Library Awarded Tocker Grant

The Motley County Library has been awarded a grant from the Tocker Foundation for over \$7,000. The grant proposal, "Clearing the Path for Knowledge and Technology" was approved by the foundation for purchase of two new computers, two new printers and four new chairs. The balance of the grant, over \$3,600, will be used to enhance collections.

The Tocker Foundation was established in 1964 to implement the philanthropic interests of Phillip and Olive Tocker. Mr. and Mrs. Tocker endowed the Foundation with respectively.

In 1992 the Foundation board decided to focus grant distribution to small rural libraries serving a population of 12,000 or less. The direction is to assist libraries in making services more accessible to individuals who by reason of distance, residence, handicap, age, literacy level or other disadvantage are unable to receive the benefits of public library services. Grants are distributed to assisting libraries to serve as community centers, information resources and provide literacy





Letter from the New Editor

To the Readers of the **Motley County Tribune:**

There are probably a number of questions that you as both subscribers to the Motley County Tribune and as members of a tight-knit community have about the possible changes to your hometown newspaper after it merges with the Caprock Courier. Changes are sometimes stressful and confusing, so I will try my best to address any and all concerns.

Printing news from multiple communities in one publication has enabled the smaller communities I serve to continue to have a quality news source. I was facing the possibility of closing or having just an online newspaper before combining all the areas we cover. A number of rural newspapers have not had the same fortune and simply closed their doors. Rising costs associated with a decrease in printed newspaper and high fuel costs have made it very difficult to afford to operate a rural newspaper in recent years.

Those who are surviving are merging or finding economical online options or a com-

bination. I have opted for a combination strategy because older readers are more comfortable with a print newspaper while younger readers prefer online news.

PRICING

I will honor all previous subscriptions. If you just paid for your annual subscription or if you only have two months left on it, you will still receive the newspaper for the amount of time you paid for. Any pre-paid advertising will be honored as well. Any trade outs/bartering will have to be

renegotiated. Unless a non-profit organization asks for a large display ad, we print news releases about events for non-profits for free. Display ads are discounted for these organizations. We have an area event calendar that usually includes at least three weeks of event information on Page 2. This is a good source for knowing what, when and where events are happening.

Our open display rates are similar to the Motley County Tribune, but I am still working on reconciling any differences. All advertisers will be made aware of any changes by the end of May, and I do not plan to increase rates on regular advertisers.

Classified ads and legal notices are 30¢ per word with a \$6 minimum. Obituaries and birth or engagement announcements are 5¢ per word with a \$10 minimum. Deadline for advertising or news releases is Saturday by noon.

The Caprock Courier, which previously was the Briscoe County News by itself, is printed every other Wednesday and combines news from Briscoe, Hall and Motley counties. It is posted online every week at www.caprockcourier. com. The price for subscribers from these three counties is \$30 per year. Annual rate for all other counties and states is \$38. The online price will be \$15 per year. After adding the Motley County Tribune to the Caprock Courier family, I hope that a weekly paper will become economical once again. Your first Caprock Courier will arrive June 12. Every other week that the Caprock Courier is not printed, we will mail out a one-page newsletter with any important local notices and weekly calendar of events, so that you will stay informed of important dates. June 5 you will receive your

first newsletter.

The Motley County Tribune will still have its own nameplate and a separate section within the Caprock Courier. This allows readers to quickly find local news without having to filter through every other story. However, I have found that most readers peruse all the sections and seem to enjoy it.

The Caprock Courier is a tabloid paper versus a broad sheet like you currently receive. It is approximately 11"x12". It is typically 24-32 pages. With the Motley County Tribune added, it will most likely be 32 pages through the summer, and then a special section may have to be printed for school news. The printer currently prints a maximum of 32 pages per section.

CONTENT

Like all small newspapers, our primary function is to inform the public about local government and community happenings. We do, however, strive to cover school events as thoroughly and fairly as possible and welcome tips about activities going on at school. Sports are always covered in small newspapers, but we try to include stories about academics and other student

activities to give all students a chance to be recognized.

We also regularly include feature and special interest stories about interesting people, places, or events in the community. We have puzzles, cartoons, Baxter Black, and 4-6 other entertainment/ informational/editorial columns. We occasionally include state or regional news if it seems relevant to local issues if there is enough space.

STAFF

The Caprock Courier has a managing editor for each section. Brenda Hutson is the managing editor for the Briscoe County News. Tori Fry is the managing editor of the Valley Crier. Both are excellent photographers and do a great job with the stories they find.

