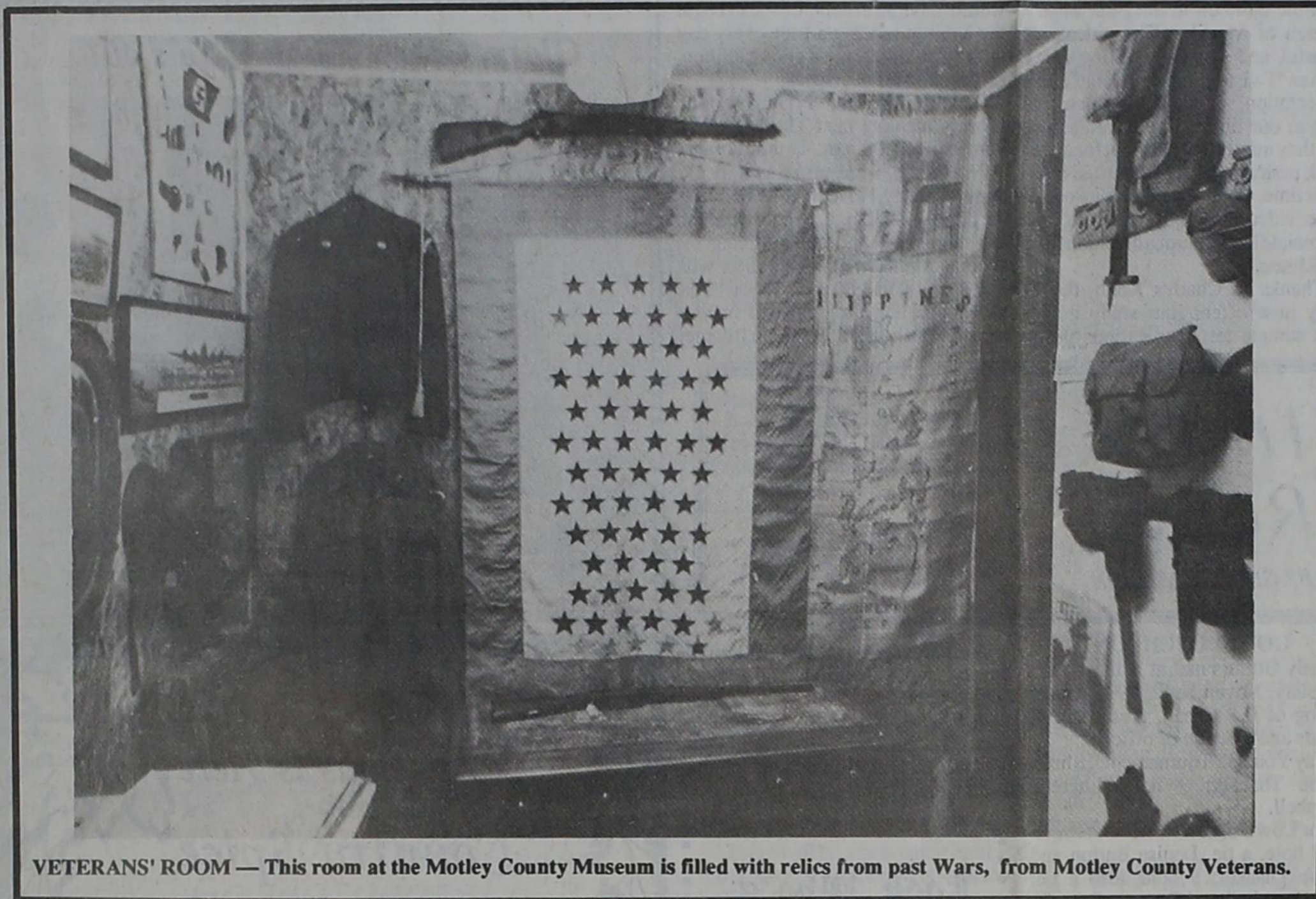

This Veterans Day we are thankful that the U.S. has not been involved in another major war this year.

But let us not forget to honor those who lost their lives in the wars of past years and those living who fought for their country.

A Veteran is any man or woman who has served in the armed forces either in time of war or peace.

The first Veteran's benefit on record was enacted by the Pilgrims of Plymouth Colony in 1626. It provided that any soldier injured in defense of the Colony "shall be maintained competently by the Colony during his life". In 1780 the Continental Congress granted half pay to any officer who served to the end of the Revolution.

