## Firm Celebrating 25th Anniversary

A QUARTER of a century ago this week R. M. (Bob) Stanley purchased the City Drug Store from the late G. S. (Doc) Craven. Now Bob Stanley Pharmacy is celebrating its silver anniversary of continuous operation in this community.

Matador has changed a great amount since the first time Bob Stanley saw it in 1936 when he came here to visit his brother, Dr. J. S. Stanley, who had located here the previous year. He remembers that the streets were not paved and that a large concrete-based post was in the center of Main and Dundee Streets, which had a single light at the top.

After his purchase of the City Drug Store, he operated the store under that name for about two years, then changed the name to Stanley Pharmacy. After Doctor Stanley built the Stanley Hospital there was some confusion and the name was changed to Bob Stanley Pharmacy.

Original location was across the street in the Barkley Building. After the courthouse burned, the county used the present Bob Stanley Pharmacy location as a courthouse, until the courthouse was built. Later J. M. Jackson acquired the property and improved the building. The pharmacy moved to the building about 1953.

The Bob Stanleys moved here from Lockhart, where he had been employed 3 1/2 years by the Corner Drug as pharmacist. Their two sons, Fred and James attended school and grew to manhood here. Fred was 11 years of age when his parents moved here and James was nearly five. Fred, who operates a drug store in Mt. Vernon, finished his senior year at San Marcos Baptist Academy. James graduated from high school here. Both graduated from Southwestern University School of Pharmacy at Weatherford, Okla. James is presently associated with his father here in the operation of the store. Mrs. Stanley has also been active in the business during the years they have been here.

## Hope for Medicare Crushed in Letter

A MONUMENT to the stupidity of bureaucracy, the Motley General Hospital will close its doors Saturday. The modern and completely equipped facility has received its final blow from the Dallas regional office of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

The following excerpt is the first paragraph in a letter to the hospital board: "We regret to inform you that your facility does not meet the requirements for participation in the Health Insurance program for the aged program (Title XVIII) of the Social Security Act." The letter was signed by Mrs. Martha A. McSteen, Regional representative.

The hospital board called a special emergency meeting in the hospital Tuesday afternoon, and the announcement was made that the closing would be Saturday, October 17th.

The board said the personnel would be paid two weeks in advance. The utilities will be continued and the laboratory and X-ray facilities will be continued with Don Seigler in charge.

The hospital board had continued to keep the hospital open in the hopes that approval for Medicare would be made. It was explained that the operation had been on borrowed funds from next year's taxes. It is impossible for a hospital to operate with the present required high standards, without the support of Medicare.

The fate of Motley General Hospital may be the same awaiting other small hospitals. The requirements placed by state and national administrators may be so rigid that many small hospitals will be forced to close their doors.

At present four bills are declared pending in Washington to restore the less than 50-bed hospital to a position of participation in the Medicare program.

The situation here is that the Motley General Hospital can not be reopened unless it has assured Medicare approval.

## Effort Being Made To Restore TV Use

A GROUP of interested citizens is attempting to restore service to the former Matador Translators Company tower in the Foothills west of Matador, which was discontinued last week.

The First State Bank here is owner of the facility. John L. Barnhill, executive vice-president of the bank said the operation has been losing money continuously.

He said he had offered to allow the use of the tower to a local group provided the bank would no longer be responsible for any obligations.

A group of former users, many from the rural or fringe area, met Tuesday afternoon in the District Court room to discuss the problem and possible solution. Meeting with the group was Bob Tipps of Canadian, who has provided service to the tower and has had experience in operation.

A pilot organization was set up, with Edgar Lee as President. A second meeting was held yesterday in the office of County Judge Forrest Campbell.

An organization, to be known as the Motley County TV Association was set up, with the following plan:

Those financially able will pay \$50 in advance for one year's service. Those unable to pay the full amount, will pledge \$5 per month and allow a check to be drawn on their accounts each month.

The money will be held in escrow until \$5,000 is collected, the amount needed for one year's operation. In event service should be discontinued, unused portions will be refunded to subscribers.

A group of volunteer workers will canvass the entire area served by the tower, in an effort to collect as much in money and pledges as possible. It is hoped that the response will be such that the tower can be placed back in service in the future.

## Silver Taps Held At A&M Honoring Robt. Overstreet

Silver Taps were held recently at A&M University, College Station, for Robert Edgar Overstreet, graduate student in animal science, who died in an automobile accident this summer. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Overstreet of the Matador, Floydada area.

A scholarship fund in his honor has been started by his friends. An editorial in The Battalion, student publication, titled "Students Deserve Praise," described the scene: "Last night was a rainy, dark night. School had just begun. Yet, we saw a good many students present at the ceremony. There were cadets, civilians and coeds. Some had umbrellas, but many stood in the rain and got soaked. They knew they would, but they attended anyway."

"For those new to the campus, Silver Taps is the Aggie's way of paying last respects to those who have died while enrolled as students here. The day Silver Taps is to be held, a notice is posted on the flagpole in front of the Academic Building, and the flag is flown at half-staff. That night at 10:30, all lights in student living areas are extinguished, and students silently walk over to the area in front of the Academic Building.

