Leigh Ann plans to attend Texas Tech University in the Fall.



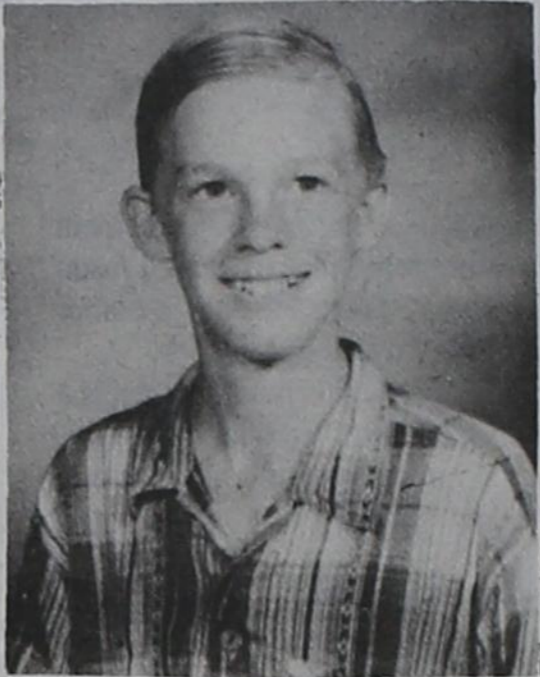

Motley County Commissioners Discuss County Business

The Motley County Commissioners met for regular session, Monday, May 13. Judge Laverna Price opened with the invocation.

Motley County Clerk read the minutes of the April Court.

Bills were read and approved after two were discussed and paid out of the Lateral Road Fund. It was voted to pay for grater blades out of the Lateral Fund. Commissioners discussed at length how to pay the concrete bill on the bridge work in Precinct 1. Motion was made to pay concrete bills out of the Lateral Fund. This passed. Commissioner Russell estimated the costs of the bridge at \$10,000.

Reports were read and approved from the Treasurer, Tax Collector, County Agent, Library and the JP. JP reported collecting April fines of \$1,041.00.

According to a State Law employees with CDL license's are required to comply with substance abuse program and testing to keep liability insurance coverage. The Court will have to pay \$465.00 for the tests. The court agreed to comply with this program and take the training provided for this fee with Compliance Plus.

Judge Price reported on the board meeting of West Texas Rural Counties Association (WTRCA) held in Coleman April 30.

Commissioner Hughes asked for input on part of the roofing in progress on the Courthouse. He gave an update on the progress to date.

Bids were opened and read on renovation of the inside of the Courthouse. This work will not be done until after the roof repairs are completed. Bids were received from Joe Meredith Construction Co. of Roaring Springs and Phillip D. Moore of Harry Fry Construction Co. Inc. of Lubbock. No action was taken.

Meeting adjourned.

The City Council of Matador met Thursday, May 9 for regular session.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Gary Lancaster with Seven Alexander reading the minutes. The Council approved the bills and minutes.

