary Ann Woosley, who delighted the audience with selections from The Sound of Music. She was accompanied by Mrs. Larry Heard at the piano.

Vice-Commander Holland extended an invitation to the Post and Auxiliary members to attend a meeting at Dodson on April 21, when the National Commander J. Milton Patrick of Skiatook, Okla. will be a guest. He also urged the group to attend the District 18 meeting at the Herring Hotel in Amarillo, March 21-22.

Tables were attractive with decorations symbolic of March—shamrocks, the lamb and the lion, made of papier-mache by Mrs. Edgar Lee.

In a brief business session, Commander Thacker named a committee to make plans for the annual banquet honoring county high school seniors, and announced that the banquet will be held on the next meeting date, April 6.

### "Ugly Americans" Classified

In his talk, Judge Campbell classified as the "ugly Americans," first the Chicago riot leaders and their attorneys. "A man has no respect for the American court system, who makes a farce of judicial Government," he asserted.

The TV news media, he said, also represented "ugly" Americans in the coverage of the riots, making the thugs look like the "good guys," and the police appearing as the "bad boys."

"Ever since it happened, it seems that the TV networks have spent millions of dollars trying to justify their movements."

Other "ugly" Americans, the judge mentioned were people who neglect their duty as voters. "Americans are notorious for their lack of interest in elections," he pointed out. "It means a lot more what a man has done in the past, than what he promises to do in the future. We have several elections coming up. Some of these will draw perhaps 10% of the voters and some will draw as many as 50%."

He mentioned the new movement to worship freedom. "... freedom become our God? If so, I am willing to give up some of my freedom if it will put these

ugly Americans in their place ... we want freedom without restrictions, but it has become stagnant, like the swamps. We pride ourselves on being the Silent Majority ... but even the Silent Majority become ugly Americans, through apathy."

He lauded the American Legion as being one of the most enduring of American organizations to preserve the concepts of a free nation.

## Report for County Has Complete Data

THE PRESENT status of Motley County has been compiled and printed in the "Economic Base Report, Smaller Communities Program" by the Texas Employment Commission.

About 100 attractively bound copies of the 95-page booklet were presented here Wednesday afternoon, February 18, in a meeting of interested residents held in the District Court room.

Presentation of the booklet was made by Gene Clements, who headed the survey group located here late last year.

The report is perhaps one of the most comprehensive studies ever made of Motley County and embraces much more than the number of people employed or available for employment.

It treats almost every subject which affects the county's present and future economy. Information has been collected from many sources and compiled in easy-to-understand tables and text.

Some of the information might be classed as startling, especially with regard to population trends. Motley County had a population of 24 in 1880 (before the county was organized). In 1900 the population was 1,257, but in 1930 the number of people living in the county was 6,812. At that point

the population began to drop and the count in 1960 was only 2,870. The estimate of 1968 was 2,400.

In 1960 the average income was \$3,366 and below the state figure of \$4,884. Bank deposits have remained relatively unchanged in the past ten years, with a peak in 1961 of \$3,871,000.

Matador, with a population of 1,123 used 308 acre-feet of water in 1967. Roaring Springs, with a population of 385, used 25 acre-feet. Matador has a total of 605 electric subscribers supplied by the West Texas Utilities Company. Roaring Springs has 240 and Flomot 63.

Motley County has a total of 159.66 miles of paved roads maintained by the Texas Highway Department. The report says the Highway Department has \$529,500 programmed for the county. Almost everything from climate to elevation in the county is listed in the report. County elevations vary from 1,900 to 3,000 feet. Vary area is 1,011 square miles.

A brief history of the former Matador Land & Cattle Company is in the booklet. About 40 headings are listed in the table of contents.

## Four-Letter Word is Given Boys as Goal

"WORK is a four letter word and the only place success comes before it is in the dictionary," James L. "Curley" Hays told approximately 220 boys and their fathers at the thirty-third Annual Father-Son Banquet sponsored by the Matador Lions Club.

Hays, who is in the public relations department of the West Texas Utilities Company, made the principal address. He was introduced by Lion Bill Palmeyer. The banquet, held Thursday night in the basement of the First Baptist Church, was served by members of the Lions club.

"You can live in a pent house

or a flop house," Hays said, "it depends on you and your willingness to work ... the fear of starvation is the greatest problem today, but hunger is a challenge that can be overcome if we are willing to work ... the future is in the hands of you young people, politically, morally and economically ... man is not an island and we need all races and creeds ... willing to prepare by earning and by working ... carry your share with belief in God, belief in the dignity of man and by fair play ..."

Addressing the fathers, Hays said: "Spend more time with your boys that they may have equal or better opportunities than you received ... with a common goal, work together ..."

## Campbell Files For Mayor Place

Councilman Kirby Campbell has withdrawn his application for a place on the ballot to seek re-election, and filed as candidate for mayor.

The action was taken late yesterday an hour before the deadline for filing, and Pat Seigler filed as candidate for the place that will be vacated by Campbell. Matador must elect a mayor and two councilmen. Election is April 4.

Mayor Freddie Welling refused to enter the race for re-election because of a ruling by his employers, the West Texas Utilities Co., which prohibits employees holding public office.

### Texas is Theme of Club Program; Tribune Editor is Guest Speaker

Texas was the theme of the program given Thursday for El Progreso Study Club in regular meeting held in the home of Mrs. Larry Heard.

