Job Interview: Brielle Collett. These FFA members exhibited the best of the FFA Motto "Learning to do, doing to learn" and represented


their chapter, their school and their community in upstanding fashion.

## MCISD is rated Superior in Financial Rating System

The Motley County School Board met the evening of November 12th at 7:30 pm. In attendance were Board Members Rachelle Davis, Don Baxter, Lewis Drum, Lee Jones and Tina Brooks. Also present were Superintendent Mr. Cochran, Principle Gary Waitman and Business Manager Denise Ford. At 7:32 the meeting was called to order and, as usual, they first approved last month's minutes, then approved the financial report. Both passed unanimously with no discussion.

The third item on the agenda was the the Financial Integrity Rating System Texas, F.I.R.S.T. "This is another check and balance system for our finances," stated Mr. Cochran. He also explained that the F.I.R.S.T. report being viewed is always two years behind, therefore this one is from the 2010-2011 school year. It deals with things like reimbursements for board members for training, conflict of interest forms for board members who have businesses that may profit from decisions the council makes, and is judged on 20 indicators. A passing score is 52 and the F.I.R.S.T. score for the 2010-2011 school year was a 67. This rating is Superior, the highest category possible.

The board next reviewed and approved the District Improvement Plan. This document is revised every year and outlines how to immance as a whole. Another important part of MCISD's education system which was approved was the Technology Plan. Also approved were the Campus-Parent and the District-Parent involvement Policies.

The board accepted J.D. Russell's resignation due to the fact that he and his family have moved from the area. Accepted was a 60 count desk donation with special thanks to Mr. Waitman for handling

the retrieval and distribution of the gift. Lewis Drum, Don Baxter and Tina Brooks completed Conflict of interest forms as required by the yearly Audit.

A resolution was passed for a MCISD student who has stock animals housed outside of Motley County so that they can show their animals at the major stock shows.

The NCLB Act requires that all teachers be Highly Qualified and that the Districts give a public report based on their qualifications. All teachers at Motley County were determined to be Highly Qualified for the 2012-2013 school year.

Former board member J.D. Russell was MCISD's representative on the Tax Appraisal Review Board, ARB. Mr. Cochran stated, "We need someone to represent Motley County ISD." After some discussion of the position's requirements, Lewis Drum volunteered for the two-year term required of any taxing entity.

A final decision was reached on the iPads and the board agreed on purchasing either iPad2 or iPad3 with the Administrator's discretion. He will also be choosing how many to purchase as the bulk unit pricing will save the school money. In the long run, technology such as this will allow the council to save time and money. Board members discussed longevity and accessibility regarding the iPads and there was an air of excitement regarding the purchase. Mr. Cochran prove the district's perfor- pointed out that technology like this will come with a purchasable warranty that will cover maintenance costs. Many times these are free to educational systems.

An interesting discussion followed when Mr. Cochran mentioned a new Rebate Program for purchasing buses. Apparently there is an eagerness to dispose of the school's older diesel models and replace them with ones that are newer and more energy efficient. Mr. Cochran stated

that the bus that would be replaced will be the 1994 bus on the Flomot route that has over 100,000 miles on it. The bus that will be purchased will have to be at least a 2012 model that is a diesel bus.

The board voted to apply for the rebate. Schools that are selected for the rebate program will be notified in January. The rebate could be anywhere from \$20,000 to \$30,000.

In Principal Waitman's report, MCISD had a 96.96% attendance rate this last month due mostly to sickness. That is just a 1% drop from last month. Enrollment went up, however, to 188 students.

Mr. Cochran's Superintendent's report highlighted upcoming calendar events for the next Board Meeting which will be on December 10, 2012. At that meeting the Board will be highlighting the yearly Audit for those community members who wish to attend). Members are also required to participate in Tier Two training. This team building exercise was scheduled for 6 p.m., right before next month's meeting. While discussing the date for the meeting, many council members expressed concerns of having to miss any basketball games as many of them plan on regularly attending and supporting MCISD athletics. Mr. Cochran then took the time to say in regard to the floor scrubber approved in last month's meeting, "It is great. One of the best purchases we've made."

Panhandle Farm and Ranch Management Symposium set for Nov. 28 in Amarillo

Rangeland management and EPA regulations to be discussed

AMARILLO – Rangeland management issues will be a primary topic of the 28th annual Panhandle Farm and Ranch Management Symposium hosted by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service Nov. 28.

The symposium will be in conjunction with the Amarillo Farm and Ranch Show Nov. 27-29 at the Amarillo Civic Center. It will immediately follow the 12th annual Texas Commodity Symposium and Amarillo Chamber of Commerce Ag Appreciation Luncheon. Registration will be from 12:45-1 p.m. in the Grand Plaza Room.

There is a \$2 admittance fee for the Amarillo Farm and Ranch Show and a \$15 registration fee for the Panhandle Farm and Ranch Management Symposium, said Brandon Boughen, AgriLife Extension agriculture and natural resources agent for Potter County.

"This year we have something new to address – the Spill Prevention, Control and Countermeasure Rule through the EPA," Boughen said. "We know producers and landowners have questions about this regulation, and we want to offer an opportunity to ask specific questions while remaining anonymous."

Other program topics and speakers will include:

Laws and Regulations, Steven Boston, Texas Department of Agriculture, Lubbock.

 Hog Abatement, Ken Cearley, AgriLife Extension wildlife specialist for High Plains and Trans-Pecos, Amarillo.

- Brush Management in the Panhandle, Clint Rollins, U. S. Department of Agriculture – Natural Resources Conservation Service rangeland management specialist, Amarillo.

- Agriculture Market Update, Dr. Mark Welch, professor and AgriLife Extension economist, College Station.

- Regulations for Oil/Petroleum Products, George Caldwell, Texas Farm Bureau, Waco.

The program will offer four Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units for pesticide applicator participants: one in laws and regulations, one in general, one-half in drift management and one and a half in integrated pest management, Boughen said. Certificates will be handed out upon the completion of the program; a receipt must be presented to receive a certificate.
