Native Son Preaches Here Sunday At Methodist Church

A Matador native was guest speaker Sunday at the First United Methodist Church here, of which his great-grandparents and maternal grandmother were charter members.

Dr. Dan E. Solomon, pastor of Travis Park United Methodist Church, San Antonio, spoke from the pulpit of a new, modern edifice. His great-grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. T. N. Edmondson, with a small group of pioneers, including members of their family, had organized the church in 1892, under cottonwood trees on Ballard Creek, northeast of the townsite. Among the members was Dan's grandmother, Fannie Edmondson, later Mrs. F. M. Jinkins. The son of Mrs. Mabel (Jinkins) Soloman and the late Henry Soloman, Dan was born in Matador and started to school here. His parents later moved to Tulia and he grew up on a farm near Tulia. He is a graduate of Tulia High School and was class Valedictorian.

He felt the call to the ministry while still in high school, and his continuing education was to that end. He holds the Bachelor of Arts degree (Summa Cum Laude) from McMurry



College, Abilene. He received his Masters of Theology Degree (with honors) Perkins School of Theology Southern Methodist University, and was the winner of that school's Wm. B. DeJernett Award in Homiletics. The Doctor of Ministry Degree was completed at United Theological Seminary (United Methodist), Dayton, Ohio.



Summer means hot weather in Texas along with outdoor sports and long lazy days. It also means lawn problems-drought, weeds, insects and disease.

Lawn problems can cause headaches for homeowners unless the problems are accurately diagnosed and properly treated before they become severe.

treated before they become severe. Dry spots, thin turf and weeds can result from improper watering, fertilizing and mowing practices. Before applying a chemical to correct lawn problems, be sure to follow recommended cultural practices.

Drought stress most often occurs in midsummer and shows up as wilted, discolored turf. Adjust watering schedules

Adjust watering schedules to wet the soil to a depth of four to six inches, and water only when grass

Motley County Ex shows symptoms of moisture stress. Also, raise mowing heights one-half to improve drought tolerance in mid-summer. Lack of nitrogen or iron often creates a lawn problem. Grass with a nitrogen deficiency may have a pale color and be heavily infested with weeds.

Abundant seedheads are another symptom of nitrogen deficiency. A light application of a nitrogen fertilizer will improve the lawn's appearance.

Grass leaves that have yellow stripes parallel to the leaf margins may be deficient in iron. An application of iron sulfate or iron chelate at six ounces per 1,000 square feet will usually solve this problem.

If a St. Augustine lawn

If a St. Augustine lawn has symptoms similar to nitrogen or iron deficiency

tension Agent
but does not respond to
applications of either
material, suspect St.
Augustine Decline
(S.A.D.). Close examination of turf infected with
S.A.D. shows green and
yellow blotches on the
leaves. Continue good
maintenance practices
where S.A.D. is a problem.
Also, Floratam, a new St.
Augustine variety which is
resistant to S.A.D., may be
spriggened into the
infected area.

Leaf spot diseases are
generally a problem when
lawns are under stress and
increase with high
temperatures, drought,
heavy shade and close
mowing. Proper mowing
and watering will reduce
these problems, but
fungicides may be required
to prevent serious
damage.

Chinch bugs and white

damage.
Chinch bugs and white grubs feed heavily on lawns during mid-summer,

and their damage resembles drought injury. If turf does not respond to applications of water, suspect these insects. Both pests damage St. Augustine grass, but only the white grub damages bermuda grass.

Chinch bugs and white grubs can be effectively controlled with insecticides. Water the lawn thoroughly prior to applying an insecticide for chinch bug control. Alight watering after applying the insecticide also increases its effectiveness. You should drench the lawn after an insecticide is applied for grub control since grub feeds in the soil.

The best way to keep a healthy, attractive lawn is through proper mowing, watering and fertilization. These regular maintenance practices allow you to keep a check on lawn conditions so that you'll be able to detect a problem early, should one develop.




