

Humble Terminates Matadors Lease

A LEASE AGREEMENT made more than a quarter of a century ago between the former Matador Land & Cattle Co. and Humble Oil & Refining Co. is going to be terminated. The lease involved more than 400,000 acres in five West Texas Counties of Motley, Floyd, Dickens, Crosby and Cottle.

Humble is releasing all lease claims to Toreador Royalty Corporation of Dallas, the Tribune has learned on reliable authority.

The lease between the Matadors and Humble was identical to lease between the oil company and King Ranch. The lease was perpetuated indefinitely by drilling one well each year. Humble has drilled 55 wells on the Matadors in the 26 years which more than double their agreement.

At the time the King Ranch lease was made, there was no oil development in the great area. Humble developed the ranch and the managers of the Matadors 26 years ago hoped that the same development might result here.

The fact that Humble has completed its drilling program and released all claims on the lease, does not mean that they will cease seeking development in the area in the future when they wish to drill a test, they will lease from Toreador.
