Categories of vegetables and fruit which have low acid content must be are a few of the favorites of home canners of produce. And let's not forget the corn, peas and green beans.
Home canning of fresh produce can be a fruitful activity, but unless safe food preservation methods are used, the results can be less than our "Good Food
for All Seasons" campaign implies for All Seasons" campaign implies.
The basics include an explanation The basics include an explanaios fruit products, jams, jellies and picklec, the boiling water canner method can be used. Boiling water canning mployes the use of a large pot that has The rack is used to hold jars off the bottom of the container. The containe must be large enough to cover the jars
with at least two inches of boiling with at least two inches of boiling
water so that the jars are completely water so that the jars are completely
immersed in boiling water ( 212 degrees Fat sea level altitudes).
This method is also used for can-
ning tomatoes and products acidified ning tomatoes and products acidified with vinegar such as quick pickles and
salsas. Current recommendations that tomato products be acidifified with an acid source so that newer tomato varieties have enough acid to be safe when canned by this method. Jalapenos and salsa, popular Texas products, cause the bacteria that surviver. Because the bacteria that survive in this low acid environment must be de-
stroyed by extremely high heat (above stroyed by extremely high heal (above canner, which reaches 214 degrees $F$ must be used. The dial gauges on the dial-gauge type of pressure canner
should be tested yearly. Most county should be tested yearly. Most county
Extension offices will perform this procedure for you.
Many questions are asked as to why home canners can't produce safely the same products as some commercial canners just do not have the equipment for processing or the commercial preservatives to use to make products shelf-stable.
Creativity
Creativity is not a good idea for
home canned products. Only tested home canned products. Only tested mendation should be used.
Store home canned products in a clean, dark, dry placeif possible. Avoid
storing jars in an area that will be storing jars in an area that will be
below 32 degrees F or above 90 degrees $F$. Under proper storage condiions of 50 to 70 degrees $F$, products should maintain best quality for up to
