Old Man Winter Returns To Motley County





"Souper" Easy **Meals In Minutes**

Ham 'N Cheese Soup (1 serving)

Bring 2 cups water to a boil, add about 1/3 cup chopped frozen or fresh spinach to the water; bring to boil again. Meanwhile, break up the noodles in 1 package of Top Ramen before opening; add to boiling water along with 1/4 cup 1/2-inch cubes of cooked ham; boil for 3 minutes: stir in the seasoning from the flavor packet. Pour into serving bowl, top with a slice of Swiss, cheddar or American cheese. Serve immediately. Variation: You can substitute frozen green beans, peas, broccoli, or corn for the spinach.







SPA provides ranchers an opportunity to analyze their ranch operation from both a production and financial side. SPA


