Money for the education of their children was hard to come by and they built one-room school houses. Now in the area is a new school building which has one class room of 17,000 square feet. The expanse is carpeted for the comfort and convenience of students. The old buildings did not have carpet and they did not have indirect lighting, nor did they have controlled temperature, and drinking water was in a bucket with a single dipper for everyone. Plumbing facilities in the old days were outside and they were not chrome and tile. Usually one teacher comprised the entire faculty, however, more advanced students often taught primary classes. Students who wanted an education received one with the primitive arrangements in small one-room school houses. Simplicity seems to possess greater value than the more complex devices to attain the same end.

"God, after He spoke long time ago to the fathers in the prophets in many portions and in many ways, in these last days has spoken to us in His Son..." Heb. 1:1-2.