In 1800 Congress authorized benefits for Veterans of the War of 1812, the Mexican War, Indian Wars, the American Civil War, the Spanish American War and the Philippine Insurrection. During the 1900's additional benefits were authorized for Veterans of the Boxer Rebellion, World War I, World War II, the Korean War, Vietnam and Gulf Storm wars.

So on November 11, we celebrate another Veterans Day and honor all those who gave their lives in battle, and give thanks for those who survived and earnestly pray and hope we will have many years of peace.

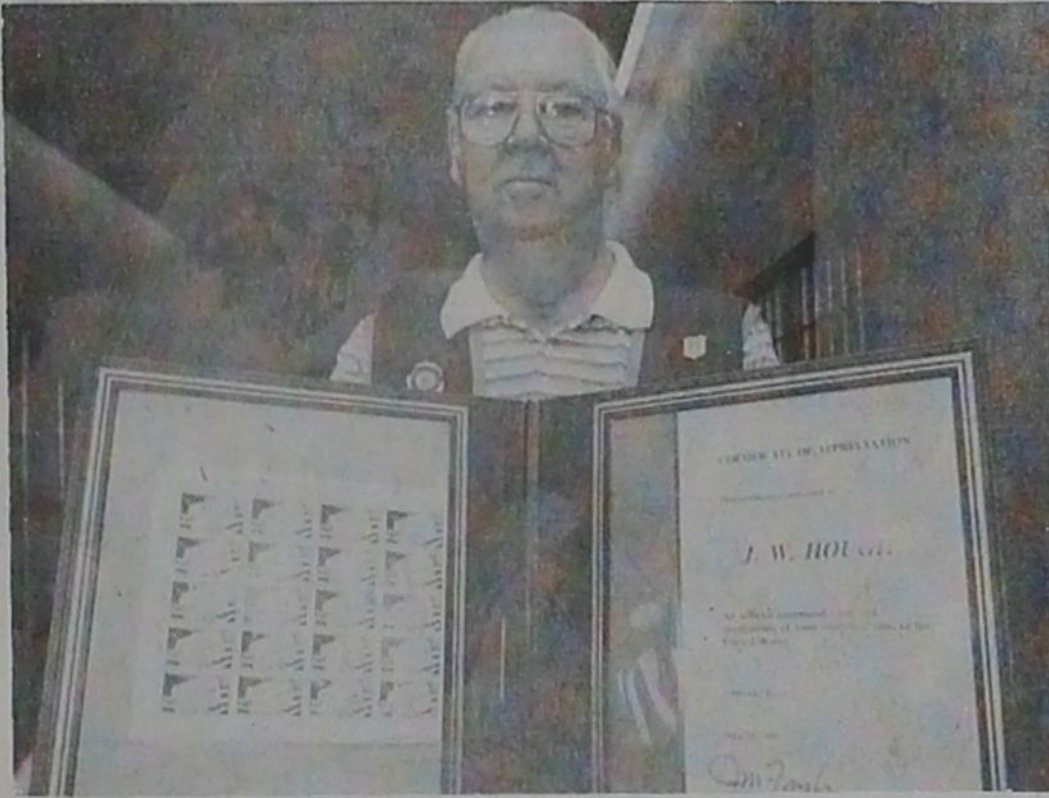
FAYE SLOVER

Stamp Honors Servicemen

The new postal stamp features a pair of dog tags with a fluttering American flag behind them. The dog

tags read, "POW & MIA NEVER FORGOTTEN."

Lubbock Postmaster John Frisby presented the Hub of the Plains Chapter of Ex-POW's with certificates

of appreciation and a framed page of stamps at a recognition ceremony

recently at the Monterey Post Office.

"We're here today (May 23, 1995) to honor those who fought in wars for our country," Frisby said.

The stamp went on sale Memorial Day in commemoration of POWs and MIAs from the Revolutionary War to America's military mission in Somalia.

It's only the second such stamp that the Postal Service has issued. The first read, "Honoring U.S. servicemen - Prisoners of War - Missing and Killed in Action."

The certificates stated: "Certificate of Appreciation. An official commendation and recognition of your contribution to the United States."

Most of the chapter members at the ceremony were veterans of World War II.

"I can't explain in words how I feel right now. Chapter member J.W. Hough said about the stamps and the certificates. "We love it."

