### The Name Of Shannon Davidson Is Etched Into Motley County History

"The reward of a thing well done is to have done it."

James Shannon Davidson's name remains etched into the history and memories of Motley County when he had the courage to enter the Pony Express Race in 1939 promoted by Miss Enid Justin, of the Justin Boot Company in Nacona. The 23 year old lad of Flomot collected the 750 shiny new silver dollars as first prize winner after riding horseback 2000 weary miles from Nacona, Texas to Oakland, California. The cash was presented to him in a ceremony at the Alameda-Contra Costa building.

The citizens of Motley County had their own way of showing appreciation and honored him with Shannon Davidson Day, May 11, 1939 in Matador Texas. The entire county turned out for the rodeo, old time dancing, Indians on horseback and a parade complete with wagons, buggies and

buckboards. The modest young man had made previous trips on horseback without fanfare or ostentation. His family had depended on his guidance and endurance during difficult and happy times

through the years. His grandparents, Alice Bonner and James Monroe Davidson arrived in Dumont, Texas in the Dickens area in 1889 in two covered wagons driving cattle with them. Mr Davidson was instrumental in helping organize and create Dickens County.

Shannon's parents, James "Jim" Davidson and the former Elizabeth Franks were married in Dickens, January 16, 1901 by Judge Ballard. They became the parents of Charles Roy and Merle before moving to Quay County in New Mexico.

Shannon was born May 25, 1915 in Tucumcari, New Mexico. Other members of the family following his arrival that are New Mexico natives are Allie, Dale and Glenna Roy "B".

As a small boy, Shannon had the tendency of wandering around in the pasture. When he became tired, regardless where he was, he would lie down and go to sleep. The family on the Davidson land. became alarmed late one afternoon when he had not returned home, be-

This was in the days of "nesters" vs ranchers. Cowboys were allowed to wear six shooters strapped to their waist. There were recollections of fires and wire-cutting episodes that flared up when people farmed in New Mexico. Many farm families lived in fear of repercussions of the ranchers after being threatened and left their land.

Mr. Davidson had built a nice rock home for his family and had other improvements on the land. They had cultivated and grass land, horses and cattle. His family was happy here and he was confident this would always be their homestead.

On June 16, 1926, Mr. Davidson was in the house recovering from being, shot in the shoulder by neighboring cowboys. Mrs. Davidson and Shannon were plowing feed land. Merle was hoeing the corn patch. Merle saw seven horsemen going to the field where her mother and Shannon were. She then saw her father run out of the house. She ran toward him begging him not to go to the field. He replied, "I'd be a poor man not to protect my wife and son." Merle scampered up the windmill tower and heard seven shots.





4TH U.S. CAVALRY (MEMORIAL) QUADRILLE TEAM The 4th U.S. Cavalry Regiment (Memorial) Association, Inc. is a non-profit organization dedicated to enlightening the public regarding the exciting and true history of this celebrated regiment of the United States Army. Its membership of reenactors bring the period of 1869 alive again through its living history performances. The quadrille team was formed to demonstrate the fact that horsemanship was important to the 1870's U.S. Cavalry and it continued to be central to the training of the troops until the horse cavalry was dismounted in the 1940's. The Regiment continues this tradition of stressing the importance of horsemanship and teaches advanced equitration to the riding membership. Period tactics are applied to mounted drill which makes the riding performances historically correct. Precision horseback drill was practiced for three reasons. First was to train the horses and toopers to ride in a proper balanced position. Second was to move large numbers of horses in an orderly manner. Third was to prepare the trooper and horses to go into battle in a tactical formation for maximum effect. All uniforms, equipment and tack are historically correct for 1875. All horses are of a dark color and are between






That great day of celebration, the very first Shannon Davidson Day created enough joy and excitement in the heart of an eleven-year-old girl to last another fifty-seven years!

Mrs. Davidson bought a small farm northwest of Flomot and struggled to make a living off 80 acres in 1929. Many families were in the same situ-

Shannon was on a horse most of his life. To supplement the family's income, he broke horses. He would do this in the river near Flomot. When he pay close attention to the expiration felt the job was completed, the horse would be gentle enough for Merle to ride them. He never mistreated a horse. He had a horse named Cupid that he had trained to do tricks.

When in San Jose on the Pony Express Ride, a humane officer waved Shannon on when he saw the two horses, Rocket and Ranger, were receiving the best of care. Shannon never rode beyond a trot on the trip and most of the time in a walk.

"State law requires that permanently disabled person placards be renewed after five years," said Elaine Hart, Motley County Tax Assessor-Collector. "We started issuing placards in July 1992 under the decision of state lawmakers and the Texas Department



#### Matador Cowboy Wins Pony Express Race, Rides Onto Treasure Island

Shannon Davidson Completes 2,000 Mile Horseback Trek From Texas To California To Collect \$750 Prize

SAN FRANCISCO, March 24, 1939 -- Shannon Davidson, 23, Texas cowboy, rode onto Treasure Island Friday to win the Pony Express Race from Nocona, Texas, to the Golden Gate Exposition and receive \$750 in newly minted silver for the feat.

His horse made a 200-yard spring on the "Rainbow Ramp" leading from the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge to complete the trek nearly 2,000 miles.

Davidson drew up to a yipping crowd of riders for a reception that ended the contest officially.

With the help of two other men, two horses and a truck, Davidson covered the long route in a little more than 23 days by keeping on the move most of the time.

The race started from Nocona on March 1, and there were 17 other starters. As the contest neared the final stage all but Davidson and King Kurley of Quanah had dropped out. When Davidson reached the finish line Kurley still was nearly 100 miles behind. Davidson's home is Matador.

Davidson's first concern was for his

horses, "Rocket" and "Ranger". It was Ranger that carried him to the finish line, to the cheers of the crowd, the tooting of a cowboy band, and the joyous shouts of his relatives and friends.





The County FSA Committee election will be held on Dec. 5, 1997. Eligible voters have the right to nominate candidate(s) of their choice by petition. Blank petitions (FSA-669As) may be obtained at the County FSA Office. Each petition submitted must

— limited to 1 nominee

-signed by at least 3 eligible voters within the candidates Local Administrative Area (LAA)

- signed by the nominee, indicating willingness to serve, if elected

- postmarked or delivered to the County FSA Office no later than October 27, 1997.

Persons nominated should be currently engaged in the operation of a farm or ranch, including landowners only, and be well qualified for com- essary, removing the County Execumittee work. A farmer/rancher is eligible to be a County FSA Committee member if the farmer/rancher resides in the county, has farming/ranching interest in the LAA, and is an eligible voter. County FSA Committee members may not hold positions in certain

these positions pose a conflict of interest with FSA duties. The positions include functional offices such as president, vice president, secretary, and positions on boards or executive committees. Also, office holders in partisan elections are not eligible to serve as Committee persons while holding office. Additional information of eligibility to hold office may be obtained at the County FSA Office.






