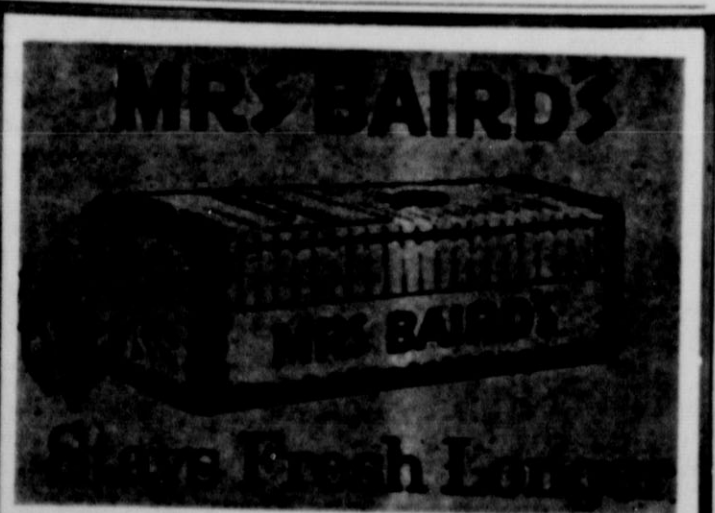

Married in Eastland

A biography of the couple was presented to the guests upon arrival, which revealed that Moyne L. Kelly and Helen Jones were high school sweethearts in Corsicana, Texas. Kelly, afraid of losing her, soon became an oil field worker for the same company. On December 18, 1919, the couple were married in a simple ceremony at the home of the Eastland Baptist pastor.

During the early years of their marriage, the couple lived in Waco, where they were employed at the Methodist Home, and during this time, Mr. Kelly did part time teaching while attending the University, receiving both a B.A. and M.A. degree. At 18, Mrs. Kelly became the foster mother of 40 little boys in their dormitory home.

The Kellys moved to Lonsdale, Arkansas in 1932, where he taught in an 8-months rural school, but returned to Texas the following year. After teaching in Crosby and Lubbock counties, they moved to Afton in 1938 where Mr. Kelly assumed the duties of superintendent of Patton Springs School. After their daughter, Helen Juanita graduated from Patton Springs, they moved to Austin that she might attend the University of Texas. Mr. Kelly also worked on his Ph.D. degree during that time. From 1944 to 1949, Kelly was Superintendent of the State Home of Corsicana. In 1949 he was appointed Executive Director of the Texas Board of Hospitals and Special Schools and the family moved back to Austin. From there, in 1951, they moved to Kerrville, where he was Superintendent of the Kerrville State School.

The Kellys bought their farm home at Afton in 1952 and he again taught in the Patton Springs school. During the years 1954-58, he was given a leave of absence from school to serve two regular sessions and two special sessions in the House of Representatives of the Texas Legislature. In 1968 he was again elected Superintendent of Patton Springs School, and continues to serve in that capacity.

**Conservation Program Extended
Ten Years by President Nixon**

President Nixon signed into law a 10-year extension of the Great Plains Conservation Program, Ervin Willard, Matador, District Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service has announced here.

Willard states however, that the demand for the GPCP program in the Vernon area in which Matador is located, has far exceeded the funds allotted.

"This year's funds released on Nov. 1 have already been obligated for all but Hardeman and Cottle counties in this 10-county area," he said. "About 450 contracts on 600,000 acres are in effect now and 550 have already completed their GP contracts in the Vernon area."

In Matador, new contracts awaiting funds are: E. Linwood Egger and Tongue River Grazing Association, Great Plains contracts expiring Dec. 31 in Motley County are: J. K. McIlroy, L. W. Crowell, James Taylor, Taylor Brothers, Kenneth Thompson, Dorris Jones, M. C. Jones, A. J. Nimmo, Mrs. Thelma Hammons

and J. D. Spray.

"Those wishing to use this program to apply their conservation plan should make applications at their Soil Conservation Service office now," Willard stressed. "They can work up their plans and be ready to sign contracts when funds become available, which should be around July 1, 1970."

The new legislation, clearly stating the responsibility of Soil and Water Conservation Districts in the program, authorized another \$150 million for the extension of the program from Dec. 31, 1971 to Dec. 31, 1981.

The Great Plains Conservation Program is now in use in 424 counties of the 10 Great Plains states—Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, New Mexico, North Dakota, Montana, Oklahoma, South Dakota Texas and Wyoming. In its most recent summary, the Soil Conservation Service reported that 34,662 farmers and ranchers had entered the program since planning started in 1957. Their holdings cover 62,240,420 Plains

acres. Cost-share obligations total \$121,606,629 with about \$30 million of this still to be paid as owners proceed with work.

Ovr 5,300 farmers and ranchers in the 424 designated counties have applications on file awaiting action, Willard said.

The number indicates the sticker's expiration month. The system will eliminate those annual jams of previous years, caused when inspection stickers expired on six million Texas vehicles at the same time.

New Vehicle Inspection Schedule In Effect by Safety Department

A new year-around inspection schedule went into effect Sept. 1, for motor vehicles, and instead of the usual April 15 deadline, inspections will come due one year after the current month of inspection.

Motor vehicle inspection stations in Motley County are, Super Service Station in Rearring Springs, and Marion Norris Garage (Fina Station) and Matador Auto Co., in Matador,

as announced recently by Ralph Briscoe, Safety Education Officer of Wichita Falls.

The Texas Motor Vehicle Inspection Program instigated the changes in the new procedure, and Captain Alan Johnson, Service Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety for this area listed the changes:

1. Inspections go on monthly, year-around schedule. (2) Sticker location changed to left side of

windshield. (3) Number of the inspection month placed on sticker. (4) Inspection of exhaust system. (5) Inspection of emission system. (6) Inspection fee \$2.00.

The new inspection sticker will be placed inside of the lower left-hand side of the windshield instead of the usual right side of the windshield.

The number of the current month of inspection will appear on the sticker. For example, those issued in September will have number 9 on them, October, the number 10, etc. The color of the sticker will change each calendar year.

The monthly inspection will tend to take all the registered vehicles in Texas and prorate them equally among the twelve calendar months, it was pointed out. This will establish an anniversary month for each vehicle to be inspected and prevent the log-jam of over six million registered vehicles to be inspected at one time.

Two items have been added to the inspection list—the exhaust system and the exhaust emission system. A car now must have a muffler and it must be free from leaks. All cars manufactured in 1968 or later coming from the factory equipped with the exhaust emission system (commonly known as the smog device), still must have the device in working order.

The exhaust emission system will be checked to see that it has not been removed or disconnected. This will also apply to foreign cars. However, most of these now in this country are equipped with the smog device before they are sold.

Vehicle owners are now urged to start having their vehicles inspected. The new inspection fee is \$2.00.

Christmas tree lots have opened in parts of Texas. Something new has been added to several Christmas trees on lots already open in parts of Texas: packaged Christmas trees. Trees are placed in tubular plastic netting such as that used to package produce, says Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist. This holds all parts of the tree snug and makes it easier to handle and retain moisture.