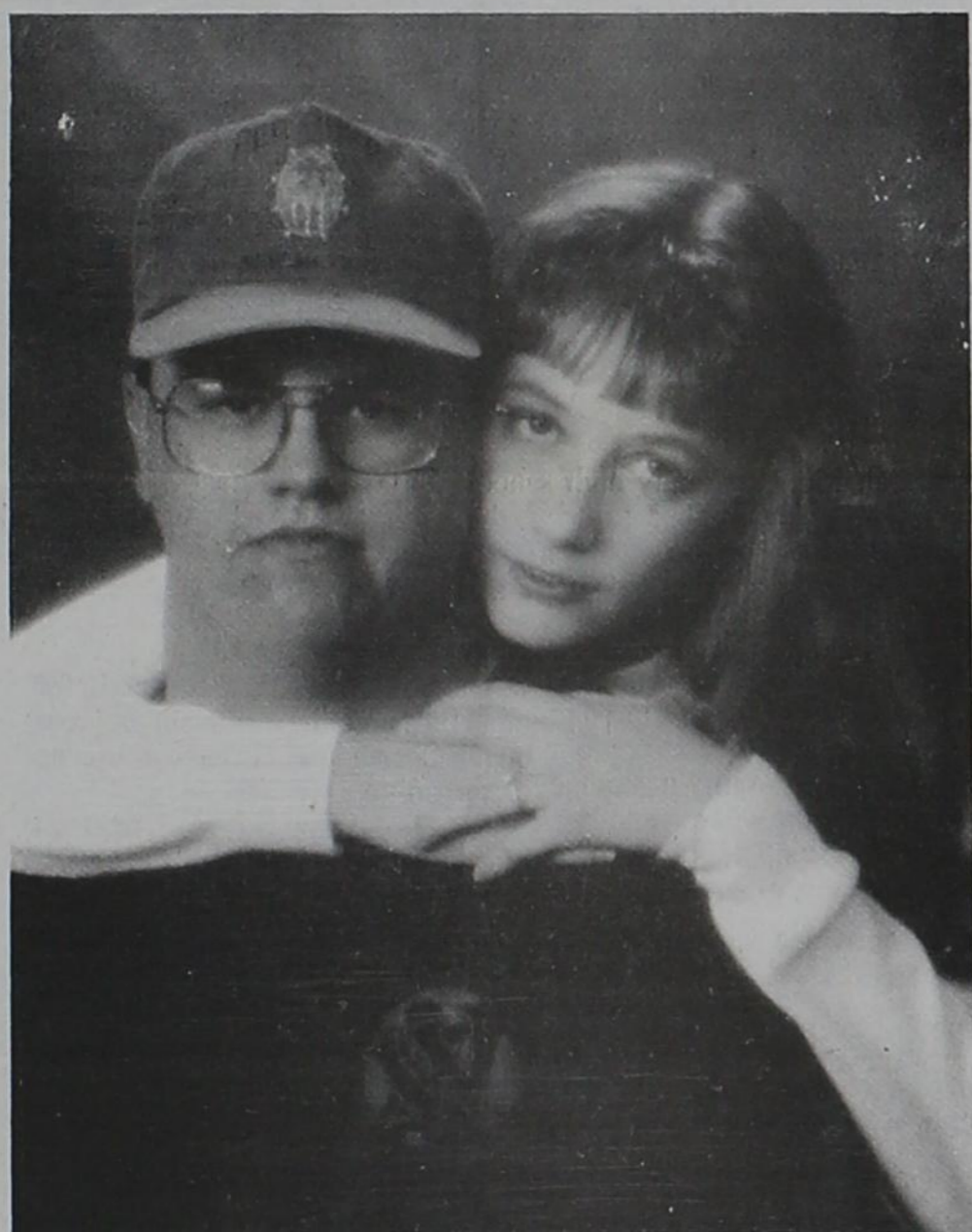

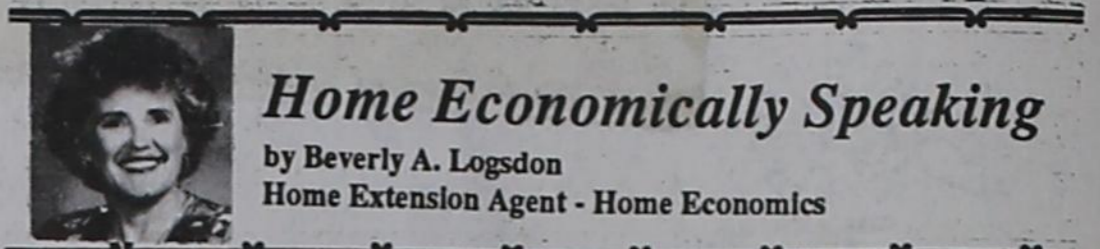

THE CHANGING AMERICAN DIET - EATING LESS FAT
Americans are eating less fat as a percentage of total calories, according to a new U.S. Department of Agriculture nationwide food survey.

Data from the first year (1994) of the three year survey -- "What We Eat In America" -- found that Americans consumed 33 percent of calories from fat in 1994, continuing a downward trend. In the late 1970's, Americans consumed 34 percent of calories from fat.

