and Floyd Counties. The local district court Motley County during 1972 was disposed of 25 cases during 1972. 24 per cent of the cases filed during the year or carried over from 1971. At the end of the by the Texas Civil Judicial year, 79 cases were pending on the docket.

Statewide, the 245 district, domestic relations and special juvenile courts experienced less than a 1 per cent increase in filings during 1972 -- to 280,971 Twenty-seven per cent of these

These state courts disposed of 51 per cent of the total cases filed in 1972 or carried over from 1971. The defendant entered a guilty plea in 47 per cent of the criminal cases disposed of. In the cases disposed of by a jury verdict, 74 per cent of the defendants were found guilty and 26 percent acquitted.

Of the 276,979 cases pending throughout the state at the end of 1972, 19 per cent had been on the docket 12 to 24 months and 28 per cent had been pending over two years.

For the last 40 years the Texas Civil Judicial Council has been collecting information concerning caseloads for the district and appellate courts. Beginning in 1973, the Council will expand its data collection activities by gathering and publishing statistics on caseloads of county, municipal and justice of the peace courts. These statistics are essential for study and evaluation of the judicial system and its effects on the people of the state.

#### STUDIES ABOUT THE BIBLE

Recently we have noted evidences of the universal flood which give support to the Bible account. In particular we gave attention to Rehwinkel's "bone collections" which are found in many elevated places over the earth.

One more illustration on the flood will suffice. Rehwinkel lists many accounts of the flood from literature around the world. Following are a few peoples who have a "flood tradition" in their tribal literature (THE FLOOD, Chapter

Egyptians, Greeks, Phrygians, Romans, Indians (Asia), Hawaiians, Australian Aborigines, Mexicans, Indians American), and Babylonians.

Around the world the various cultures have an account of 'the flood." These many records vary: the kind and size of the vessel, time duration, number of people who survived, etc. Not all Biblical details are mentioned, but around the world they do give an account of the flood.

In the following account we note that the Babylonian record has eight similarities with the Genesis writing (To save space I have paraphrased and numbered the items.)

Flood came because earth was full of violence. Representatives of animal kingdom taken into vessel.

3. Babylonians say flood lasted seven days; Bible indicates embarkation lasted seven days.

4. Raven and dove sent from vessel.

After flood thanksgiving offering made 6. Rainbow in Genesis; jewels of Ishtar in Babylon.

7. Covenant guaranteeing no more such destruction by 8. End with blessing of hero and his wife

There are many ancient and modern writings from which one may study this subject. Thousands of years ago Moses gave God's account of the flood. Though much writing has been published to discredit this Bible record, today many scientists agree with the Bible.