"After being in a Japanese prisoners' camp, I have three years to blot out," Hough said. "I thank God for what they are doing."

"The more they can do, the better. They can never not do enough," said Vietnam veteran Emery C. Wall.

USDA Reorganization Completed

Effective October 1, 1995, the consolidation of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) and the Farmer Service Agency (FSA) has been completed. This consolidation was signed into law by President Clinton on October 13, 1994 as the Department of Agriculture Reorganization Act of 1994, Public Law 104-354.

Effective immediately, you may contact your local FSA Office, formally the ASCS Office, with regard to all programs formally offered by FmHA and ASCS. Assistance with loan programs, application processing, loan payments, and loan servicing are as close as your local FSA Service Center.

For Motley County producers that were previously serviced by the FmHA Office out of Spur in Dickens County,

they will now be serviced by the Motley County FSA Office located in Matador. The Motley County office will be supported by an Ag. Credit Team located in Memphis, Hall County, Molly Moffitt, Ag. Credit Manager in Hall County, is scheduled to be in Matador ever 2nd and 4th Wednesday of the month. You have the option of contacting them directly by calling (806) 259-3666 or visiting them in their office at 1002 W. Noel in Memphis. The FSA Staff in Motley County is currently learning the processes that go along with Farm Credit, and is working closing with the Farm Credit Team to ensure that service to you is timely and more convenient for you. There will always be someone in the office to take your call. All FSA Office hours are from 8:00 - 5:00.

Matadors Defeat Lorenzo

The Motley County Matadors kept their playoff hopes alive Friday night beating Lorenzo, 28-22, in an exciting

game. The Mats played a solid defensive game against one of the area's most productive offenses. It was a

solid team effort with every player making a big play at some time during the game. Motley County held the Hornets to only 77 yards passing and 183 yards rushing which is well below their season average.

One of the highlights of the game was the improved blocking of the offensive line. Brad Thacker, Quintin and Kyle Brandon, Joe Martin, Joe Mangram, and Lee Jones opened holes producing 291 yards rushing and four touchdowns. Jarrod Brooks ended the night with 132 yards rushing on 18 carries and 125 yards passing, scoring two touchdowns. Aaron Green rushed for 102 yards on 7 carries scoring a touchdown. Bobby Barton gained 57 yards on 13 carries and one touchdown. Kevin Keltz was the leading

receiver with 92 yards on 10 catches. Chad Lawrence, Tyler Decker, Kean Cruse, and Green had receptions to add to the total.

The Matadors will travel to Spur this Friday night. If Motley County should beat Spur (as plans are!), and Petersburg should beat Kress, there will be a three way tie for 2nd in District between Motley County, Kress, and Lorenzo. A flip of a coin will decide the outcome.

LACTASE OCCURS MOSTLY IN OLDER ADULTS

Some people are not able to drink more than one cup of milk in a day. They may have a problem with digesting or breaking down the natural sugar in milk.

The name of the sugar is "lactose". Lactase is a substance that is naturally present in the intestines that helps digest lactose. This is referred to as having a "lactase deficiency." Without enough lactase, you may have a problem with bloating, diarrhea, or intestinal cramps after drinking more than about a cup or so of milk.

This condition does not usually occur until a person is older because some people have less lactase as they grow older. Sometimes it also even develops (although usually temporarily) in babies in relation to a viral infection treated with antibiotics. The condition is most common among all races other than those whose ancestors were from northern Europe.

Most people can drink milk in small amounts with meals through the day and have no problem. They can generally drink whole milk or chocolate flavored milk better than skim or lowfat milk. They can usually eat yogurt with active or live cultures, and all hard cheese, like cheddar and have no problem. Most people can also enjoy cottage cheese, and processed cheese slices. You may want to check with your doctor about a calcium supplement.

Buying and taking lactase additives in either liquid or tablet form helps some people. You may also want to learn more about the commercial lactase that you can take or add to milk. It helps you to break down the milk sugar and may allow you to enjoy more milk. Milk is not only a good source of calcium but also has other nutrients like protein and some B vitamins.

Having enough milk and calcium before the age of 30 to 35 helps to build a good frame to prevent osteoporosis. After that time your body stops adding calcium to build bones. After that, it is important to have enough calcium and 20 to 30 minutes of exercise each day. That will help keep your bones strong.

