Three big days of celebrating, visiting and rodeoing will start today at 10 a.m. with a parade in downtown Roaring Springs as the 58th annual Motley-Dickens Old Settlers Reunion and Rodeo gets underway.

The traditional Old Settlers Memorial Service will be at 11 a.m. today (Thursday) with the business meeting starting at 1 p.m.

County roping will follow the business meeting. Entries will be

taken from 12:00 noon to 1 p.m. Spurs will be awarded to the winners.

One highlight of the Old Settlers Reunion will be the crowning of the Rodeo Queen, the winner being determined by the number of tickets contestants sold on a hand made saddle. Two dances will be held each night with the Young Folks Dance beginning at 9:30 nightly, with the Maines Brothers Band performing, and the Old Timers Dance at 8:30, with Donnie Richardson performing. There will also

be free dancing under the pavillion each afternoon.

Rodeo performances will be Thursday, Friday and Saturday night at 8 p.m.

Rodeo performance will be in the tradition of the wild west with saddle bronc riding, bareback riding, bull riding, barrel race, calf roping, Old Men's Roping, and tie down, break-away roping, team roping, kid's flag race and queen contest.

There will also be a kid's calf scramble each night.

A Pioneer Wedding

The first marriage rites performed in Motley County were those uniting Ella Eugenia Cribbs and Daniel Crawford Keith on December 23, 1891. The following announcement of the wedding was copied from The Motley County News, December 1891:

"On this morning at 9 o'clock a.m. at the residence of Mrs. Mittie McDonalds, Mr. D. C. Keith to Miss Ella E. Cribbs, Esq. McHugh officiating. Mr. Keith is one of Motley County's most industrious young men, while Miss Ella who has been amongst us but a short time has gained the love and affection of all. Mr. Walter A. Walton and Mr. H. L. White acting as groomsmen and the bride's two lovely sisters, Miss Maggie and Miss Carrie Cribbs acting as bridesmaids. May their pathway be strewn with flowers and no sorrow ever be their lot is the best wishes of a friend." This was written by Walter A. Walton, County Clerk at that time, and who later became the husband of Miss Carrie Cribbs, sister of Miss Ella.

The McDonald Line Camp, where the marriage took place was on the Matador Ranch and later was designated as the McDonald pasture. Although the house is still standing, no one has lived there for many years.

The courtship of Miss Cribbs and Mr. Keith was an unusual one. In 1885, Bud Merriman, a cowboy friend of Mr. Keith, was planning to return to Granbury, Texas, but went by the Matador Ranch to see Mr. Keith before leaving. During the conversation Mr. Keith was saying how lonesome he would be during the long winter months on the ranch, so he asked Mr. Merriman if he knew some nice young lady that would write to him. Mr. Merriman told him about Miss Ella Cribbs, so Mr. Keith wrote her a letter.

The day the letter came to the home of the Cribbs, they were moving so the letter was thrown unopened into a trunk with some more letters. Miss Cribbs forgot about the letter until a month later when she was looking for something in the trunk, and found it. After much persuasion by her sisters, she decided to answer the letter, "from that old cowboy," as she called him when talking to her sisters. This correspondence went on for about five years

before they saw each other. During Christmas of 1890, Mr. Keith decided to visit Miss Cribbs for the first time. He arrived in Granbury late one afternoon and went to the Sheriff's office to inquire where the Cribbs family lived. After getting the required information he hired a horse at the livery stable and went on to the Cribbs home which was a few miles out of town. He visited in the Cribbs home for a week.

The Cribbs family moved to Motley County in 1891. It took three weeks to make the trip. Miss Ella had been in Motley County exactly one month before her marriage, having arrived on November 23, 1891.

The bride's dress was made by Mrs. Frank Baxter, wife of one of the first and best known blacksmiths on the Matador Ranch. Mrs. Baxter had formerly been a dressmaker in Kansas City, Missouri. She had the only sewing machine in the county at that time, and it took a week to make the dress. The material for the dress was grey cashmere, trimmed with grey velvet. It was made on a cambric foundation. The dress was a two-piece basque. It had nine steel buttons on each sleeve and six on the front. It was indeed a beautiful dress, and has been used for many occasions where old costumes are needed.

Because of the slow conveyance, Mr. Keith was an hour late for the wedding. One of the cowboys who arrived early began to tease Miss Ella about the late bridegroom and offered to take his place. However, Miss Ella told him she would wait. Mr. Keith finally arrived with the preacher, who was a Catholic from Ireland. The preacher had his marriage ceremony memorized and had repeated it many times to Mr. Keith on the way, but when he started to perform the ceremony he forgot it and had to take his copy out of his pocket and read it.

The Keiths began housekeeping in their first home, a half-dugout on the North Pease River at a Matador Ranch line camp. Later they filed on land south of Matador, and for about 40 years Mr. Keith shipped cattle for the Matador Ranch, and farmed his land.

Mr. and Mrs. Keith had six children, all born in Motley County. Nannie

Sue was born on December 25, 1892; Mary May, on May 1, 1894; Gilbert C. on February 3, 1896; Dan Phi, on August 30, 1897; Hester Sophronia (Helen), on April 2, 1899; and Charlie Benjamin, on August 13, 1904.

