#### Ensign Hines In Pilot Training

Ensign Hal Dean Hines, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howe H. Hines of Route 4, Floydada, former residents of Matador, recently completed a four-week Pre-Flight School at the Naval Air Station, Pensacola, Florida, and is now receiving flight training there.

Following his graduation from Texas Tech last May he attended the United States Naval Officers Candidate School in Newport, Rhode Island and received his commission as Ensign there in August.

During the four-week training, he studied aerodynamics, mathematics, physics, naval orientation, navigation, engineering, leadership and other subjects essential to a Naval Officer.

Ensign Hines will be in Florida ten months and will then, following final training at Corpus Christi, receive his Navy wings. His wife, June, is in Pensacola with him.

#### Dr. Clyde Smith to Direct Methodist Home for Elderly

Plans for a \$200,000 Methodist Home Center for Abilene have been approved by the General Board of Hospitals and Homes for the Methodist Church and by the Bishop and Cabinet of the Northwest Texas Conference.

"We hope to have it ready for occupancy by May or June of next year," Dr. Clyde Smith, newly elected executive director, announced.

The center, which will house 36 persons, will be constructed on a 16-acre site, purchased about four years ago under the leadership of Rev. Don Davidson of Hereford, conference director of hospitals and homes, Dr. Smith said.

A total of \$130,000 in commitments has already been received, Dr. Smith said. The remaining \$70,000 will be raised by subscription.

16 Applications  
Dr. Smith said that 16 elderly

persons had already turned in applications for the home and added, "I feel we can fill it within 30 days of the time it is completed."

Presently, the nearest Methodist home is in Hereford he explained.

The Home, as planned by Woodlief F. Brown, Abilene architect and member of the commission, would contain 18,869 square feet and would have 22 single units and seven double units.

"We also plan to build up to 13 cottages for retired preachers and their wives as soon as they are needed," Dr. Smith continued. "The first ones will be built about six months after the center. We already have three applications for those, so we'll build them as they are needed."

The idea of a home for Abilene originated about five years ago when E. M. Connell of Anson served as director and got the ball rolling.

Dr. Smith, former superintendent of the Abilene district, returned to Abilene after serving as pastor of the First Methodist Church in Big Spring for eight years. He had previously served as superintendent of the Big Spring district.

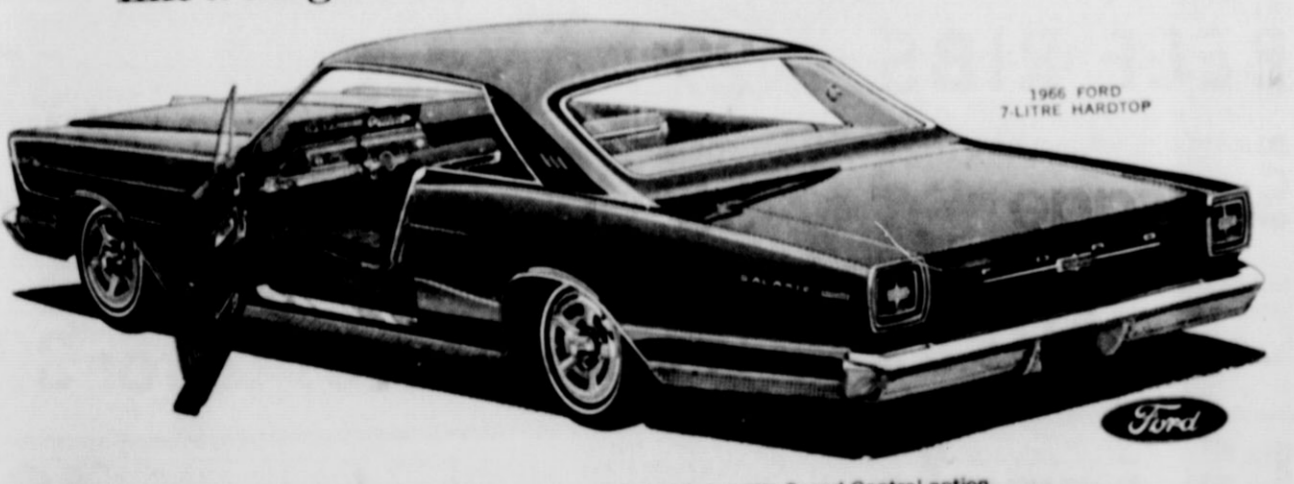