Even with this decrease, however, two-thirds of adults still eat more than the 30 percent recommended limit for fat calories. The survey also found that nearly as many are consuming more than the recommended limit for saturated fatty acids.

The American Heart Association as well as other health organizations recommend that no more than 30 percent of the calories come from fat with less from saturated fatty acids found in tropical oils and animal fats and polyunsaturated fatty acids found in soy, corn, safflower and cottonseed oils. The remainder is made up of monounsaturated fatty acids found in olive, peanut and caonla oils.

That means consumers will need to read more labels to determine the amount of fat and the types of fatty acids found in various products. Also, they can read levels to determine if other ingredients are found in the products ordinarily containing fat.

People may begin seeing new food products made with the new fat substitute Olestra recently approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA).

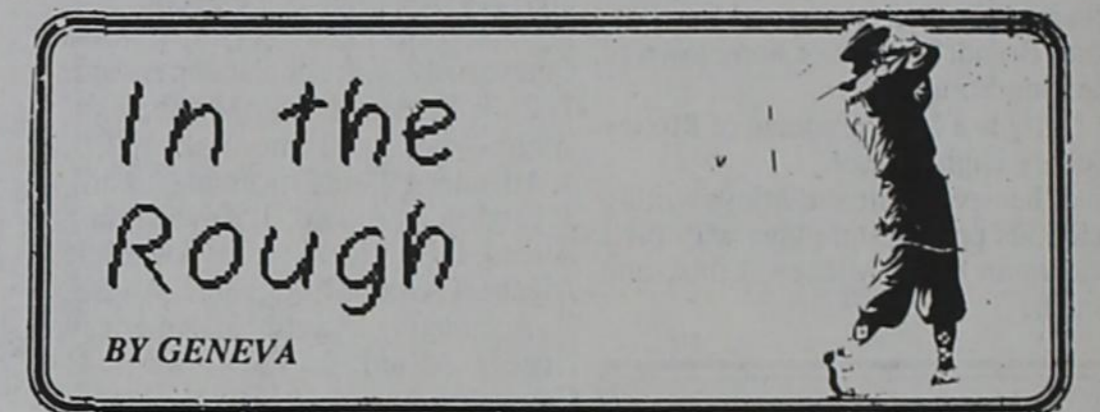
The calorie-free fat-replacer olestra will be used in salted snacks and crackers and will require that Olestra-containing products be fortified with vitamins A, D, E, and K. Potato chips, crackers, tortilla chips or other snacks made with Olestra will be lower in fat and calories than snacks made with traditional recipes using fat.

The FDA has found some drawbacks to this new fat substitute. Olestra is a much larger molecule than fat so it is not absorbed through the intestinal wall as is fat. Therefore, olestra may cause abdominal cramping and loose stools. Olestra inhibits the absorption of some vitamins (the fat soluble vitamins A, D, E, and K) and other nutrients. These gastrointestinal effects do not have medical consequences. Olestra absorbs fat-soluble vitamins (vitamins A, D, E, and K) from foods eaten at the same time as Olestra-containing products.

Whatever choice you make to reduce your fat intake, eat a variety of foods and in moderation following the U.S. Department of Agriculture Food Guide Pyramid to help you attain and maintain balance in your food selection. Try to reduce your total fat consumption by increasing your selections of grains, cereals, vegetables and fruits. So eat fats sparingly.



Beef Cattle SPA Workshop To Be Held

Vernon -- With the current situation in the cattle industry, it is imperative that cow-calf operators know how their operation is performing from both a production and financial standpoint. To assist ranchers in completing this analysis, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is offering a Cow-calf Standardized performance Analysis (SPA) Workshop to be held at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center located south of Vernon. The course will be May 21-22, 1996 and will begin at 8:00 a.m. on Tuesday. This will be a working workshop where the ranchers will be assisted in completing their own analysis. SPA provides ranchers an opportunity to analyze their ranch operation from both a production and financial side. SPA facilitates the comparison of an operation's performance between years, producers, production regions, and production systems. SPA is intended to be used as an

annual tool by the cow-calf producer. This is an intensive workshop with the intent being ranchers completing the analysis for the 1995 calf crop. Registered operators will be sent forms to organize data before the conference. Confidentiality of the producers data will be maintained. Individual conferences will be held with producers. Each ranch will be provided an assistant and a computer. It is important to register early so you can be advised on how to organize your data for the SPA analysis.

