After over 46 years, Roy announced his retirement effective December 31, 2012. Debra Spray has been named Vice-President and manager of the Matador Branch.

Farm Service Agency emergency loans available to 207 disaster counties

(COLLEGE STATION, counties to apply for a low TX) -January 14, 2013-- USDA Texas Farm Service Agency (FSA) Acting Executive Director James B. Douglass announced that 207 counties in Texas were declared a disaster on January 9, 2013, due to drought and heat using the new, streamlined Secretarial Disaster Designation process. Under this designation, producers with operations in any of the 157 primary disaster counties or 50 contiguous disaster counties are eligible to apply for low interest emergency loans.

The streamlined disaster designation process issues a drought disaster declaration when a county has experienced a drought intensity value of at least a D2 (severe drought) level for eight consecutive weeks based on the U.S. Drought Monitor during the crop year. Under this declaration 157 counties in Texas have reached that threshold since November 1,

Motley County was designated as primary disaster county. "The disaster designation is welcome relief to producers because it allows all qualified operators in primary and contiguous

interest emergency (EM) loan," said Douglass.

Emergency loans help producers recover from production and physical losses due to drought, flooding and other natural disasters or quarantine.

Producers have eight months from the date of the declaration to apply for emergency loan assistance. FSA will consider each loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability. Producers can borrow up to 100 percent of actual production or physical losses, to a maximum amount of \$500,000. The current emergency loan interest rate is 2.25 percent.

Producers with operations in counties that did not receive a disaster designation could be eligible for emergency loan assistance if they suffered at least a 30 percent loss in crop production or a physical loss to livestock, livestock products, real estate or chattel property.

Council Continues Discussion of Enforcing **Dog Ordinances**

Matador City Council met at 6:30 p.m. January 10, 2013, to appoint a Mayor Pro Tem, discuss Senior Citizen assistance and dog ordinance enforcement; and approve an electric energy contract.

Attending were Councilmen Rodney Williams, Bobby Klodginski, Alvin Alexander, and Betty Roberts; and Mayor Pat Smith and City Secretary Debra Scott. Absent were City Superintendent Steve Barton and Councilmember Shane Jones. No one spoke in Open Forum. Attending as observers were R.C. Giesecke and Jerry Johnson.

Following an invocation by Mayor Pat Smith, Scott reported that the mayor had received a letter from the City of Floydada offering to accept stray dogs from the City. The cost would be \$10.00 per dog per day to house strays at the animal shelter; plus the cost of disposition either by adoption or euthanization. In a tele- liams said he would "like for phone conversation with us to do something more Floydada City Manager productive than bringing Gary Brown, Scott reported this up every month." that dogs were kept three to

seven days before being euthanized. The length of the contract would be for one year, and could be revoked by either party at any time.


Discussion on this proposal raised the questions of the expense of the capture and transport of animals to Floydada. "Do we want to hire Floydada's certified (handler) to come twice a month?" Mayor Smith asked, "or do we want to pay someone (locally) to pick up dogs and take them over to Floydada?" This action item was tabled until further review.

Mayor Smith reported that he had met for more than an hour with Senior Citizen's representatives Judy Renfro and Ray Baxter regarding assistance from the City to the center. "They (board members) did not want the city to pay for sewer and water," Smith said, reporting the center had received a "sizeable donation" and were not seeking assistance from the city at this time.



The animals that I tended also went to market or were butchered on our ranch and provided us with much good food from our own freezer. The tending of the animals was fun and educational and provided me with many hours of interesting observations along the way. 



God's Work...Building



Nathan is survived by his parents, Robert and Debbie Shannon of Roar-





According to Chris Reed, Childress Area Engineer, "the first construction work the contractors perform is to extend the culverts. This has to be done before they begin widening the roadway an additional three (3) feet on each side. The contractor will then rehabilitate various sections, with the majority of the roadway getting a new asphalt over-

Lane closures will be

during daylight hours only. The roadway will be reduced to one-lane with a pilot car to guide motorist through the work zone.

"Safety is the top priority at TxDOT and the basis for planning, building, and maintaining our transportation," said Reed. "This widening, rehabilitation and overlay project will enhance the safety of the traveling public on FM 94."

In other business, Judge Meador presented the court with a resolution to consider in support of the Indigent Defense Grant Program. The grant program assists the county in the implementation of the Fair Defense Act. Counties are eligible to receive grants from the Texas Indigent Defense Commission to provide improvements in indigent defense services in the county. "Last year, the county spent \$5,000.00 on indigent defense," Judge Meador said, adding, "this grant program is a way the county can recoup that money." A motion was made by Commissioner Jameson, seconded by Guy Campbell, to support the

TxDOT bridge inspector at resolution. The motion carried by unanimous vote.

In the last order of business, Judge Meador informed the court that the Dickens County jail contract needed to be approved and signed by the court. "Nothing changed," Meador said, "but Dickens County has a new sheriff, so the contract has to reflect the change." Dickens charges \$40.00 a day to house prisoners from Motley County. "We now have an opinion from an attorney in Crosbyton; from the City Attorney Tom Hamilton; and the Attorney General," Williams said, citing that public funds could

not be used to supple-

ment a private enterprise.

"It is obvious we are not going to give them (the senior center) anything," Bobby Klodginski conceded, however, "the opinion of City Attorney did not cite any statutes."

Other action items included a motion by Betty Roberts, seconded by Alvin Alexander, to appoint Rodney Williams as Mayor Pro Tem to serve in the absence of the Mayor. The motion carried.

Procuring road millings for the city from the county allotment program through TXDOT was discussed. The cost of filling pot holes, road edges, and topping roads has been offset by the allotment system in the past, saving the city thousands of dollars. Alexander said he had been told

In other action, Debra Scott reported that the Tri Eagle Energy contract expired two months ago. Scott said she had been researching other cost effective options. The Council voted unanimously to change the energy contract to Houston-based retail electric provider GEXA Energy for 36 months.

Following approval of expenditures and a review of the city's financial status, the council adjourned. Future agenda items will include a budget overview for Fiscal Year 2013. In addition, Bobby Klodginski said that a rewrite of the Market Matador Bylaws needed to be addressed, stating that the city needed to be clear with the citizen board of the expectations of the City Council. Debra Scott reported that a Market Matador meeting has been scheduled for 4:00 p.m., January 22, 2013, at City Hall. The next meeting for City Council will be at 6:30 p.m. February 14, 2013.

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


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
