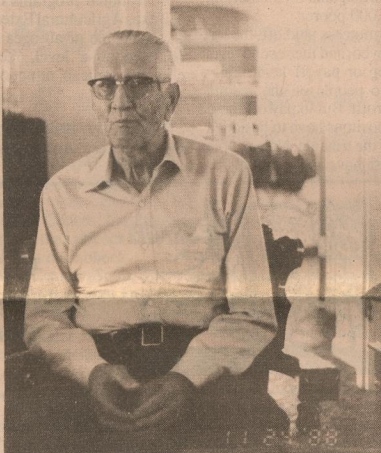

Roaring Springs Names Senior Citizen of the Year

Carl Tardy was elected recently as Senior Citizen of the Year to represent the Roaring Springs Senior Citizens.

Carl owned and operated Tardy Barber Shop in Roaring Springs for 35 years. He worked at barber shops in Floydada and Matador before buying the Roaring Springs shop in 1940 from D.A. "Brown" Hinson. He was married to Lelia Ren-

fro, deceased. They had one son, Don Carl and two grandsons.

Carl is 91 years old and still cuts a head of hair now and then. When someone wasn't able to get to the shop, he would go to their home and cut their hair. He has always been willing and ready to be a good neighbor and friend.

Additional Disaster Assistance Available

President George Bush announced an additional \$755 million in emergency funds for crop losses incurred in 1990, 1991, and 1992, when he appeared in Shallowater, last Wednesday.

This is in addition to the \$955 million disaster assistance for 1990-91 crops announced by Jerrv D. Harris, Chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee, January 2.

The application period for disaster claims on fall-seeded program crops planted in 1991 and harvested in 1992 will begin Sept. 8 and end Oct. 2, Harris said.

The application period for producers with losses on other 1992 crops, and for producers with losses from 1990 or 1991 crops who did not previously receive disaster payments for those losses, will begin on October 13 and end Feb. 12, 1993.

"Disaster assistance is available on a per-farm basis for any two years of 1990, 1991 or 1992," Harris said. The original program provided \$955 million for either 1990 or 1991. Now, relief will also be provided for fall-seeded program crops planted in 1991 for harvest in 1992.

"Producers will be eligible to apply for assistance on 1990, 1991 or 1992 crop losses; however, if producers received assistance for any of those years they may not receive further assistance for that crop year. Producers who receive payments for fall-seeded program crops will only be eligible for assistance for 1992 crop losses."

Producers with qualifying gross revenues of less than \$2 million per year may file claims for losses of participating and nonparticipating program and nonprogram crops.

"Producers with crop insurance must have had losses greater than 35 percent," Harris said. "Producers without crop insurance must have had losses greater than 40 percent. Producers with 1992 crop losses are required, under certain conditions, to purchase crop insurance for 1993."

Harris said producers intending to file for assistance would begin to assemble their records now, so they will be ready when the official application period opens and they should contact their county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office for additional information.

Hospital Board Meets

The Motley County Hospital Board met September 8 at 7:00 a.m. with Charley Johnson, James Stanley, Tom Bowman, and JoAnn Durham. James Gillespie and Tony Rose were absent.

After one correction the minutes were accepted. Bills were approved.

Johnson explained that the fiscal year begins October 1 with tax funds coming in by the end of October, and that repairs and maintenance was low this past year. Other items discussed:

* Ambulance billing is still not being done as Board would like. Bowman said he will get run report forms from other Ambulance services. These could help get the billing done quicker.

* Bowman reported the purchase of the equipment to upgrade the ambulance has been made. It will take 2-3 months to be approved and certified by TDH (Texas Dept. of Health).

Meeting adjourned.

Motley County had a total of 267 yards rushing. Frankie Ortiz had 138 yards rushing and Robert Osborn had 52.

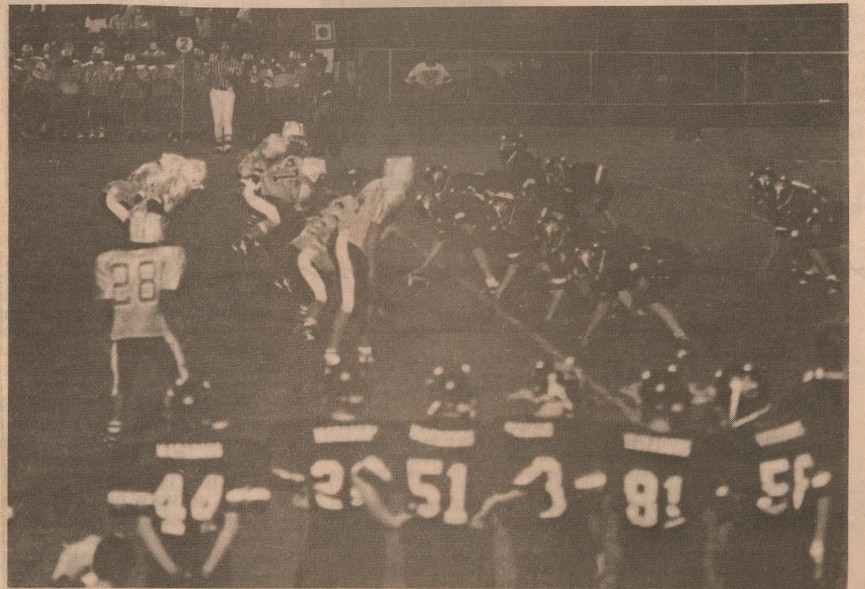
Motley County had 12 first downs to Hale Center's 17.

