Gold in its pure form is a very soft metal. In times gone by, the quality of the gold offered was tested by biting the coin and seeing if a tooth mark would be left. The easier to mark with a tooth from biting it, the more valuable the gold represented. The logic behind this practice was, the less pure the gold, the harder the coin to bite. Alloys mixed with the gold made the coin harder and therefore not nearly as valuable.

"Malleable" is one of the words used in describing pure, soft, impressionable gold. The dictionary defines the word "malleable" as meaning to be "capable of being extended or shaped by hammering or by pressure from rollers; adaptable."

So here is our point: The purer we are as Christians, the more we are able to be worked by God and fashioned as He would have us to be. The more adaptable we are in God's hands, the easier it is to have His image stamped on our hearts. The only thing easier than working with malleable, pure gold would be to work with pliable, pure souls to shape them into the image of Jesus.

Are we soft enough in our hearts to allow God to mold us? To recreate us into the image necessary to spend an eternity with Him?







'Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until August 18, 1997, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Mrs. Moffitt said.

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
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


