

The hurt was obvious and deep as she felt unfairly treated by those who were supposed to love and care for her. How would we, how should we react to such treatment?

What happens in me is more important than what happens to me.

There are many things which happen to us in life that we do not like. But we are really powerless, most of the time, to change our external circumstances. We cannot rearrange someone else's behavior toward us, nor can we undo moments which have brought us pain or harm.
