Calvert Among Top Jr. College Shotputters

South Plains College freshmen weightmen Ken Matney of Slaton, Glen Calvert of Flomot and Mike Williams of Olton are currently rated as the top performers in the shot put in the National Junior College Athletic

Association according to the recent issue of "Spike and Bar," the NJCAA's official track publication. All three recorded personal bests in the shot this past weekend at a meet hosted by Odessa

College. Matney put the shot 54-6 1/2, Calvert 53-0, and Williams 51-6 1/2. The trio are competing at the 51st Annual Border Olympics in Laredo Friday and Saturday.

Cotton Loan Discounts To Be Lower In 1983

For the first time since 1978 discounts on low micronaire High Plains cotton going into the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) loan program on balance will be lower in 1983 than the previous year, according to officials of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

And, discounts applicable to the grades and staples that

normally make up a huge majority of the High Plains crop will be only slightly greater in 1983 than in 1982, they add.

"Unfortunately though," says PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson, "a two-cent drop in the base loan price from which physical prices on all qualities will be figured will more than

offset any advantage gained in the discount schedule."

The schedule of premiums and discounts for grade, staple and micronaire differences was released by CCC February 23. The 1983 upland loan rate is 55 cents per pound, down from the 57.08 cents of 1982, basis Strict Low-Midlin 1-1/6 inches (4-34)cotton, 3.5 to 4.9

micronaire at average U.S. location.

The schedule of base loan rates at each approved warehouse location has not been issued, but PCG has been told, unofficially, that the base rate at Lubbock area warehouse will be 55.20 cents.

Except for the very low grades, discount

increases on cotton stapling an inch or less were minimal, PCG points out, mostly ranging from 5 to 20 points. Discounts on the white grades below Low-Midlin, Low-Midlin Spot and on the cotton stapling over an inch recorded increases as high as 155 points.

Low micronaire, discounts range from a five-point increase in the 3.3 to 3.4 category up to a 40-point decrease in cotton with a micronaire reading of 2.7 to 2.9.

The chart below shows a comparison of quality differentials in the 1982 and 1983 loan schedules.

Motley Library To Get Microcomputer

(Published in IN THE WIND, newsletter of the West Texas Library System.)

The Motley County Library at Matador became the fifth WTLS library to purchase a microcomputer. The library is anticipating delivery of an Apple IIe micro within a few weeks. The computer will be equipped with a disk drive, color monitor, and dot-matrix printer. The total cost of the system will be under \$2,500.

The library plans to use the remainder of its \$4,000 microcomputer project budget to purchase a wide range of educational software for children and adults, as well as to purchase software to improve library productivity. In the latter category will be a program that automatically prints card sets for the card

catalog after input of unit card information.

The Apple IIe, which Motley will purchase, is the newest version of the Apple II, replacing the Apple II+. Some of the improvements include an additional 16,000 characters of internal memory capacity, an IBM-style keyboard, and upper and lower case capability. The Apple IIe has only recently been made available in computer stores.

The library is using Establishment Grant funds from the Texas State Library to make the computer purchase. Since the public schools in Motley County have yet to purchase microcomputers for the school, a high degree of interest in the library micro, particularly from young people, is expected.

PCA Celebrates 50th Anniversary

Production Credit Associations (PCAs) across the nation begin celebrating their 50th anniversary at a meeting in Kansas City, Mo., March 10-11.

A national observance to be attended by PCA directors, presidents and guests, the meeting will revolve around the theme "Lending Strength for Fifty Years." Spokesmen expect approximately 4,500 people to attend.

Rolling Plains Production Credit Association directors attending will be Board Chairman W. J. Boykin, Northfield; Vice Chairman W. H. Williams, Spur; B. H. DeBusk, Anson; Dan Henard Jr., Wellington; and Garon B. Tidwell, Munday. R. C. "Cliff" Cobb, association president, also is planning to attend.

President Ronald Reagan is expected to deliver the keynote address following the noon luncheon, March 11. Secretary of Agriculture John Block will be the featured speaker at the general session. Paul Harvey has been confirmed as the major speaker for the afternoon program.

The Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Texas, which last year provided \$2.5 billion in loan funds to PCAs and Other Financing Institutions (OFIs) in the state, will hold its annual meeting in conjunction with the national celebration. This year's featured speaker will be Marvin R. Duncan, vice president and economist with the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City.

