## CRP Meeting Announced Motley County Sign-Up Begins October 14th

USDA has announced the 16th sign  
up period for the Conservation Re-  
serve Program (CRP). The sign up will  
begin October 14th and continue  
through November 14th. The Motley-  
County USDA offices of the Natural  
Resources Conservation Service  
(NRCS) and the Farm Services Agency  
(FSA) will hold an informational  
meeting October 17th beginning at  
9:00 a.m. The meeting will be held at  
the Senior Citizens building in Mata-  
dor. The purpose of the meeting will  
be to assist producers in making in-  
formed decisions about enrollment and  
the bidding process for the 16th sign  
up of CRP. Program administration,  
eligibility, and scoring of environmen-  
tal benefit points will be discussed.

The sign up process for CRP is a  
joint process of the USDA, NRCS and  
FSA. The sign up for CRP in Motley  
County is by appointment. To make an  
appointment call the FSA office at  
(806) 347-2671. The offices of NRCS  
and FSA will not receive final training

on the 16th sign up until Friday Octo-  
ber 10th. If you have any questions  
call the FSA office (347-2671) or the  
NRCS office (347-2263).

Cussler's *Flood Tide*, featuring Dirk Pitt. Also new is K.C. McKinnon's *Dancing at the Harvest Moon*.

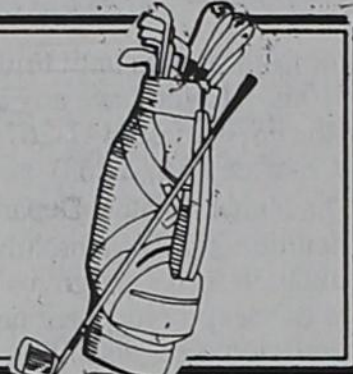

### Family and Consumer Sciences News

The fruit and vegetable group helps build strong bones, promote growth and contribute to the general well-being of the child. Dark green leafy and yellow vegetables are good food sources of vitamin A. One vitamin A-rich food should be included in the diet at least every other day. Citrus fruits, tomatoes, cauliflower, strawberries and greens are outstanding sources of vitamin C. A vitamin C-rich fruit or vegetable should be eaten everyday.

Four servings of fruits and vegetables are recommended daily. A serving of fruit or vegetable consists of 1 tablespoon for each year of age until a half cup is reached. Thus, 4 tablespoons or 1/4 cup would be considered a serving for a 4-year old.

Here are pointers for making fruit and vegetable group foods fun for children to eat:

Prepare foods so the child can chew them. Carrot strips and unpeeled crisp apples are not appropriate for a one-year old. Instead, serve cooked carrots or applesauce.

Use fruits and vegetables to add color to the meal.

Serve uncooked soft fruits such as bananas or ripe peaches and cooked vegetables to a child of any age.

Add chewy and crisp fruits and vegetables to the diet as teeth develop.

Serve finger foods such as raw carrot strips, pepper rings and turnip strips to the older pre-school child.

Serve some vegetables (especially the strong-flavored vegetables-spinach, cabbage, cauliflower raw if the child does not like them cooked.

Serve fruits, fruit juices and vegetables as snacks.

Enriched breads and cereals, rice, cornmeal and pastas are important. They supply energy for the active preschooler. Enriched breads and cereals are good sources of iron and the B-vitamins. Six to eleven servings are recommended daily for both children and adults.

Here are pointers for making bread and cereal group foods fun for children to eat:

Chop fresh fruits and serve on cereals.

Cut toast in interesting shapes (squares, circles)

Make small sandwiches of a meat spread, peanut butter or soft cheese as finger foods.

Most children eat more than three meals a day. Their stomachs are small, and they cannot hold as much food as an adult.

Empty-calorie foods, such as most candies, cakes, and soft drinks should not be served as habitual snacks. These foods supply calories, but very few other essential nutrients. Children may develop a strong liking for these foods and prefer to eat them rather than more nutritious snacks.

### LIFE'S NOT FAIR!



How do you handle an injustice? George O. Wood tells of a sister coming to him who had been unjustly hurt by the very brothers and sisters with whom she had worked together for years. The hurt was obvious and deep as she felt unfairly treated by those who were supposed to love and care for her. How would we, how should we react to such treatment?

What happens in me is more important than what happens to me.

There are many things which happen to us in life that we do not like. But we are really powerless, most of the time, to change our external circumstances. We cannot rearrange someone else's behavior toward us, nor can we undo moments which have brought us pain or harm.

If we keep reliving the moment, whether through retaliation or devotion to endless hours toward "appealing the verdict", we will be left frustrated at the end of the day. Our best recourse is to ask the Lord to change our inner life. Remember Joseph? He knew the truth. Rather than rail against his brothers for their unjust treatment of him, he decided to concentrate his energies on being the best person for God he could be in the circumstances he was in. Over the process of a lifetime, he was able to live out the indelible truth regarding unjust treatment from another: "You meant it for evil, but God meant it for good" (Gen 45).

Our reaction to the unkindness of others perhaps best reveals the depth of our walk with God.

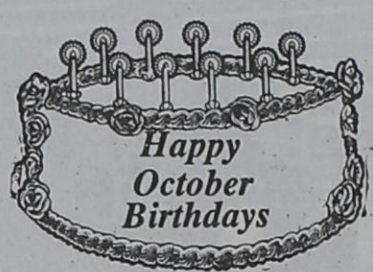

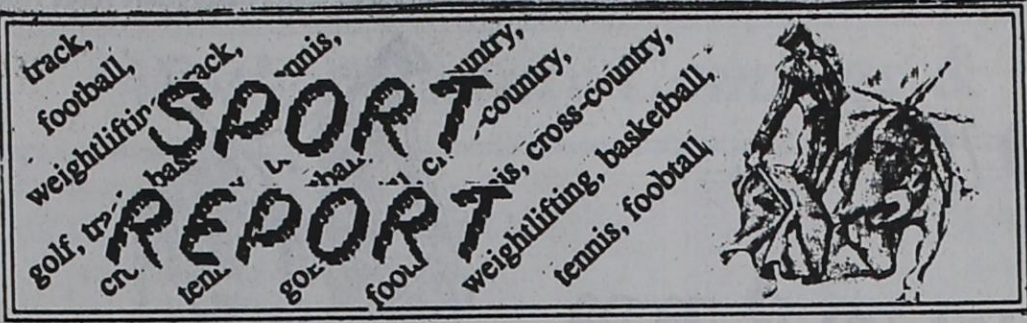

**Matadors Gunned Down By Valley Patriots**

The Matadors traveled to Valley Friday night for our second district game. Valley won the game, making our record 2-3 for the season and 0-2 in district.

The first half was fairly even with each team scoring one touchdown and missing the extra point. After we fumbled the second half kickoff Valley scored their second touchdown making the score 12-6. Valley controlled the ball for most of the second half scoring their last time in the fourth quarter making the final score 18-6.

The Matadors' leading rusher was Keane Cruse who had 56 yards on 11 carries. Benji Rodriguez was 25 yards on 6 carries, and Aaron Green, 17 yards on 7 carries.
