

One thing that may trouble us when we set out to be better daily Bible students is our expectations of what we think will happen. Scripture is not magic. It is truth expressed in words, sentences and paragraphs. (It is important to remember that the verse numbers and chapter breaks and headings are artificial and were added by translators long after the original writings for the purpose of helping us find specific statements).

God's desire is to make matters plain to anyone, anytime, anywhere. In addition to providing us with documents that are for the most part simply and clearly written. He quickens our minds by His Spirit, provided we genuinely want to know. Pride, prejudice, and preconceptions are indeed the big barriers to seeing truth. Let us be humble. Look at what is there. Let us tell God that we know that our minds have limitations. Let us thank Him that He will help us understand.




Jerry Green Featured Guest At Do Gooders Club Meeting
