Highway Rehabilitation Work Scheduled In Motley County

Work in Motley County is included in a huge highway rehabilitation and improvement program approved recently by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

District Engineer Lewis H. White said the work in this area is part of a statewide effort to modernize roads and highways which are worn

out or inadequate for today's traffic.

Area projects for Motley County include Highway number SH 70, located from 4.7 miles North of Matador, South to Roaring Springs, with the length being 12.3 miles. A seal coat will be the type of work done with the estimated cost being \$230,000-C and Highway Number US 62, located from SH 70 in Matador, East to Cottle C/L. The length of this project will be 18.3 miles. A seal coat will also be put on this road with an estimated cost of \$320,000-C.

The 1982 Rehabilitation and State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improve-

ment Program will cost today an estimated \$218.9 million.

The program includes improvement and rehabilitation of 5,335.3 miles of state-maintained highways. In all, there are 892 separate projects in 214 counties of the state. The work includes projects which will upgrade existing highways to handle heavier volumes of traffic, enhance safety, reduce the amount and kind of maintenance necessary and to protect the large public investment in the highways of Texas.

Almost 70 percent of the work is on US- and State-numbered highways in Texas with the remainder being on FM roads.

Fish Fry Successful In Spite of Rainfall

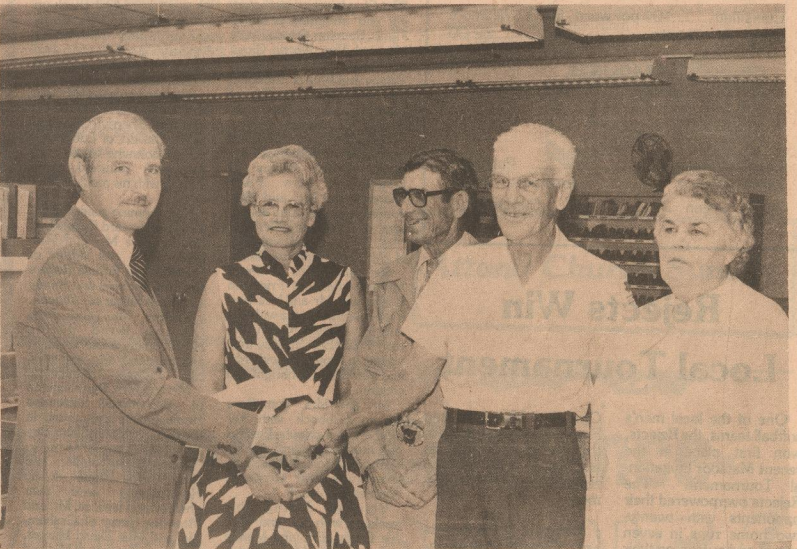

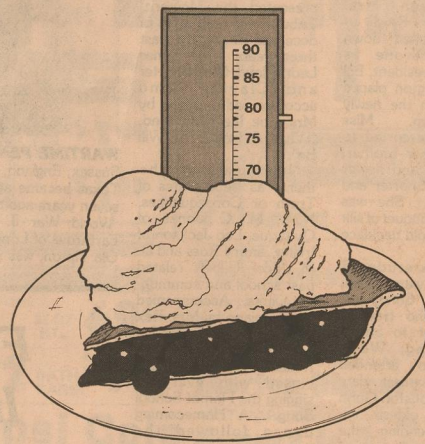

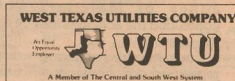

Jack Robinson Jr., became acquainted with Miss Earthrowl while serving with the 406th Fighter Group of the 9th Air Force which supported General Patton's 3rd Army across Europe during the war. Robinson, now a retired Lieutenant Colonel, had read letters in the Matador Tribune, which Miss Earthrowl had written, describing the German Air Force blitz. She was among the children and young people who were evacuated to areas in the country during the blitz.
