handed it to the teacher, which she
promplty put to use on my brother,
Lelond. After a few licks she had
nothing left in her hand but the
handle, as Clarence had notched
the switch.
Miss Johnson was a compulsive
laugher. As punishment to to my
brother, Leland, she made him sit
on the floor with his legs stretched
out with his back against the wall
This embarrased him. He told her
she made him sit on the floor so she
could laugh at him.
At another time, he was sitting as
his desk. She asked him to stand up
and he refused. She whipped him
