

## **COUNTY AGENT** PALLMEYER SAYS:

Recently you have seen another example of what misuse of agricultural chemicals can mean. The poisoning of the children in New Mexico could happen anywhere, even in Motley County.

Under no circumstances should fungicide treated grain be fed to meat and dairy animals. Not only is there the possibility of milling the animal, but also the fungicide material can be deposited in the tissue of the animal, and if the meat is consumed, poisoning will result

We know better, but do we always heed the warnings. This statement is on the container, but still it is up to the individual to comply with the precautions.

In connection with this incident, there are 200 pork carcasses that are being held by meat aspectors which they suspect have been fed treated grains. If the meat is found to have even a trace of the fungicide, the carcass will have to be destroyed. This will involve a loss to the producer, and when meat inspectors suspect that animals have been fed grain that was treated with a fungicide, the whole lot involved will be retained until a chemical analysis can be run. This also will result in a loss for the producer and packer due to cooler shrink and carcass deterioration during the analysis period. This loss can be eliminated, but only by the individuals feeding ani-