"The Ross Volunteer (an elite corps organization) Firing Squad marches over, and fires a 21-gun salute. Members of the Aggie Band play Taps three times, and students return quietly to their rooms.

"Again, we think those students who placed a higher value on attendance than on keeping dry are to be commended, and we hope this tradition will continue as long as A&M exists."

## Tarleton State Names New Dean

STEPHENVILLE, Tex. (Special) Dr. Leo Purvis who was superintendent of schools at Roaring Springs from 1948-52, was named this week Dean of the School of Education at Tarleton State College. Dr. William O. Trogdon, college president announced.

The appointment was approved Tuesday by the Texas A. & M. board of directors at its September meeting.

A native of Atwell, Callahan County, he was graduated from Scranton High School. He earned a bachelors degree from Howard Payne College, a master's degree from North Texas State University, and was awarded his doctorate from Texas Tech in 1961.

He began his public school career as a classroom teacher in Bronte in 1940 and was later principal of Vernon's Northside High School and Crowell High School. Purvis was also superintendent at Petersburg and Eagle Mountain (Saginaw) high schools.

Before joining the Tarleton faculty in 1967, he taught at Decatur Junior College, Hardin-Simmons University and Stephen F. Austin.

He was named head of the Education and Psychology Department at Tarleton in 1968.

He and his wife, the former Louise Russum have three children.

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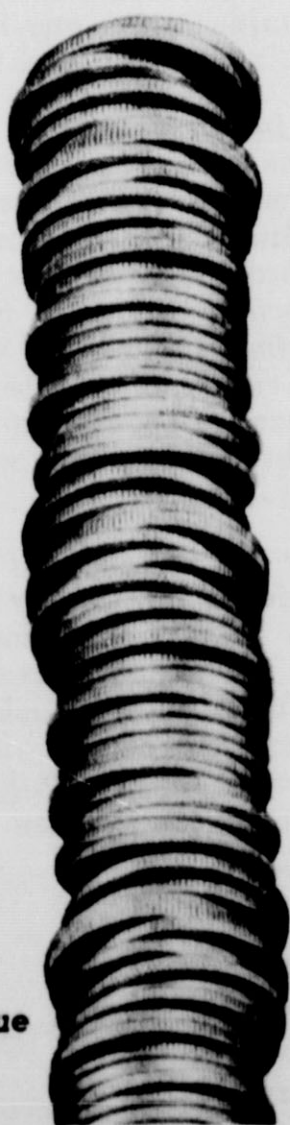

Jim Dobbins is the oldest man who was born in the Northfield community and still living there, while Mrs. Pete Timmons (Fay Simpson), is the oldest woman

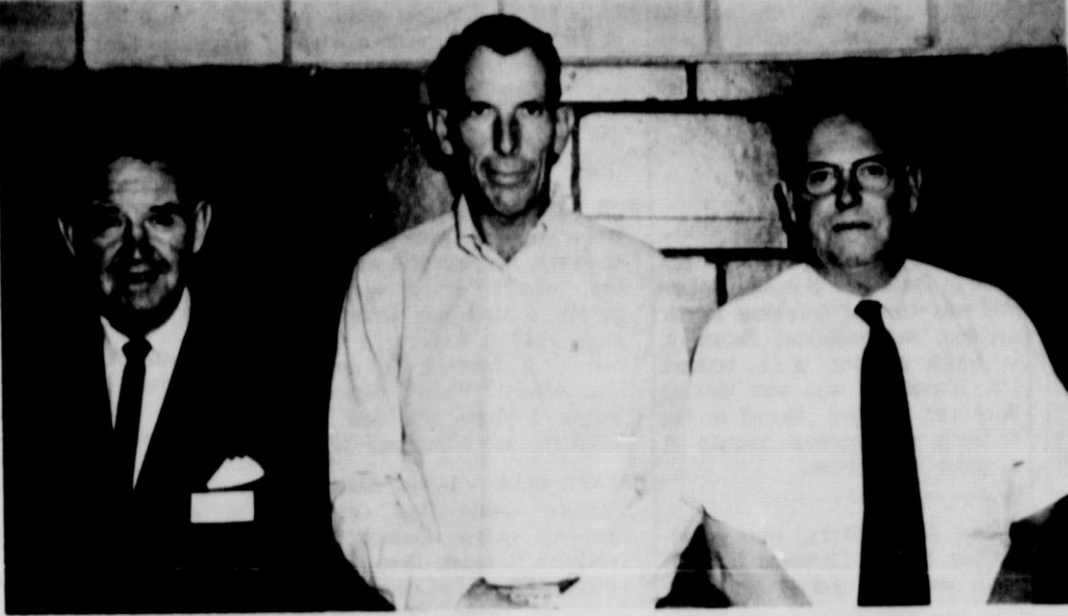

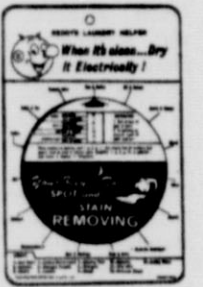
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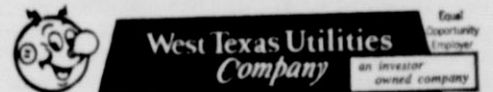