A Most Unusual Gift

The Motley County Museum has received a wide array of items, donations, and memorials, but perhaps the most unusual to catalog has come from the Hines family, two city lots.

Lot 4 of Block 110 between Conrad Zarate property and Lot 8 of Block 103 between Travis Jameson and T.B. Edmondson properties have been deeded to the museum as a memorial to the family of Henry and Minnie Martin Hines and their children E.J., Coc, Clay, Howe, and Ott.

Clay Hines of Cedar Hill near Dallas and Coe Hines of Burleson join living relatives Patty Benson of Parowan, Utah; Vandia Coburn of Lubbock; John Hines of Carlsbad; Lydia Hines of Carlsbad; Hal Dean Hines of Sunnyvale near Dallas; Jean Carpenter of San Marcos; and Alita Beth Hines of Fort Worth in making this unique presentation.

The well known farm family of the Whiteflat and Flomot communities lived there until the 50's when Mrs. Hines was widowed and she moved to Matador. There she and her son, Ott, lived at the far west end of Dundee Street in a brown

stucco house.

"Aunt Minnie", as we knew her, was always in place on Saturday afternoon, her car parked in a strategic position on the Main Street of Matador, ready to visit with anyone among the throngs that crowded the shops on trade day. Ott, deafened by a freak lightning strike that once hit his tractor as he plowed, worked for the city and was very active in the Boy Scout program. E.J. served as superintendent of schools at Flomot. Howe who farmed in the Dougherty community was active in the Masons organization. Later Clay, E.J., and Coe sought their fortunes in the territory of New Mexico.

A little historical research unearthed some folklore on why city lots are unusually narrow, only 25 feet wide. The story goes, in the days of the organization of the county in the early 1890's, two townsites were being banded about.

According to T.L. Allison, editor of the *Matador Messenger*, a section of land had been patented by H.H. Campbell and sold to a townsite company which had it surveyed and platted into town lots. As the day of the election drew near, a

stranger, a mysterious Mr. Rayner, appeared on the scene with another proposition.

"Five lots for each vote cast for my townsite," hawked Rayner, who had secured a section of land east of town (later owned by the W.E. Reeves family). The Matador proponents, caught up in the fever of the game, upped the ante and offered ten lots for a vote.

Allison summed up the situation, then "....they became alarmed lest they would not have enough lots to go around so they cut their lots to two - and that is the reason lots in Matador are only 25 feet wide.

When the election was held at the ranch headquarters, Matador townsites won out by an overwhelming majority. "Now" as commentator Paul Harvey might say, "you know the rest of the story."

Whatever the size, and no matter that they won't fit in the file cabinet, the museum says thanks to the Hines Family for their donation toward preserving a portion of the past for the future.

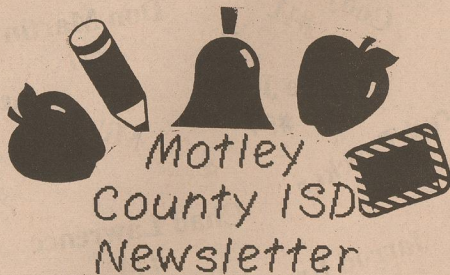

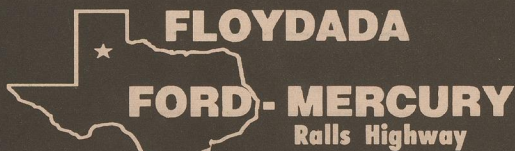

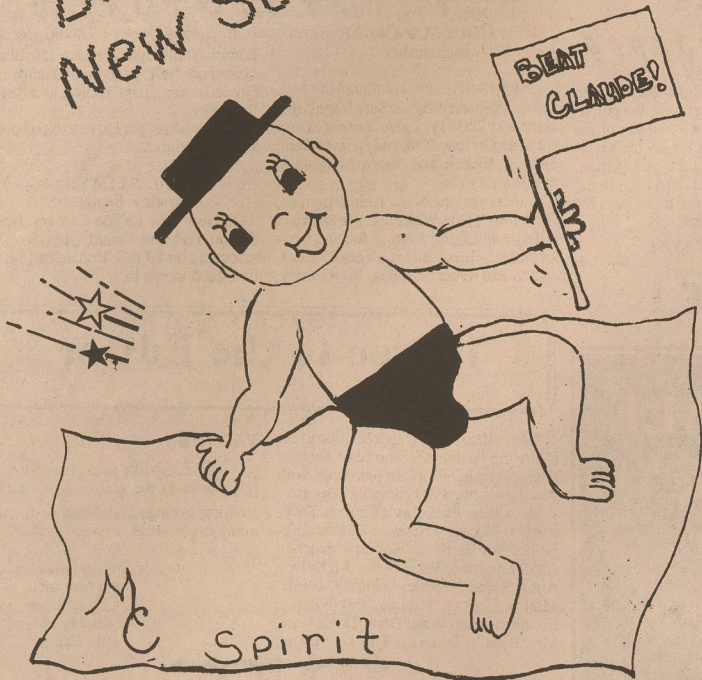