As a gift to American agriculture, PCAs of the nation have contracted the Battelle Memorial Institute in Columbus, Ohio, to conduct a study on the future of

agriculture. Battelle is an internationally acclaimed, nonprofit research firm and is one of the largest privately funded research institutes in the world.

A book and film based on the results of the study will be presented at the meeting.

Rolling Plains PCA is one of the 30 PCAs in Texas. Collectively they serve more than 16,000

agricultural producers and aquatic harvesters. Last year more than \$2 billion was loaned through Texas PCAs.

PCAs have been a source of agricultural loans since 1933.

Nationally they serve the credit needs of more than 380,000 farmers, ranchers and commercial fishermen, with more than \$22 billion in loans outstanding.

Stock Show Set For March 21st

The 43rd annual Motley County Livestock Show will begin Monday, March 21st, at 7:00 a.m. with the weighing in of the animals. Sixteen steers, twenty hogs, and rabbits will be entered in the show.

A breakfast furnished by Billy Wasson and prepared by Walter Jones will be served.

Starting show time is 10:00 a.m. with hogs first, then rabbits and heifers. After a lunch break the steers will be judged. The sale will start immediately after the steers are shown.

Trophies will be given with all but three being sponsored by the Motley County Livestock Association. W.E. Burleson Estate will

furnish the Rate-of-Gain trophy for Best-Gain trophy, and Matador Nursery (Mr. & Mrs. J.C. Cross) will furnish the trophy for Best-Steer Bred in Motley County. Lubbock Livestock Commission will provide the trophy which goes to the Grand Champion steer.

Ribbons will be furnished by the Motley County Farm Bureau. Judge for the show is Bill Gregory from Spur.

Everyone is encouraged to attend the show and sale, and show support to the young FFA and 4-H exhibitors who have worked hard raising and preparing their animals for the annual show.

On March 15, 1983, the semi-annual General Assembly meeting of the South Plains Association of Governments will be held directly following the SPAG Board of Directors Meeting. This annual event will be held at the Southern Seas Restaurant Admiral Room at 10th Street and Avenue Q in Lubbock.

Mr. Harden H. Wiedemann, the newly appointed Director of the Office of Planning and Intergovernmental Relations for the State of Texas, will be the

featured speaker. Prior to assuming his present position Mr. Wiedemann was managing partner of the Wiedemann Company, a Dallas-based planning and consulting firm. A graduate of Harvard and doctoral candidate in International Economics at the Institute of International Studies in Geneva, Mr. Wiedemann has served as editor of Campaigns and Elections Journal, worked with the Democratic National Convention and the United Nations.

Matador Receives \$190,000 Grant

Matador Mayor Gary Lancaster received notice this week that the city will receive a grant of \$190,000 for community development.

Word came from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development that the city's application for the funds had rated high enough to be funded. A formal Grant Agreement is being prepared and will be forwarded for Lan-

caster's approval. Funds were available to respond to application's which rated above 325 points. Matadors application rated 360 points.

A local community planning and development committee had been named to perform a study for target areas in the city for the funds to be used. Without their efforts, this grant would not have been received.

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Tower Appoints Legislative Director

U.S. Senator John Tower (R-Texas) has appointed Frederick D. McClure as his Legislative Director.

McClure came to Senator Tower's staff from the Houston law firm of Reynolds, Allen and Cook. He received a Juris Doctor degree from Baylor University School of Law in 1981. While there, he was president of the Student Bar Association and was elected to the National Order of Barristers. Prior to attending law school, McClure was on Tower's staff, first as Legislative Assistant for agriculture and then as Director of Senator

Tower's state offices. McClure, 29, was graduated summa cum laude from Texas A & M University in 1976. At Texas A & M, he was student body president and received the university's Brown-Rudder Outstanding Student Award. McClure also served as national secretary and Texas state president of the Future Farmers of America. He is a native of San Augustine.

McClure replaces Linden Kettlewell, who left the staff to become counsel to the chairman of the Republican National Committee.

Social Security News

Saving Social Security! The National Commission on Social Security Reform has made its recommendations and Congress must now decide.

Portions of some of these recommendations have been highly publicized while others, it seems, are still widely unknown.

