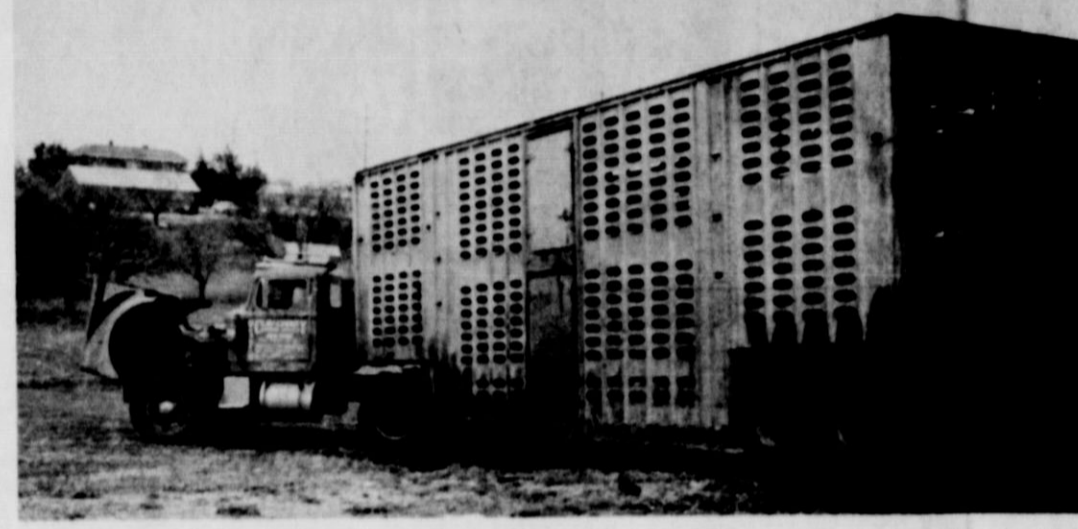

## Captain Pipkin Home From Asia

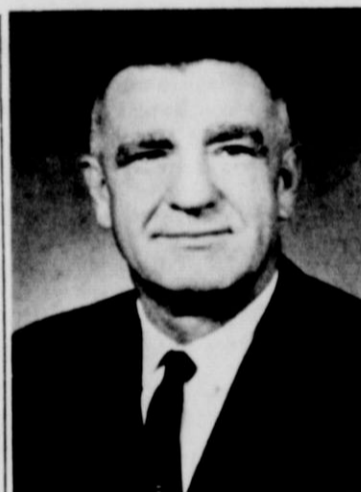

## Stock Ready For Exhibit

SOME PARENTS who have sons and daughters entering cattle and swine in the 30th Annual Motley County Junior Livestock Show, were once themselves entering projects. Approximately 50 youngsters will enter projects here Saturday when the exhibit is held at the school agriculture building. County Agent Bill Palmeyer said 31 steers and about 40 swine are scheduled for showing. No prizes will be offered in the heifer class which is slated for about 10 head on exhibit. Hartsel Ash of Throckmorton, will serve as auctioneer after the show, as the bidding on animals is started. Trophies to be awarded may be seen in the Bob Stanley Pharmacy window.

## Show Prizes Same as 1969

ONE CONTESTANT in the show will exhibit five steers, but the majority will show only one or two animals. FFA boys and 4-H boys and girls will enter projects. The show is sponsored by the Motley County Livestock Association. All animals must be weighed between 7:30 and 9:30 a.m. Saturday at the show barn. Sows and heifers need not be weighed.

The show will start with swine judging at 10 a.m. The judge will be Milton Mann, Vo-Ag instructor at Clarendon. Class order will be: Open gilts (min. 150 lbs.); bred gilts (min. 150 lbs.); sows; Grand Champion breeding hog; light market hogs (190-210 lbs.); med. market hogs (211-230 lbs.); heavy market hogs (231-250 lbs.) and Grand Champion hog.

