**Matadors Lose** First District Game

A county-wide meeting held Tuesday in the problem faced by local District Court room in lawmen.

The jail in Matador was shut down two years ago because it did not meet Texas jail standards and since then lawmen have been then lawmen have been transporting prisoners to Floyd County at a cost of \$30 per man per night, provided Motley County can pick up the prisoners the next morning if possible.

With new D.W.I. laws in Texas, local lawmen are required to lock up second offenders for 15 days. There are people

second oftenders for 13 days. There are people roaming the streets of Matador, according to local lawmen, who should be in jail but are roaming the local streets because there is no jail here.

streets because there is no jail here.

These were a few of the problems discussed at the meeting and the Motley County commissioners agreed with the lawmen that a jail was peeded here. needed here

The problem is, how to get a jail. Commiss-

sion it was decided the old jail could not be rebuilt to meet stand-ards, partly because it is a historical building

minimum, would be
approximately
\$165,000. This cost was
estimated for the
building, alone, not
including insurance or
other cost.

Caprock Gin's first Caprock Gin's first bale weighed about 520 pounds and produced 850 pounds of seed, with a 22 percent turn out. Flomot Co-Op's first bale weighed 560 pounds and produced almost 1000 pounds of seed.



By Terry J. Clements protection under Social Security. All earnings that a person has over his or her working lifetime are recorded under that number, and if an incorrect number is used, that person may not receive proper credit for all of his or her

People should always carry their Social Security card with them when they get a new job and make sure the employer copies the name and number just as it is shown on the

A person should keep a record of his or her number in a safe place. Then if the original card is lost, a new card with the old Social Security number can be ob-tained easier than if the number were not

known.

If a person ever becomes aware that he or she has more than one Social Security

number, he or she should contact a Social Security office right away. The people there will help get the situations cleared up so

It is against the law for a person to use someone else's Social Security number. It is also against the law for a person to give false information when obtaining a number. Penalties include a fine or jail sentence or both. It is a good idea for a

person to check his or Social Security her Social Security record every 3 years or so to make sure earnings are being correctly reported. This is especially important if the person changes jobs

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
