## Married In Eastland

A biography of the couple was presented to the guests upon arrival, which revealed that Moyne L. Kelly and Helen Jones were high school sweethearts in Corsicana, Texas. Two items have been added to the inspection list-the exhaust system and the exhaust emission system. A car now must have a muffler and it must be free from leaks. All cars manufactured in 1968 or later coming from the factory equipped with the exhaust emission system (commonly known as the smog device), still must have the device in working order.

The exhaust emission system will be checked to see that it has not been removed or disconnected. This will also apply to foreign cars. However, most of these now in this country are equipped with the smog device before they are sold.

Vehicle owners are now urged to start having their vehicles inspected. The new inspection fee is \$2.00.



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