Beef classes judging will start at 1:30 p.m. The judge will be Billy Roach, County Agent of Snyder, who will start with the heifer class. Heifers will be placed in a pen and identified by number. They need not be halter broke but must be from 12 to 18 months of age. The limit is two entries for anyone living in the county or owning land in Motley County. No prize money will be awarded in this class, with the top three animals awarded trophies, and ribbons awarded for the 4th through 8th place.

The steer classes will start with light steers; medium steers, heavy steers and Grand Champion steer. Sale of 15 top steers and market hogs will follow immediately. Bids will be in dollars and anyone wishing to keep the animal purchased, must also pay the floor bid.

Trophies are provided by: steer, VFW; breeding hog, Eternas Study Club; market hog, Wylie Petroleum Co., Floydada; Grand Champion heifer, American Legion; reserve champion heifer, Bob Stanley Pharmacy; 3rd place heifer Floydada Seed & Delinting Co.

Only owner-exhibitors are eligible for showmanship awards in the beef and swine classes, with the awards provided by the Rolling Plains Production Credit Association.

Cash prizes are: Steers: Grand Champion \$35, Reserve \$20. First prize \$25; 2nd \$20; 3rd \$15; 4th \$10; 5th \$8; 6th \$7; 7th \$6 and 8th \$5. Others \$2.50.

In the swine classes: Grand Champion \$15 and reserve \$10. 1st \$9; 2nd \$7.50; 3rd \$6; 4th \$4.50; 5th \$3.50; 6th \$3; 7th \$2.50; 8th \$2.00; others \$1.50. Special prizes are offered by the American Angus Assn., United Duroc Assn., Hampshire Registry and Poland China Record Association, if champions meet breed show requirements.

Ballots will be available during the show for the election of three officers of the Motley County Livestock Association, whose terms are expiring. They are: Lewis Bostick of Matador, Bill Hand of Roaring Springs and Ronald Clay of Flomot, L. B. (Bundy) Campbell is President, Herb Martin of Flomot is vice-president, Bostick is secretary and Hand is recorder. Banty Brandon of Roaring Springs is a director. Bill Moss, Matador FFA advisor and County Agent Palmeyer are show advisors.

### Mrs. Eleanor Griffin is Speaker At Future Homemakers Meeting

 The Matador Future Homemakers of America met Wednesday, March 25 in the high school auditorium. Mrs. Fair complimented the girls on their excellent conduct at the Area Meeting and for bringing cookies to send to the High Plains Training Center. Laura Jacobs, 1st Vice President, introduced the guest speaker, Mrs. Eleanor Griffin, Director of the High Plains Training Center in Plainview. The center, which serves eight counties, provides a day school for children who need help with mental retardation. Although there are facilities for only 60 students, the school now has an enrollment of 96 and is continually admitting new students. Mrs. Griffin finds it difficult to refuse service to anyone needing help, commenting, "Facilities don't matter. It is what goes on in those facilities." Mrs. Griffin related some of her experiences with children that seemed hopeless to society. One child first learned how to hold out his hand, then smile and progressed from there. As director she says, "Every child can learn. Our staff is there to work with and for those children. We see miracles almost daily at the center." The Training Center is a school containing three departments—nursery, pre-kindergarten, and kindergarten. In recent years, mental institutions have been "humanized." As few as 25 years ago a mental in-

stitution was shunned and facilities were very undesirable. "That is all changed, thank God!" said Mrs. Griffin. Because mental health is the nation's number one problem, emphasis has been placed upon it. Today bright, gay colors are used in rooms with spotless workers. Every child is given an opportunity to learn and develop. Factors which contribute to the making of an individual in the center are environmental care, teaching, help and medication.

In Texas there are 330,000 retardates and 1,500 on the waiting lists for schools. The best remedy for this problem is to learn to take care of the child at home. Instead of sending retardates away to an institution, they need to be kept at home where they can receive the help of parents, friends, and the community.

