

On December 7, 1941 my oldest brother, Leroy, celebrated his birthday at home. He was 19 and all of his friends knew that they were going to be involved in the coming conflict. Our family did not have big birthday parties during those years. He says he remembers being at home but that there was no big celebration, maybe a cake home made by our Mother. They found out about the bombing at Pearl Harbor from a news program on the radio.

He was not drafted into the Navy until the middle of 1943, but said he was almost relieved to be drafted because he was in college at the time and the uncertainty of paying for college had become difficult. After all, hardly anyone had money and not many fam-

ilies had the luxury of sending a child to college. He did not know that he would later avail himself of the G I Bill and finish his college education.

He spent the rest of World War II on a destroyer mostly in the South Pacific sending signals between the ships as a semaphore flag operator. He sent many letters to his family that had holes cut out in the paper. We realized that the military censors had done this so that not even a scrap of information about troop location could be gleaned. Later on towards the end we got pictures with the letters. My brothers were almost unrecognizable with their uniforms and extremely tanned skin. He made it into China and sent home a picture of himself in a rickshaw being pulled by a human runner. I found that very interesting. He also sent me a Navy uniform just my size. I wore it with pride and someone took a picture of me wearing it. My mother was extremely relieved when all my brothers made it back home after the war was over.

Editors Note: This letter was written by Ola (Eatmon) Thompson, born at the turn of the century in 1901. She wrote this letter on the eve of her 90th birthday in 1990. She lived to be 100 years old and when she died in 2009, she had 10 grandchildren, 26 great grandchildren, and 11 great-greatgrandchildren. She lived with her family at Doan's Crossing in Wilbarger County, until 1976.

Doan's came into existence as a trading post at the place where the Western Cattle Trail crossed the Red River from Texas into the Indian Territory in 1878. Doan's dwindled in population and importance after the cattle trail was abandoned and the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad built tracks south of the community in the mid-1880s. It is located on the south bank of the Red River about 20 miles north of Vernon, Texas.

Doan, Texas – **1905-1990** On the eve of my 90th birthday, I'll try to put down some of the things that come to my memory of the past 85 years.

On February 17, 1905, I came to Doan's (Crossing) with my parents Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Eatmon and little brother, Alfred, from Olustee, Oklahoma, crossing the Red River just east of Doan's (Trading Post).

The other Eatmon children were borned (sic) at Doan's – Thelma, July 3, 1905, Minnie, March 27, 1907, and Luther, June 5, 1911.

Being so young there isn't many things I can recall. But to my memory of the day we got there – one thing was the big snow that had everything looking like Christmas time. Our evening meal was prepared by Mrs. John Caffee. Their home was where Clais and Nita Woodard now live.

There was two stores at Doan's at that time. The Doan's Store was also the Post Office. Each day the little one-horse mail hack came from Vernon, Texas, to bring the mail to the Doan's Post Office in all kinds of weather, and, made the return trip to Vernon! There hasn't been a store or Post office in Doan's for years, but the mail is still brought and put in rural boxes and returns to Vernon.

At Christmas time the Doan's Store was a joy to both the old and young. The store was filled with toys, fruit and Christmas candy. Back in those days we had Christmas at Christmas time. Nowadays any Variety Store you walk into looks like Christmas three hundred and sixty-five days out of the year. I remember my first Christmas tree in Doan's in 1905 was in

the Methodist Chapel, two miles west of Doan's. The chapel was there for many years and used. Later it was moved near Odell, Texas. Our Christmas tree was in the Doan's school house for many years.

In 1884, the first Saturday in May, the Doan family went to the Watts Grove with their lunch and had a picnic. Today, the first Saturday in May is still Doan's Picnic Day, and to my knowledge, it's the oldest celebration of its kind in the history of Wilbarger, County.

In May 1911, the Doan's Picnic Day crowned its first Queen. We had a small stage on the picnic ground. From the stage we marched to the baseball diamond on the east side of the picnic ground to do a May Pole 'Drill. It was very colorful to us. The crowning of the Queen wasn't near as elaborate as it is nowadays, but it was very important to each of us that day in 1911 as it was the first Queen of the Doan's Picnic. Marie Rowland was our Queen. Mrs. Bertha (Doan) Ross helped us with the program that day. The street band came each year. Their music was enjoyed by all on Picnic Day.

The first part of my life was spent in Doan's. Also the first part of my married life. My four children was borned (sic) at Doans, Texas: Alva, May 27, 1923; Dickie, June 13, 1928, Carroll, Feb. 19, 1931, Sam Houston, March 2, 1934.

The first two years (1921-1922) Hub and I lived on the east side of Doan's in a two room house re-done from the Old Doan's Store. We, at that time, farmed some of Mr. Doan's land.

In the early fall of 1921, the school house burned. It was soon replaced by a nice threeroom building, and was used until 1936. The new school building was re-built by W.S. Eatmon and P.M. Emmitt. My two oldest children attended the Doan's School until it was closed in 1936. The Doan's school district, along with several other districts, consolidated and built what is now Northside School. located twelve miles north of Vernon, Texas, on Highway 283. I still feel like Northside is part of the Old Doan's school. My four children graduated from Northside school. Hub and I was employed by the Northside school several years before we retired.

