Local Telephone Repair Service Could Save Customers Money

"We have responded telephone customers in Matador, Roaring Matador, Roaring Springs and Dickens can avoid charges that now apply if the customers request the company send em-ployees to the customer's premises to repair company-owned tele

Jimmy Bennett, Operations Manager for General Telephone in Memphis, said the Public Utility Commis-sion of Texas, May 19, approved a \$22.50 charge for single-line business and \$17.00 for residential customers residential customers
who have service
problems associated
with the telephone
instrument and who instrument and who prefer the company to send an employee to the customer's premise to make the repair rather than bring the instrument to the local

Instrument to the local service agency. In addition, there are separate charges for each telephone outlet repaired if the problem is in the house wiring and the customer prefers to have the telephone company make the reapirs rather than purchasing a repair kit to make the repair themselves, or have a third party make the repairs. Wiring charges were started in 1982 but were in-

to customers' requests

premises for years, and we are more than pleased to respond now", he said. "The now", he said, "The only change brought about by deregulation, is that we must charge a fee to recover those expenses from custo-mers requesting the

"However by bringing their single-line residential or business telephone instrument to the local service agency and having the repair made, the customer can avoid the charge. avoid the charge associated with sending Bennett said. "Wiring and jack kits are available at the local service agency to repair house wiring problems or replace the hardwired outlets with new jacks to avoid charges associated with the company sending an employee to do the work."

He explained the charge for sending an employee to a customer's premise to repair a telephone instrument is not a charge to make the repair, but rather to recover the costs associated with sending an employee to the premise.

premise.
"The charges for these services will help keep local basic rates lower than they would

be otherwise", he explained. "It offers customers the opportunity to participate in the try to participate in the maintenance of their service to keep local rates as low as possible while providing customers a more convenient repair service. by making it possible for them to bring their phone in, at their convenience, rather than waiting on service personnel to arrive at

"Of course for those customers who prefer a premise visit, we will respond for a charge", Bennett explained.

He said the changes are a result of the Federal Communications Commission deregulation of acregitation of terminal equipment; other regulatory decisions which encourage competition; and the need to keep monthly local service low as possible

low as possible.

"Charges for services
that do not recover the
costs of providing those
services are paid by all
customers through
higher monthly local
service rates", he
explained. "With the
change to a deregular
ed environment each ed enviornment, each individual service must become more cost based, otherwise local rates will be much

higher.
"Under the new charging structure, only customers receiving the service will pay the charges."