### Bookkeeping Class Makes Field Trip

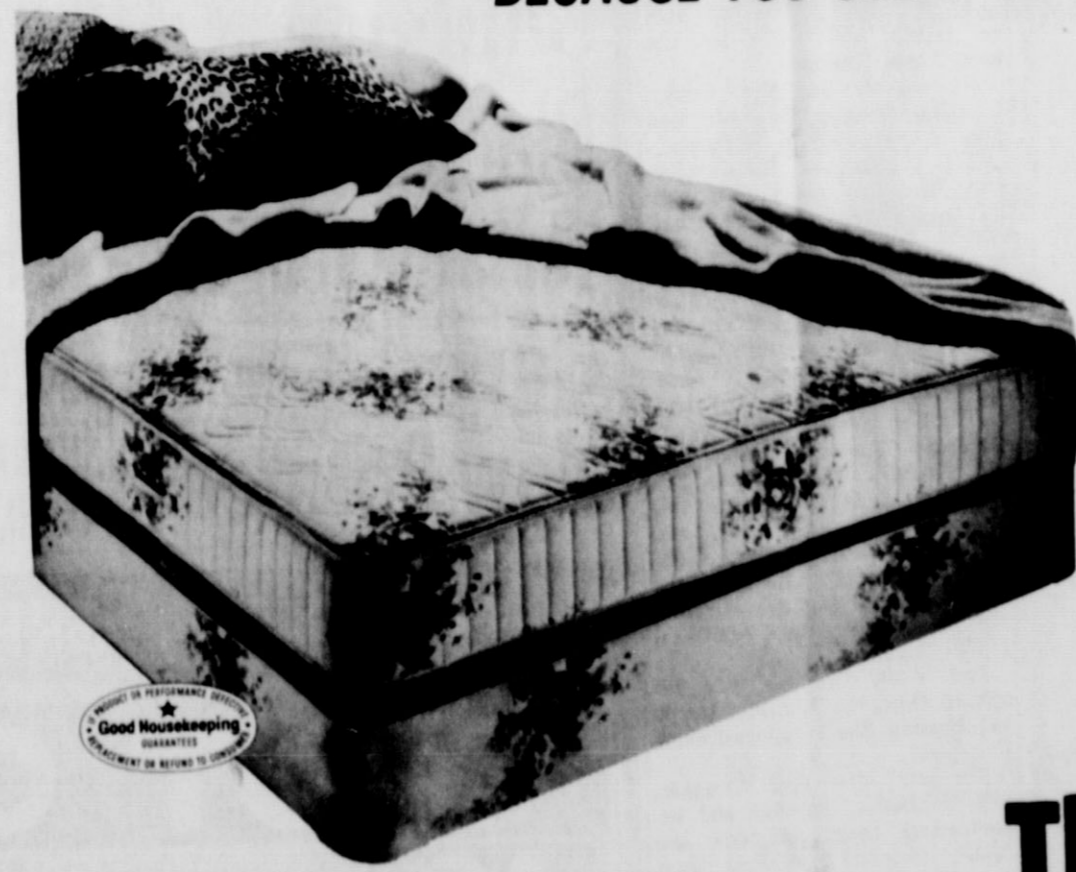

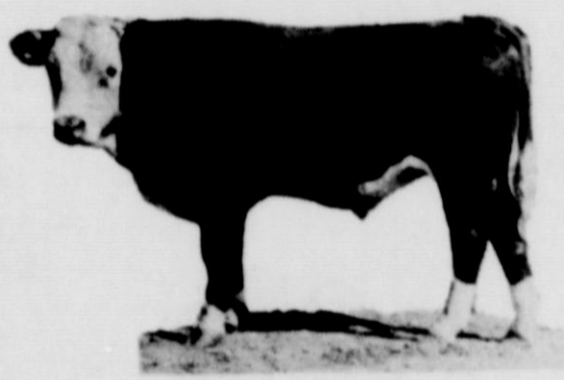

## Elbert Reeves Is Named 1969 Conservation Teacher

Elbert Reeves, teacher in the Floydada Junior High School, has been named Conservation Teacher for Floyd County by the Floyd County Soil and Water Conservation District. Gilbert Fawver, chairman of the board, announced that Reeves' outstanding work in teaching students about America's natural resources encouraged the district to name him as outstanding teacher for 1969.

