## New Microloans expand small farm finance options

## FSA to help beginning and small farmers

Floyd County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Farm Loan Manager Becky V. Rainer, announced that beginning farmers and ranchers in Texas now have a new Microloan credit option to consider. On Jan. 17, FSA started offering Microloans which are designed to help farmers and ranchers with credit needs of \$35,000 or less. The loan features a streamlined application process built to fit the needs of beginning and the smallest of family farmers and ranchers.

"The microloan application process is simpler and requires less paperwork than traditional operating loans," said Rainer. "This loan program will also be useful to specialty crop producers and operators of community supported agriculture," she said.

In 2012, the Farm Service Agency provided \$196.4 million in farm loan assistance to agricultural producers of all sizes in Texas. That year, operating loans accounted for the majority of the loans extended totaling \$129.4 million, while more than \$61 million. In 2012,

\$5.7 million in emergency loans were made to producers in Texas recovering from natural disasters.

"The current interest rate for Microloans is 1.25 percent and the maximum term for microloans is seven years," according to Rainer. "Producers can contact their local FSA farm loan office for details about the Microloan Program."

Microloans can be used to pay for initial start-up expenses such as hoop houses to extend the growing season, essential tools, irrigation, delivery vehicles and annual expenses such as seed, fertilizer, utilities, land rents and marketing and distribution expenses. As financing needs increase, applicants can apply for an operating loan up to the maximum amount of \$300,000 or obtain financing from a commercial lender under FSA's

Guaranteed Loan Program. In response to tighter financial markets, USDA has expanded the availability of farm credit, helping farmers obtain loans across the U.S. Since 2009, USDA has provided more than farm ownership loans totaled 128,000 loans to family farmers totaling more than \$18 billion. In Texas, more than 70 percent of the loans went to beginning and socially disadvantaged farmers and ranchers.

## Planning meeting for Southern Rolling Plains **Prescribed Burn Association**

There will be a meeting from 10:00 AM until 4:00 PM on Wednesday, February 13, 2013 in Aspermont, Texas at the Stonewall County Activity Center (directly west of the courthouse) to officially form the Southern Rolling Plains Prescribed Burn Association. If interested in becoming a member, please plan to attend. We will begin speaker Butch Taylor, the greater damage to property terward, there will be a brief discussion about insurance coverages available to individuals and associations. The majority of the day, however, will be spent on the nuts and bolts of our PBA including establishing a first draft of bylaws and nominating officers.

This PBA will be modeled after other existing PBAs in Texas (see http://pbatexas. org), but will be tailored to the unique local needs of the communities that it will serve. The intent is to fill a gap in an 18-county area nestled between the existing North Central Texas PBA to the east, the Texas Panhandle PBA to the north, the edge of the High Plains to the west, and the I-20 corridor to the south. Counties involved include Baylor, Borden, Cottle, Crosby, Dickens, Fisher, Foard, Garza, Hardeman, Haskell, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Motley, Scurry, Stonewall, and Wilbarger.

Given the extreme nature of the 2011 fire season, as well as

> While a Texas landowner has the right to utilize prescribed fire under the law, they often lack the experience or confidence to carry out the burns without technical help. This is where PBAs can help. PBAs are organized landowner cooperatives that are user owned, controlled, and operated. PBAs share knowledge, experience, and equipment among contributing members to increase the application and safety of prescribed fire as a management tool. The primary benefits to landowners are these:

- Support of a locally led and run organization of neighbors helping neighbors,

- Reduced costs of fire management,

- Reduced risk through in-

ment, training, and technical assistance,

- Community support and assistance,

- Ability to get more prescribed burning done on your land and the satisfaction of helping your neighbors do the same.