Guest speaker was Douglas Meador, editor and publisher of the Matador Tribune, who was presented by Mrs. J. M. Hill, Jr., program leader. Mrs. Hill paid special tribute to Mr. Meador as author of the book, Trail Dust, composed of excerpts from his column by the same name, which appears weekly in the Tribune.

Mrs. L. B. Campbell, president, opened the meeting. The state song, "Texas, Our Texas," and "The Eyes of Texas," were led by Mrs. Howard Traawek, with Mrs. Frank Pohl at the piano.

Mr. Meador, speaking in the

role of a Texan, rather than on the subject of Texas, cited the urgency of preserving as much history of this locality as possible.

In this connection, he mentioned the Ranch Headquarters museum project underway at Texas Tech University, Lubbock, the Southwest Collection, an archival collection of documents and papers of authors, also at Tech, and the Panhandle-Plains Museum on the campus of West Texas State University in Canyon. He pointed out that newspapers are another source from which historical information is obtained and preserved for the future.

He told the group of his particular interest in stories of the depression years.

"I think a collection of these stories would make an outstanding contribution to history," he said. "I think every young boy should have to be hungry at least once in his life to realize the value of money. Most young people don't believe you when you tell them of the dire conditions and the want which existed during the early 1930's."

Further tribute was paid Mr. Meador when Miss Amy Glenn read several paragraphs from Trail Dust, in her Inspirational Thought, which concluded the program. She also included a quotation from Chas. Guy, Editor of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

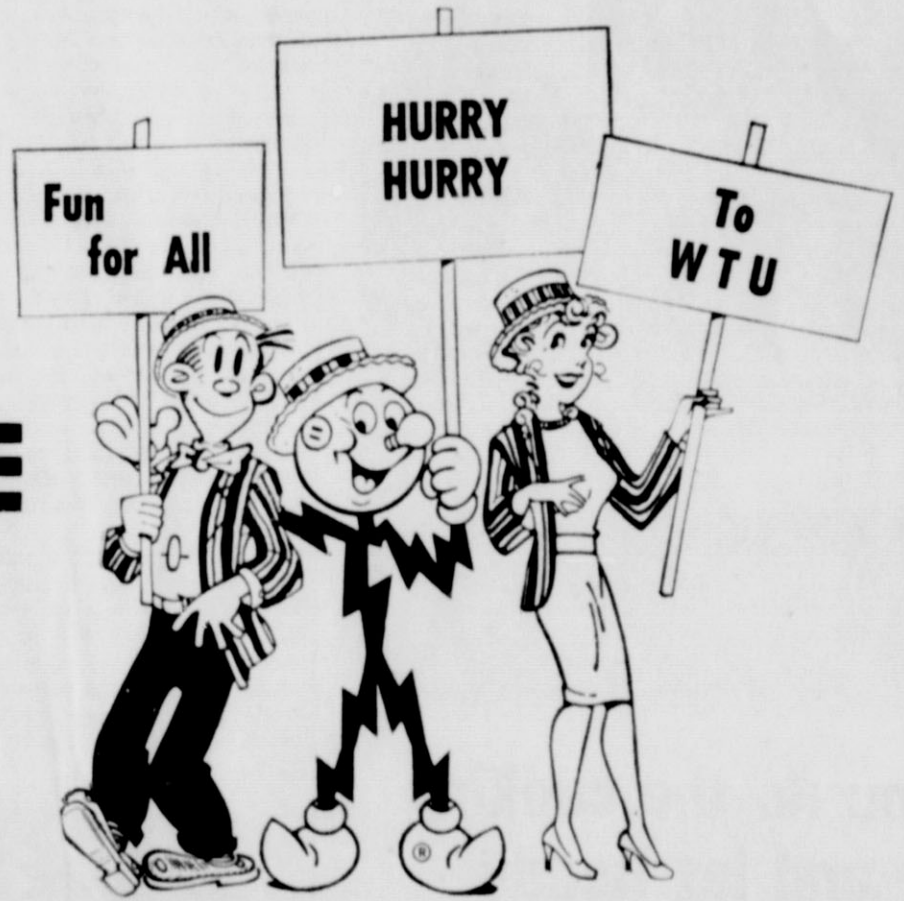

### COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Recently you have seen another example of what misuse of agricultural chemicals can mean. The poisoning of the children in New Mexico could happen anywhere, even in Motley County.

Under no circumstances should fungicide treated grain be fed to meat and dairy animals. Not only is there the possibility of milling the animal, but also the fungicide material can be deposited in the tissue of the animal, and if the meat is consumed, poisoning will result.

We know better, but do we always heed the warnings. This statement is on the container, but still it is up to the individual to comply with the precautions.

In connection with this incident, there are 200 pork carcasses that are being held by meat inspectors which they suspect have been fed treated grains. If the meat is found to have even a trace of the fungicide, the carcass will have to be destroyed. This will involve a loss to the producer, and when meat inspectors suspect that animals have been fed grain that was treated with a fungicide, the whole lot involved will be retained until a chemical analysis can be run. This also will result in a loss for the producer and packer due to cooler shrink and carcass deterioration during the analysis period. This loss can be eliminated, but only by the individuals feeding animals.
