

This Veterans Day we are thankful that the U.S. has not been involved in another major war this year.

But let us not forget to honor those who lost their lives in the wars of past years and those living who fought for their country.

A Veteran is any man or woman who has served in the armed forces either in time of war or peace.

The first Veteran's benefit on record was enacted by the Pilgrims of Plymouth Colony in 1626. It provided that any soldier injured in defense of the Colony "shall be maintained competenly by the Colony during his life". In 1780 the Continental Congress granted half pay to any officer who served to the end of the Revolution.

In 1800 Congress authorized benefits for Veterans of theWar of 1812, the Mexican War, Indian Wars, the American Civil War, the Spanish American War and the Philipine Insurrection. ## **Social Security Tips**

by Mary Jane Shanes Social Security Manager, Plainview

Here are some questons I receive on a regular basis:

Q. I volunteer a lot during the day and don't have time to spend fixing a problem I am having with my Social Security benefit. Can my husband go to Social Security and take care of this

A. No, your husband can't take care of your Social Security business for you. Your records are confidential and the law doesn't allow the Social Secupersonal business with anyone else. If it is more convenient, you may want to use Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213 to take care of your business, at your convenience. You between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. on business days. Our lines are busiest about 2.75 million bales, approxi-mately 250,000 bales short of the 3.06 lished base levels for all quality fac-month, so if your business can wait, it's best to call at other times. Whenever you call, have your Social Security number handy.

Q. Some of the earnings on the statement of earnings and benefit estimate form I received from SSA are incorrect. How can I get them cor-

A. If the error involves recent earnings reported by your current employer, you should contact your payroll of-fice. If the statement shows any other incorrect earnings, you should call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213. Be sure to have records showing the correct wages when you call, such as your W-2s, pay stubs and tax returns.

Q. I got this benefit estimate statement in the mail unsolicited. Do I need to call Social Security or take some other action?

A. After you read the statement, you don't need to do anything unless you want to apply for Social Security benefits, or you believe the earnings information is incorrect. If the error involves recent earnings at your current job, contact earnings, report the discrepancy by calling Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213. You also should call the toll-free number to report if your name or Social Security number is incorrect on the statement. When you call, be sure to have your records of the correct earnings handy - such as W-2s, pay stubs, and tax returns.

A. The Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statements were sent to people age 60 and older who have a delicious meal, put on by the local posted earnings and are not currently classmates and teachers. We talked receiving Social Security benefits.

Q. I didn't get a benefit estimate statement, but my co-worker at the next desk did. He said everybody 60 and over should get one. Why didn't I

A. If you are age 60 or older, have earnings posted to your Social Security record, are not currently receiving Social Security benefits, and we have your current mailing address, you should receive a Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement by September 30, 1995.

If you meet the above requirements and don't get a statement by September 30, call Social Security's toll-free number (1-800-772-1213) and ask for a Form SSA-7004 (Request for a Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement -- "PEBES") You should receive your statement in about four to six weeks after you return the form to Social Security. If you're not yet 60 and would like to receive a PEBES, call 1-800-772-1213 to request the application form.

Q. I heard that I can get more time to complete my PASS. How does this

As of January 1, 1995, Social Security will not apply the 36 to 48 months limits on time permitted for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) recipients to complete a Plan to Achieve Self-Support (PASS). The amount of time permitted will be decided on a case-by-case basis.
