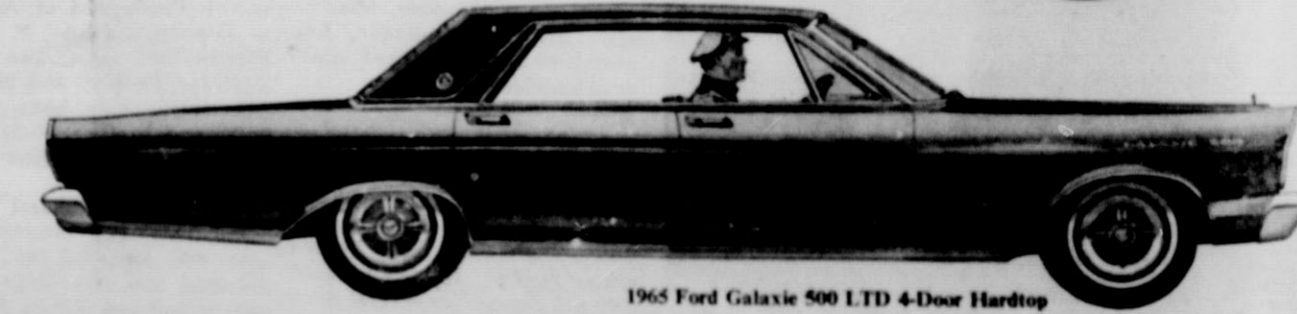

Of the 65-plus families that own homes, more than 80 per cent are free of mortgage. Moreover, some 82 per cent of elderly families owe no installment debt. And one nationwide survey showed that 96 per cent of the elderly did not owe any money to a doctor, dentist or a hospital. (3) People over 65 comprise 9 per cent of the U. S. population and have 8 per cent of the total income. (4)

While it is true that over-65 families, on the average, have less total income, their average after-tax income per family member is about equal to that of younger families. Money incomes for families over 65: 25.3 per cent have incomes of \$6,000 or more; 7.9 per cent \$5,000 to \$5,999; 8.9 per cent \$4,000 to \$4,999; 12.8 per cent \$3,000 to \$3,999; 45.1 per cent \$3,000 or less. (5)

In the post-World War II period, the number of employees covered by private retirement plans has quintupled—from 5 million persons to 25 million. Assets of private pension plans exceed \$75 billion—more than the nation's yearly defense bill—and will cross the \$125 billion mark by 1970, according to estimates. These enormous sums have only one function—to provide retirement income to older people.

10 - Q. IS THE ECONOMIC STATUS OF THE ELDERLY IMPROVING?

A. Yes. The problems of the over 65 population, which have been greatly exaggerated, are diminishing. The elderly's ability to take care of their own health needs and their economic status are both improving. The phenomenal growth of voluntary health insurance is one reason. Another is the sharp drop in the proportion of older citizens needing public assistance. Calculations based on government reports show that less than 12.8 per cent of the aged are receiving public assistance now against 23.1 per cent who required it in 1949. (6) According to the President's Council on Aging, in the decade between 1950 and 1961 the number of people over 65 increased about 40 per cent, but their total income increased more than 130 per cent. This compares with an increase of 80 per cent in total income of the entire population. (7) The Council predicted that this improvement will continue at an accelerated pace as more and more people reach retirement protected by pension plans, pay-up insurance, increased social security benefits, and higher personal assets, savings and equity in property.

11 - Q. IF ENACTED BY CONGRESS, WHEN WOULD THE ELDERCARE PROGRAM BECOME EFFECTIVE?

A. The amendments relating to the health insurance program under Eldercare would become effective July 1, 1966, but a state could make them effective even earlier.

12 - Q. IF MEDICARE BECAME LAW, WHEN WOULD IT BECOME EFFECTIVE?

A. New payroll taxes to finance the plan would be collected from January 1, 1966, but benefits for hospitalization would not start until six months later. Nursing home benefits would not be available until January 1, 1967.

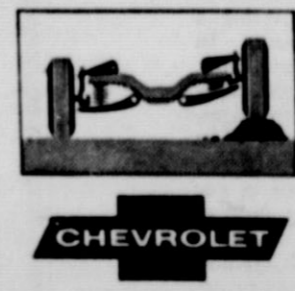

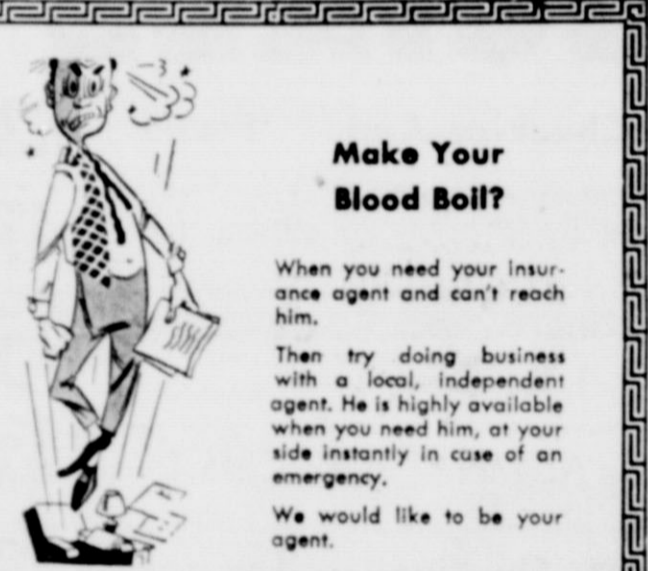
