### **Public Notice**

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC), hereby gives notice of the Company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas for optional Custom Calling Services and Touch-tone service, effective March 15, 1993, unless otherwise determined by the PUC.

These proposed rates will not increase or decrease the Company's overall revenues; the net effect will be neutral to the Company's annual revenues.

The Company proposes to decrease the rates for Touch-tone service for residential customers from \$1.70 to \$6 cents, and also to reduce the Touch-tone rates for business customers from \$1.75 to \$1.70. In addition, the Touch-tone rates for business PBX trunks will be reduced from \$3.15 to \$2.18.

This proposal to decrease the rates for Touch-tone service does not change the commitment that the Company made in the Docket No. 8585 Stipulation to reduce the rates for Touch-tone service in 1993.

The Custom Calling Services affected by the Company's application are optional telephone service arrangements that provide the following features: Call Waiting, Call Forwarding, Three Way Calling, Speed Calling-30 and Speed Calling-30. Following are the feature combinations and their current and proposed rates.

Most of the Company's residence and business customers who subscribe to Custom Calling Features and Touch-tone service will be affected by the proposed rate restructuring. It is expected that the restructuring of Custom Calling Features will result in a rate increase for approximately 2.9 million residence customers and 280,000 business customers. The reduction in rates for certain Custom Calling Services and Touch-tone Service will affect approximately 4.3 million residence customers and 1.7 million business customers.

This rate restructuring is expected to have a "revenue-neutral" effect on the Company's annual revenues. The proposed rate restructuring of Custom Calling Services will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$19.8 million; while the reduction in Touch-tone rates will decrease the Company's annual revenues by \$19.8 million.

# Betty's Tax Talk

The right to protest to the appraisal review board is the most important right you have as a taxpayer. You can protest if you disagree with any of the actions the you usagree win any or in each of sa appraisal district has taken on your prop-erty. You can discuss your concerns about your property value and exemptions in an informal session with an impartial panel

of your fellow citizens.

Most appraisal district will informally review your protest with you to try to solve problems. Check with your district

WHAT IS AN APPRAISAL
REVIEW BOARD?
An appraisal review board (ARB) is a
group of citizens authorized to check the
appraisal district's work and resolve dis-

putes with taxpayers.

ARB members are appointed by the appraisal district's board of directors. An individual must be a resident of the appraisal district for at least two years to serve on the ARB. Officers and employees of the appraisal district, the local taxing units or the state Comproller's Office cannot serve on a review board.

office cannot serve on a review board.

ARB members also must comply with special conflict of interest laws.

ARB meetings are open to the public.

Notices of the date, time and place of each meeting must be posted at least 72 your protest issue with the appraisal office and at the County Clerk's office. The settlement of the county Clerk's office. office and at the County Clerk's office. The ARB's hearing procedures must be posted in a prominent place in the room in which hearings are held.

#### SHOULD YOU PROTEST?

The ARB must base its decisions on evidence. It hears evidence from both sides — the taxpayer and the chief ap-

Following is a list of protest issues that an ARB can consider and suggestins on evidence you may want to gather.

\*. If the proposed value of your property is too high, ask one of the district's erty is too high, ask one of the districts appraisers to explain the appraisal. Be sure the property description is correct. Are the measurements for your home or business and lot correct? Gather blueprints, deed records, photographs, a survey or your own measurements.

\* If your property valued is unequally compared with other property in the appriasal district, see if the value of your property is closer to market value than

property is closer to market value than other similar properties. For example, your property may be appraised at 80 percent of market value, while your neighbors' property may be appraised at 60 percent of market value. A protest based on the level of appraisal may require complex evidence. Ask an appriaser or attorney for advice before filing a protest based on this issue

\* If the chief appraiser denies you an exemption, first, find out why the chief appraiser denied your exemption. If the chief appraiser denied your homestead exemption, find out why the chief appraiser denied your homestead exemption, for part of the land around your homes, show how much land is used. your home, show how much land is used

as a yard.
\* If the chief appraiser denies agricultural appraisal for your farm or ranch, your application. Agricultural appraisal

laws have specific requirements involv-ing ownershp and use of the property. Gather your ownership records, oper-ating budgets and other financial records or get information from local agencies that provide services to farmers and ranch-

ers.
\* If the chief appraiser wrongly determines that your land has been taken out of agricultural use, determine if agriculture and the chief appraise on your land. agricultura use, otermine it agriculture activity is still taking place on your land. If only part has been taken out of agricultural use, you may need to show which parts still qualify. If you are letting land lie fallow, show that the time it has been out of agricultural use is not excessive.

\*If your property is being taxed by the wrong taxing unit, an error of this sort is often simply a clerical error.

\*If your property is incorrectly included on the appraisal records, you can protest the inclusion of your property on the appraisal records if it should be taxed at another location in Texas.

\* If the chief appraiser of ARB fails to send you a notice that the law requires them to send, you have the right to protest the chief appraiser or ARB failed to give you a required notice.

A notice is presumed delivered if sent by first-class mail with a correct name and address. Your faiure to receive a properly mailed notice does not give you the right to a late hearing

\* If there is any other action the appraisal district or ARB took that affects ou, you have the right to protest any oppraisal district action. For instance, the

When you present your protest to the ARB, you may appear in person, send someone to present the protest for you or send a sworm affidavit containing the windame to unprote your protest.