I am very pleased to announce that Jennifer will continue on as the office manager for the Motley County Tribune, but she will be performing her duties from her home. She and I are working on hours for people to visit and a possible after hours drop box so her privacy can be respected. I am hoping that any and all Motley County contributors will consider writing their weekly columns, but I have not had the opportunity to meet with them yet.

Keisha Ruff was recently hired as a photographer/ journalist. She will primarily cover Motley County stories. She designs websites and is a very talented photographer and writer as well. She will attend Motley County School sporting events and activities, as well as local events in Matador and Roaring Springs.

I have been the Publisher/ Editor of the Briscoe County News since 2010. My degree is in Finance (WTAMU), but my first love is writing. I was born in Tulia and went to elementary school in Quanah. My dad's family is originally from Silverton. My parents, Poke and Deb Arnold, and grandparents, Fred and Vivone Arnold, still live there. Having deep roots in the area, I truly care about the future of rural West Texas towns and understand the important role of small town papers. I now live in Bell Buckle, Tennessee, where I moved to get married last August, but I will always be a Texan!

I sincerely look forward to serving Motley County and welcome your feedback.

The scholarships in Motley County began May 2011 with Kyla Simpson being awarded \$350.00; and May 2012, Alexis Osborn was awarded \$350.00.







"These people made it possible for the staff to attend training by staying with the students during the training time," said SHAC chair Judy Cooper.



4-H Mission Possible summer camp provides 'inclusive' experience for youth 8-18

BROWNWOOD — The Texas 4-H Conference Center, 5600 Farm-to-Market Road 3021, Brownwood, will again offer its Mission Possible "inclusive" summer camp for youth with and without disabilities from July 8-10.

"The camp is a statewide effort to engage young people with various medically diagnosed disabilities into the 4-H program," said Dr. Darlene Locke, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service 4-H and youth development specialist and and personal safety. conference center director. "Mission Possible is held simultaneously with a session of County Camp, providing an even greater diversity of participants. Mission Possible campers participate in the same activities as those in County Camp."

She said the Mission Possible camp is open to youth ages 8-18 and offers participants a full gamut of activities, including shooting sports, archery, dance, arts and crafts, kayaking, dancing, swimming and environmental education.

Individual registration is \$175 through June 14 and five percent higher thereafter. Registration covers all meals, lodging, refreshments, health care services, facility and programming fees and a Mission Possible T-shirt.

Registrations are accepted on a first come, first served basis until the camp is filled. First time applicants should contact the 4-H Center for an application, which will be re-

viewed to ensure the camper's needs can be adequately met. To register, go to http://texas4hcenter.tamu.edu and choose "Mission Possible" under the 2013 Summer Camps tab. A camp brochure may also be found at the site.

Locke said 4-H members ages 14-18 serve as mentors and act as camping or teaching assistants to ensure disabled participants learn and are successful in camp endeavors. They arrive a day before camp for an in-service training, which addresses disability awareness and explains their role in assisting the campers, including help with transportation, hygiene and personal safety

"The goal of Mission Possible is to create an inclusive environment and to also help break down the barriers of misunderstanding and fear that hinder full community involvement by those persons with disabilities," she said. "And we are accredited by the American Camp Association, so families are assured of a quality program and facility that meets rigorous standards."

From 2005-2012 the center has held eight Mission Possible camp sessions serving 155 campers, 136 of whom have had medically diagnosed disabilities, including autism, Down's syndrome, pervasive development disorder, cerebral palsy, blindness, traumatic brain injury and attention deficit hyperactive disorder.

"Mission Possible is unique as a camp for youth with and without disabilities, but is also unique in the disabilities served," said Dr. Chris Boleman, statewide 4-H and Youth Development Pro-

gram director, College Station. "While at camp, the focus is on their ability and not their disability, and activities are adapted to meet the individual needs of the camper."

Boleman said the goal of the camp is to help campers with life skills toward independence, enhance self-esteem, increase understanding and acceptance, improve social abilities, widen awareness of and participation in recreational activities, and enable youth to connect with others.

"The value of the camp goes beyond the engagement of youth with disabilities in that 4-H youth serving as mentors gain insight into the world of disabilities," Locke noted. "Their knowledge and increased awareness allows them to be better informed and to serve as advocates

within their own communities for the disabled."

Mission Possible is funded by private donations and user fees assessed from the participants. Each year, the 4-H Center seeks additional sponsors to help reduce the burden on individual camper families and the 4-H members volunteering their services as mentors, said camp coordinators.

"This year we particularly want to thank C.C. Creations of College Station, which has been our T-shirt sponsor for seven years, as well as the generosity of Warren and Jeannie Seidel, Mrs. Helen Piehl and Nathan and Gena Halfmann for their support of Mission Possible," Locke said.