Fawver also announced that a record of Reeves' teaching accomplishments has been submitted to the Texas Conservation Awards Program which is sponsored by the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce to be judged for regional and state honors.

Reeves was born in Motley County, Texas at the turn of the century. His boyhood had an impact on his philosophy of teaching conservation of natural resources. He stated there were very few conveniences and everything was done the hard way. "We lived very close to the soil and watched many changes take place from year to year until they were replaced by less desirable grasses and weeds," Reeves said. He continued, "I have seen wildlife disappear, never to return. During my early youth cottonwood trees were black with roosting wild turkey and antelope roamed the grasslands. Hunters came and stayed for weeks and of course decimated the wild game birds and other wildlife. All of these changes, too numerous to mention, made quite an impact on me as a youth who just could not understand why laws were not in effect to save our resources."

While attending college, Reeves said, "I took every course possible that would enlighten me on what was causing these changes, mostly for the worse. At last we came into the age of machinery and tools that man could use to save his precious top soil. In the early days people always dreaded the early spring since that was the season of sandstorms and I mean sandstorms. A four barbed wire fence could be completely covered in just a few days around sand farms. People began to buy land and moved into the country. The first thing they did was put the grasslands to the state of wanton destruction. Land that should never been plowed was turned into blowing areas that ruined the entire country. The dust bowl was born. It was one of the worst things that ever happened to the natural resources of the United States. Finally local soil conservation districts were formed with technical help from the USDA-Soil Conservation Service to assist farmers and ranchers in controlling their soil and water ero-

sion problems. Many good things have been accomplished, but the work must continue."

Reeves stated that the answers that he sought did not materialize until many, many years later. "The youth of today are no exception. The standard of living in the United States is the highest in the world. The blessings of nature are the foundations of America's greatness," stated Reeves. "Without our natural resources this vast continent might today be still inhabited by skin-clad Indians."

Reeves went on to say that the future of our nation lies in the hands of those who will govern these natural resources in the years to come—our young people who are in school today.

They will bear a heavy responsibility to generations yet unborn for the manner in which they will utilize and conserve (or dissipate or waste) our natural resources. "Young people are not born with an innate appreciation of the importance of the wise use and conservation of resources which to them are seemingly inexhaustible to their young minds." These values simply must be taught, said Reeves. If just one boy or girl in a hundred can get the message you may be sure that this valuable work will continue for a long time. In brief Reeves stated that he hoped that the youth of today will not have to witness what he experienced during his youth. We do not have enough time to correct our errors and their errors to continue to be a strong nation.

Reeves said, "every science teacher should make room for a unit or several units in conservation in our curriculum since this very easily could mean our survival! There are so many ways that conservation may be presented without seeming to preach on the subject. Every film, film strip, reference book or any other means should be employed. The Floydada Junior High School is now doing this. The material used for a class in science is solely an activity period. It is not a solid course used for graduation but presented solely for the purpose of giving in depth study to many important areas not covered by a science course. The student must make a B or better average in order to be enrolled in the class. The course is designed to include mathematics, Chemistry, electricity, motors, gas and electric and many other activities with the unit on conservation incorporated that a young student may be able to appreciate his heritage and encourage others to participate.

Reeves stated that several things are studied and understood in the conservation unit. Some of these are ecology—meaning, to develop the under-

standing that man profits most when he understands and complies with natural laws, conservation as an individual responsibility, study of laws relating to soil conservation districts, things needed to gain support of all people for soil and water conservation and others.

Outside speakers such as Jon La Baume with the local Soil Conservation Service are used to explain and show films on soil, water, plant conservation that will keep the land in top shape for future generations. Other films from state and federal agencies are used in wildlife, pollution and many other things that affect our lives.

Reeves firmly believes that youth must be taught an appreciation of the importance of the wise use of our natural resources without which they and future generations would not continue to enjoy the high standard of living which should be their birthright.

This is why the directors of the Floyd County Soil and Water Conservation District has selected him for this honor—Conservation Teacher 1969.