BE WARY OF PYRAMID SCHEMES

If it sounds too good to be true, it probably isn't true. Taking that old-fashioned advice could save you a lot of

money and maybe even your sanity if you are ever confronted with a sales pressure to participate in a pyramid scheme.

Even though they are illegal, pyramid sales schemes continue to entice the unwary but trusting consumer. Yet, if the diminshing odds of gain were ever explained to consumers, few would ever be taken in Like chain letters warmid. taken in. Like chain letters, pyramid schemes are fraudulent and illegal. They are deceptive, and participants can wind up in trouble with the law. In pyramid schemes, people at the

bottom of the pyramid pay money to a few people at the top. Each new partici-pant pays for the chance to advance to the top and profit from payments of others who might join later. Sounds simple enough, but it sounds a lot better than it

Here's an example of how some pyramid schemes work. Envision a giant pyramid (like a triangle, with the biggest base at the bottom) with five horizontal rows or layers. There's one position on the row at the very top; the next row has two positions; the next row has four positions; the next row has eight positions; and the last or bottom row has sixteen positions. Suppose someone asked you to make a \$1,000 investment. It would you to make as 1,000 investment. It would buy you a position at the bottom of the pyramid. Half the money would go to the person in the position directly above you in the pyramid. The other half (\$500) would go all the way to the top of the pyramid, to the promoter. If all the positions on the pyramid chart fill up, the promoter will collect \$16,000 and you and the other participate on the bottom. and the other participants on the bottom will each be \$1,000 poorer.

Once the promoter is paid off, the top position is removed, and the second level becomes the top or payoff level. Only then do the two people on the second level begin to profit. But to pay off these two, 32 empty positons have to be added to the bottom of the triangle. New people

those positions; otherwise, the two at the top do not prosper.

Each time a level rises to the top of the pyramid, a new level has to be added to pyramid, a new level has to be added in the bottom. Each new bottom level has to be two times the size of the previous level. This means finding twice as many people. If you joined the pyramid with 15 other people and managed to make it to the top, 512 people would have to be found in order to make in prosper. The found in order to make in prosper. The whole pyramid is likely to collapse long before that occurs. Pyramids can't work unless there is a never ending supply of new participants. The reality is that the supply of participants is very limited. Each new level of participants have less of a chance of recruiting others and more of a chance of losing money.

Why pyramid schemes cannot work is all based on arithmetic. Since each new level of participants has to be twice as large as the previous level, it does not take long to run out of people. To prove this, do the arithmetic, either using a paper and pencil or an electronic calculapaper and pencil or an electronic calculator. Start with the number one. To find the number of people needed for the next level, multiply by two. That gives you two. Repeat this for all future levels. Doubling each level will mean that from a beginning number of one, you would need two, then four, then eight, then 16, then 32, then 64, then 128, then 256, then 512, then 1,024, then 2,048, then 32,768. Nine more levels and you will be very near the total population of the State of Texas. Keep going. Soon you will exhaus the population of the United States, and then the world. Simple arithmetic. So, just remember, if an offer sounds too good - check it out. And be careful.





### **Public Notice**

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has asked the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) for approval to offer new optional call management services called Caller Identification Service (Caller ID) and Anonymous Call Rejection (ACR).

Caller ID is a new optional phone service which allows subscribers to see the phone number and/or name of most local calls before they answer the phone. Caller ID also allows the recording of the date, time, name and/or phone number of calls. Currently, Caller ID would work only on most local calls, not long distance earls. It would be a serviced to the caller in t

date, time, name and/or phone number of calls. Currently, Caller ID would work only on most local calls, not long distance calls. It would also require that a separate display unit be connected to the telephone. These units that attach to the telephone will be available from various retail vendors, including Southwestern Bell, at a cost starting at approximately \$50.

Southwestern Bell is also proposing that all customers be able to "block," or stop their name/number from being transmitted and displayed on a Caller ID device, free of charge. You would have this option of "blocking" your name/number on each call free of charge. There would be no need to subscribe to this service. All customers would have this capability when Caller ID is introduced in their area.

If you want to block your name or number, you need only press "67 on your touch-tone pad (or dial 1167 from a rotary phone) before dialing the telephone number. The person you're calling would see displayed a message such as "private" or "anonymous" on their Caller ID display unit.

Southwestern Bell also proposes that qualified domestic violence and law enforcement groups have the option of free per-line blocking, or free per-call blocking.

Anonymous Call Rejection (ACR or "block the blocker") allows subscribers to automatically reject all calls that have been marked anonymous, or "blocked" by the person calling, it is not necessary to subscribe to Caller ID Name/Number to subscribe to ACR. With ACR, your telephone will not ring if the person calling you has "blocked" his/her name or number. The person calling whose identification is blocked will receive a message to hang up and call back fication is blocked will receive a message to hang up and call back with caller identification unblocked. Following are the proposed monthly rates for Caller ID and ACR.

Anonymous Call Rejection is \$3 per month if purchased without Caller ID and is \$1 per month when purchased with Caller ID Name or

Texas wiretap laws.