Your body must have the "sunshine" vitamin D to use the calcium well. Vitamin D is in fluid milk and added the most nonfat dry milks. Check the label to see. It is not in cheese or

yogurt. If your face and hands are in the Texas sunshine for 10 minutes each day, you'll have enough vitamin D.

If you are having a problem with drinking enough milk, you may want to know of some other foods with calcium. The foods in the following chart can add extra calcium. They can help add calcium equal to the amount in the two or three servings of milk you need each day.

OTHER FOODS WITH CALCIUM

Foods equal in calcium to 1 cup of milk:

- 7 medium or 3 ounces of sardines, including bones
- 2 cups mustard greens
- 7 corn tortillas, if made with lime or calcium salts - 6-7 inches across
- 7 wheat flour tortillas - if the flour is enriched (read the label) - 7-8 inches across
- 3 ounces canned salmon, including the bones
- 1/2 cup or 4 ounces tofu (if made with calcium sulfite)
- 1 cup collard greens, frozen
- 4 oz. or 1 1/2 waffles, 7 inches across
- enriched mix with milk and eggs
- 3/4 cup or 4 1/2 ounces Mackerel with bone (includes 2 2/3 tsp. fat)

Foods equal in calcium to 1/3 cup of milk are:

- 1 cup cooked dried beans
- 1/2 cup turnip greens or fresh bok choy
- 1 cup broccoli
- 1 medium square cornbread (2 1/2 x 2 1/2 x 1 1/2 inches)
- 2 pancakes, 4 inches across
- 3 ounces of shrimp
- 5 slices bread made with enriched flour

You can make these foods higher in calcium:

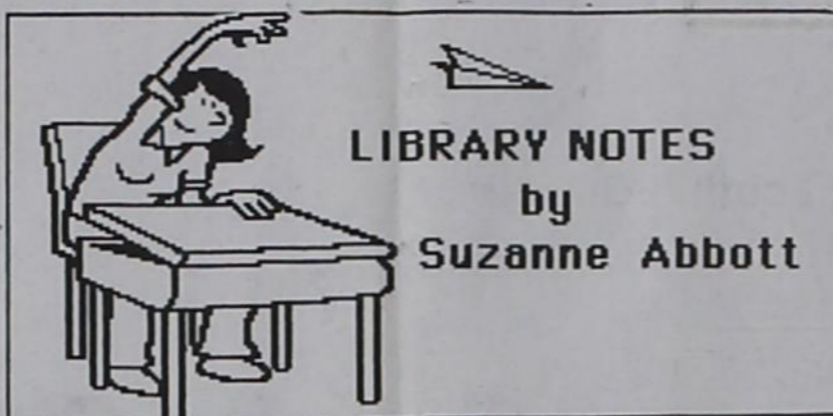
- Cook soups with bones and tomato or vinegar
- Combine macaroni or other pasta with cheese and other combinations that have calcium

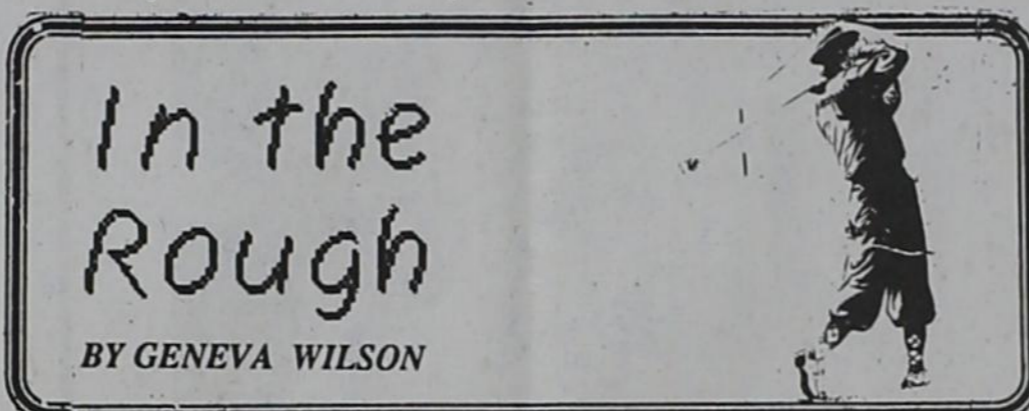
Thanks to Charles Keith, the library now offers four study guides with sample tests for various postal