On Christmas night in 1922, the Adobe (Trading Post) burned. Next morning there was nothing left standing except the adobe walls. It was soon restored in the early part of 1923 by S.W. Eatmon. My sister and her husband lived in an annex on the west side of the adobe. At the time of the fire, they were gone from home. They farmed part of Mr. Doan's land that

The adobe, after it was made liveable again in 1923, was used many years. It is now being restored again. I, for one, will be glad when it's finished as Doan's just wouldn't be Doan's without the adobe.

I heard Mr. Doan say the clay for the adobe was up the creek just west of Doan's on the Alex Rose farm. And the forms for the adobe bricks was wooden shot-gun shell boxes.

There is a beautiful monument on the sight (sic) of the Doan's Store. I think at that time it was called the Trading Post. Indians came across the Red River from Oklahoma to trade with Mr. Doan. Some of the Indians that came to the Trading Post was Comanche Chief Quanah Parker, and the Kiowa Chief Lone Wolf, and many others.

The last Indians I remember being at Doan's was in the fall of 1915. They camped at Doan's. They were on their way to Vernon, Texas, to perform at the fair held there. The monument also marks the Cattle Trail Crossing the Red River east of Doan's on their way to Kansas.

There wasn't many little children in Doan's when we came. The Coffees had a little girl, Texas. I liked to go to her house to play. She had such an unusual play house. It was the old street car that used to run in Vernon, Texas (I wish I had some date on it). The street car was run from the Depot on the north side of town to a hotel up town. It was pulled by a mule. When they left the hotel they hooked the mule on the north end of the street car, when they left the Depot, the mule was hooked on the south end of the street car. After the street car wasn't used Mr. Doan brought it to Doan's (Crossing) for Texas to have a play house.

I have a lot of fond memories of my life at Doan's. Lots of folks have come and gone over the past 85 years. I hope there will always be an adobe at this old historical place.

To my children, grand children, great grand children, and great-great grandchildren, I dedicate this letter of memories.

As the years go by and each of you are older, I hope you will enjoy this as much as I have enjoyed bringing it to you.

Be aware of wildfire threat during hunting season

COLLEGE STATION, Texas With hunting season under way and some areas of the state still recovering from last year's drought, Texas Forest Service officials are urging caution for those heading outdoors.

Hunters should refrain from building campfires and burning debris during windy or dry conditions. More than 90 Texas counties currently are under a burn ban. Keep in mind the following wildfire safety tips:

· If there is no burn ban in place and conditions are right, you may safely build a campfire. But keep the fire small, never leave it unattended and remove flammable leaves and other materials from the area surrounding the fire. · Make sure the fire is extinguished and cold to the touch before you leave it. · Clear combustible materials and vegetation away from your camp house to reduce the likelihood of a wildfire to spread. Keep water nearby when welding on stands. · Drive only on designated trails. Don't park or idle vehicles in tall, dry grass, which can be ignited by contact with a hot muffler. · Use caution with cigarettes and matches. · Use spark arresters on all power equipment.

Cattle Trails Cow-Calf Conference

A cattle industry recovering from the drought will be the focus of the Cattle Trails Cow-Calf Conference, a joint effort between Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service and the Oklahoma Cooperative Extension Service, to be held Jan. 15 in Lawton, Okla.

This annual conference provides cow-calf producers the most up-to-date information on topics that influence cattle profits, said Stan Bevers, AgriLife Extension economist in Vernon,

The slogan of the conference is "driving your cattle to profits," although Bevers said the last couple of years have made it tough to generate any profit.

The conference, which alternates between Texas and Oklahoma each year, will be from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Comanche County Coliseum, 920 South Sheridan, in Lawton. Registration is \$25 per person and includes educational materials, a noon meal and refreshments.

The keynote speaker for the event will be Garrett King, agricultural liaison for U.S. Rep. Frank Lucas from Oklahoma. Lucas is the current House Ag**COWPOKES**

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riculture Committee chairman. King will provide a farm bill and congressional update from Lucas' office.

Improvement in the moisture situation has created some optimism with ranchers, Bevers said. But before any restocking of cattle takes place, the condition of their pastures should be assessed.

Two speakers will address pasture conditions and recovery, he said. Jack LeClair, Du-Pont Crop Protection range and pasture specialist, Saint Jo, Texas, will cover drought recovery and invasive weeds. Dr. Bob Gillen, Western Kansas Agricultural Research Centers department head at Hays, Kan., will cover the impact of drought on the Southern Plains grassland.

Traits and tools for retention

and replacement of beef females will be discussed by Dr. Megan Rolf, Oklahoma Cooperative Extension beef cattle management specialist, Stillwater, Okla.

Dr. Dan Hale, AgriLife Extension meat specialist, College Station, Texas, will give participants a virtual packing plant tour to close out the meeting.

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

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