The registration fee is \$150 per ranch and includes the software, educational materials, meals and refreshments. Interested persons can obtain additional information or register by contacting Stan Bevers, Extension Economist, at the Texas A&M University Center in Vernon at (817) 552-9941.

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

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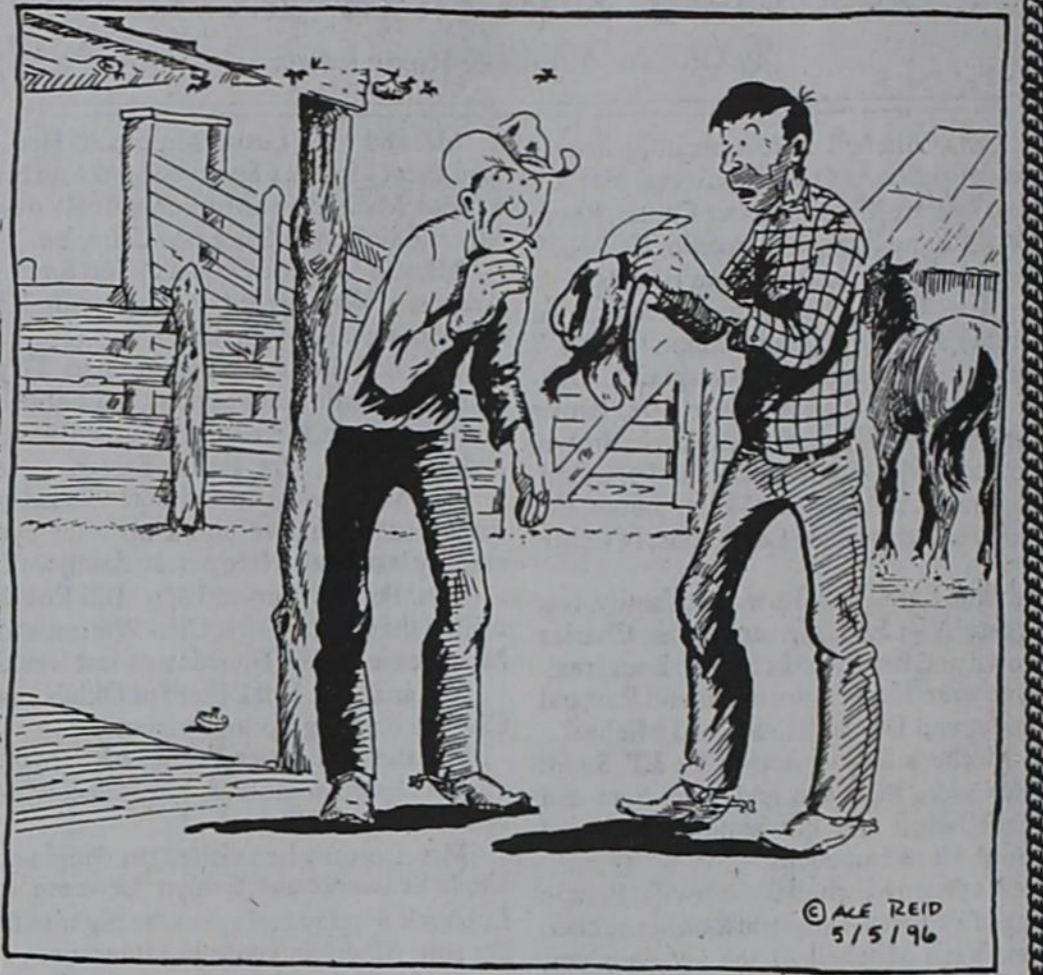