The purposes of this article and the next two articles is to describe the recommendations in perhaps more detail than you have heard previously. Let me emphasize that these are only proposals and to what extent they become law will be determined by Congress.

Let's first talk about two of the proposals that will be most noticeable in the worker's "pocket book". The existing tax rate for scheduled increases is to be "moved up". In 1985, the tax rate is scheduled to increase from 6.7% to 7.05%. The National Commission proposal would have this rate become effective in 1984 instead. A refundable income tax credit would be provided for the employee's amount of this increase. Another "moving up" would occur in 1988 when the tax rate would increase from 7.15% to 7.51%. No other changes to the scheduled tax rate increases have been proposed.

The second "pocket book" proposal affects individuals who are self-employed. Currently, a self-employed person pays a "compromise" between the employee's tax rate and the combined

employee-employer contribution. This amount of 9.35% for 1983. The National Commission proposal would increase the rate to the amount payable by both the employer and employee beginning 1984. This would increase the contribution to 13.40%. HOWEVER, one-half of this contribution would be considered as a business expense for income tax purposes. CURRENTLY, self-employed individuals cannot deduct any of the Social Security taxes being paid as a business expense.

Cost of living increases under present law are automatic in July of each year. The amount of adjustment is measured by the increase in the cost of living from the first quarter of the previous year to the first quarter of the current year. The Commission's proposal is for the cost of living increase in 1983 be delayed until January, 1984. Future increases would be payable early each January instead of July. Also, under this proposal, the adjustment in cost of living

would be measured between the third quarter of the previous and the third quarter of the current year.

Taxation of Social Security benefits is another recommendation. Beginning 1984, 50% of a person's benefits would be taxable if a beneficiary's adjusted income exceeds \$20,000 or \$25,000 for a couple. Social Security benefits would not be used in computing this income. The money from taxation would be transferred through the general revenue to the Social Security Trust funds. It is projected that 10% of the Social Security beneficiaries would be affected by this provision.

Property Taxation Must Be Rendered By May 2

Forrest Campbell, chief appraiser for Motley County Appraisal District, reminds district residents that everyone required to render their taxable property for taxation must file these statements with the appraisal office by May 2. The Texas Property Tax Code is specific in listing property which must be rendered to the chief appraiser for taxation.

A taxpayer must render all taxable personal property used for the production of income if, on January 1 of the tax year, he owns the property or manages and controls it as a fiduciary.

According to Campbell, rendition statements are filed with the

chief appraiser of the appraisal district in which the property is located.

Any taxpayer who believes that his property's value has decreased during the preceding tax year, for any reason other than normal depreciation, may submit a "report of decreased value" to the chief appraiser. This report describes the property involved and states the nature and cause of the decrease.

Forms for rendition and the report of decreased value are obtainable from the Motley County Tax office. Anyone filing a rendition or report must include all the information requested on the form, and it must be signed by the property

owner or an authorized individual.

When rendering property, it is not necessary to state a market value for it, Campbell said. However, a taxpayer may continue to include its opinion of its market value and thus be assured of official notification in case the appraisal office places a different value on the property.

Campbell also said that renditions and property reports are now confidential and no longer open to public inspection.

The forms should be filed with the County Tax Office by May 2.

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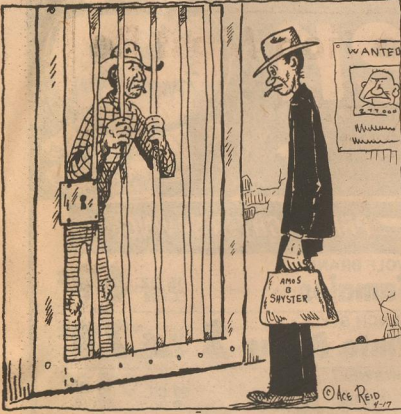

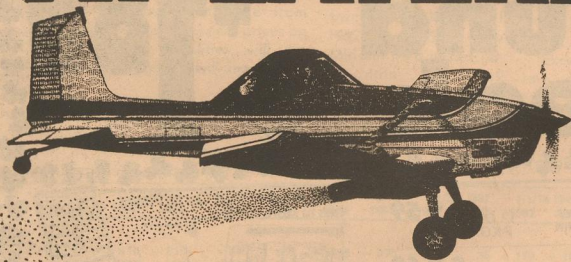
