## **Building History**

### A look at early day Roaring Springs

by Mary Meason

This assignment is to give some history or stories about the places of business in Roaring Spirngs.

I don't pretend to know everything about the buildings and business operations but this is some of the memories of some of the business places in the immediate town of Roaring Springs.

I was away from home for seven years attending school in Lubbock and Ft. Worth and working at the College in Ft. Worth, so I know that many changes were made in RoaringSprings during those years that I missed.

I don't even pretend to know the directions in Roaring Springs. I gave up years ago trying to figure out the right directions in that town. So in describing buildings and their location will be located as being next to, down the street, across the street, or in the general direction of some other place

In 1912 the Roaring Springs Townsite was plotted and in 1913 the Quanah Acme and Pacific Railroad completed tracks and built the depot amid much land speculation that was brought about by the Roaring Springs Townsite Company, a combined effort between the railroad and the Matador Land and Cattle Company.

On down the street on the right hand side from the depot is a brick building known as the Cooper building. My grandfather built the building and near the top of the front side of the building is a concrete image of a wine glass. The wine glass was also his cattle brand. Grandpa and his family came to Motley County from Indian-Territory in Oklahoma in the early or mid 1890's and he bought what is now Dutchman linecamp. He later sold that land and bought land just across from Ollie Scott's place and more land along the road going to Floydada.

He realized that farming was going to be one of the most important occupations in the County.

I was quite young when his building was erected but it had not been occupied by Christmas.

Since half the population of Roaring Springs was made up of my relatives we were spending Christmas Day there with someof those relatives. My two brothers and I had received roller skates for Christmas and several of my cousins had also received skates so as soon as Christmas dinner was over we all went to Grandpa's building and spent the afternoon skating - and fall-

At one time the post office was in the back of that building and S.J. Braselton had a Ford tractor and implement business in the front of the building. Just across the street that goes toward the school building was another early day building, the Travelers Hotel. At one time that hotel did a thriving business. Many traveling men who worked this area made that hotel their headquartes. It later housed a cafe and had some mighty good dances in the old dining room. The building has been vacant for many years.

In 1934 the Hotel advertised two big nights of dancing to the music of the Gloom Chasers and offered patrons meals, sandwiches and their

In the building next to the hotel is Charlie Long's Insurance office, which, years back had been the insurance office of Mr. J.D. Mitchell.

The vacant lot between the Insurance office and the old post office is where a picture show was once located

and later was destroyed by fire. Bill Dillard now owns the building where the post office used to be, until the government in all it's wisdom, decided that Roaring Springs and Matador both needed a new post office. The new Roaring Springs post office is located near the curve in the Grocery store? street leading to the Dickens highway.


Next to the old post office building nesses located in the buildings on that is the City Hall. Part of the City Hall building once housed the Fire Hall, and fire truck.

The RS Cafe is located in the building next to City Hall. The inside of the Cafe was completely gutted by fire in May of 1996. It has since then been completely rebuilt and is open for business once again.

The City Grocery store is located next to the Cafe. The store was formany years, and is now owned by Billy and Cory Easter.

The laundromat is located next to the grocery store and next to the laundry is a building which once housed Carl Tardy's barber shop, and is now used for storage.

It seems to me the Service Station has been there forever. Russell Alexander now owns the business, which was owned by Jack and Ronnie Davis for many years. It has had many owners over the years. I remember when Fred King ran the station. He also had a feed store but I don't remember where the feed store was located.

Our thinking is also very important. "As a man thinks within himself, so is he" (Proverbs 23:7). You will find a good many passages that address our thinking and our minds.



The Texas Department of health surveyed our swing bed program on Tuesday, March 11, 1997. The surveyor has recommended certification of our skilled nursing program to HCFA. We should receive our provider number in a few weeks. As we have discussed, operating a SNF will allow us to more effectively minister to those we serve. It will also increase our operational and financial effectiveness.

We also received an excellent Laboratory and Home Health state survey. The St. Mary Family Health Care Center is doing very well. We are fortunate to have such wonderful doctors and nurses practicing at our facility.

We have submitted the application to TDHS to allow Crosbyton Clinic Hospital to offer Medicaid based CBA (community based alternatives) and PAS (personal assistant services) as a separate division of our home health agency. These programs will allow us to better meet the diverse low intensity health related needs of patients thereby helping us continually improve the health and quality of life of people in the communities we serve.

We are committed to providing patient focused, high quality, service directed, cost conscious care in support of the development of a regional integrated delivery system. These endeavors will help us maintain this important objective. We are further committed to supporting our hospital and medical staff as well as the communities we serve.

We must continue to aggressively manage our cost structure and diversify our services. It is important that every employee market Crosbyton Clinic Hospital on an on-going basis. This will help insure our long term viability, patient focused care, and over one-hundred and forty (140) local jobs with an annual payroll in excess of \$3,500,000. 

To determine how much of these nutrients your lawn needs, John Deere suggests that you conduct a soil test by taking several random plugs of soil from around the lawn. Dig down six to eight inches for the samples. Remove any grass blades, roots and stems. Mix the soil and label it "Lawn". 

many years is located on the street going towards the school building. The church's name has recently been changed to Roaring Springs Full Gospel Church.

The First Chrisitan Church held its first meeting in the insurance office of G.W. and Stella Stephens in 1932. Dr. and Mrs. Hughes moved to Roaring Springs in 1920 and they and the Stephens were some of the first ones to organize the church. Services were held in the old school building in one of the classrooms. Later they met in the Cooper building.

Finally, the members of the First Christian Church built their church building and it was dedicated August 25, 1938. Four services were held that day, Sunday School at 10 a.m., preaching at 11 a.m., the dedication service at 3 p.m. and preaching at the evening hour.

In 1970 the attendance had decreased to six members and the Methodist membership had decreased to such an extent that the First Christian and Methodist Churches combined their membership and worship together.

In order to make the deal legal the Methodist Church had to give the First Christian Church \$100 and the two churches are one and worship together in the building that was once the First Christian Church building.

The Mt. Zion Baptist Church is the worship center for the black people and is located across the highway going east to the Dickens highway.

There were once two Church of Christ's in Roaring Springs. The building of the old church, which no longer holds services, is still standing, and is located on 2nd street. The Church of Christ, which still holds services is located on the road going towards the rodeo grounds.