D. C. Keith passed away on January 3, 1933. Mrs. Keith and her daughter

Mary built a home in Matador where Mrs. Keith lived for three and a half years before her death on July 1, 1943. Mrs. Keith lived 10 and a half years after the death of her husband.

(Mrs. Keith told this story to Mrs. Bertha Stearns in an interview about 1940.)

Construction To Begin On New Fire Station

The Matador Volunteer Fire Department will start construction on a new fire station in Matador in two to three weeks. Bids are being received at this time for a steel structure 60'x100' in size. Members of the department will do a great deal of the construction in order to keep costs down on this project.

In a meeting August 13th, City officials and members of the county Commissioners' Court met and discussed the funding of the new fire station. They have agreed to fund the project equally as each own fire fighting equipment and apparatus operated by the Matador volunteers. City and County officials stressed the fact that funds will be secured from existing budgets and that no tax increases will be imposed to pay for the new fire station.

Matador's fire department has grown in size over the past few years from an average roll of 20 members in 1978 to an average of 26 members in 1981. The department has the manpower to provide the citizens of Matador, Roaring Springs, Flomot, Northfield, and the entire county with fire protection. The number of fire fighting units has also grown. At the present time 7 pieces of fire fighting apparatus and one power plant are being operated with plans to acquire more in the future.

The new fire station, when completed will house all of the existing equipment with room for future expansion. At this time city and county equipment is being kept at two locations with one unit being left outside and one unit being driven by the fire chief because of lack of space in the present station. By housing all equipment in one structure and one central location, response time will be greatly reduced. This means that firemen will get to your home quicker should you have a fire.

Another advantage of the new fire station will be that equipment and apparatus can receive proper servicing throughout the year. The present fire station does not have a complete floor therefore servicing is very difficult to perform. The new fire station will be completely

sealed from adverse weather making servicing easy to perform outside the weather outside. Housing the units that cannot fit into the existing station will greatly add to the life of these vehicles.

The new fire station will have a meeting room and kitchen on the east side for use by members of the department and other civic organizations.

Funding for this space will be provided by donations and fund raising projects. Many persons have donated money for this project and all future donations will be greatly appreciated. The continued support from the citizens of Motley County guarantees a quality fire department such as the Matador Volunteer Fire Department.

Singing Convention County's First Organization

A handsome banner inscribed "Motley County Singing Convention Banner Class-1892" now hanging in the corridors of the county courthouse is the last visible reminder of the first organized group of people in the county. According to Mrs. Harvey Taylor, the former Mrs. Bruce Martin who served as the last secretary of the convention, the last meeting was held in October of 1979, after 87 years of continuous singing sessions twice yearly.

A little band of pioneers met in the Whiteflat community in June of 1892 and organized the Motley County Singing Convention, and on June 28, 1942 they again met at Whiteflat for their Golden Anniversary. F. M. Casey was president that year, and the only surviving member of the original group, still affiliated and taking part in the "singsings" was W. J. Whitworth, the first president. (Many years later his son, J. R. Randall, served as president.)

Others who played an active part in the early history of the association included Mrs. Margaret Newman, W. T. Cammack, G. E. Hamilton, Mrs. John Smith, A. B. Echols, W. R. Tison, T. N. Edmondson, J. L. Burleson, Wade Martin, R. H. Tanner, Mrs. C. E. Harris, Mrs. J. L. Moore, Rev. R. L. Jameson, T. M. Dixon, L. A. Carlisle, and many more.

The meetings at first were "dinner on the ground and singing all day," affairs and were held

alternately at Whiteflat and Flomot. A later meeting was held at Flag Springs, and eventually, the American Legion Building in Matador became the permanent meeting place for the singers. Meetings were held the fourth Sunday in June and the third Sunday in October. Meetings in recent years were at the Assembly of God Church in Roaring Springs.

When Randall Whitworth was serving as president in 1965, the banner was given to him by the James Monk family in Flomot, after having been in the possession of the R. H. Tanner family. Mr. Whitworth's niece, Mrs. William Gruver of San Antonio, left the banner here after moving her uncle to San Antonio to be near her.

The custom of bringing basket lunches to the convention meeting was discontinued in 1965, as the pioneer custom was deemed no longer necessary or practical, with modern transportation. It was explained that the traditional basket lunch was established when singers traveled by buggy, wagon, or horseback.

No records were kept, that is know of, of the early officers who served the association. Some of them were R. H. Tanner, F. M. Casey, L. A. Carlisle, Bruce Martin, Randall Whitworth, and the last one, Walter Craft, who is now residing in the Lockney Nursing Home.

Another phase of the early pioneer days has thus ended.

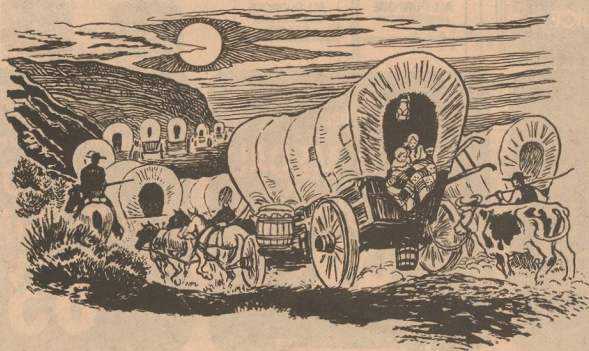

Children from families whose income is at or below the level shown on the attached scale may be eligible for either free meals or meals at a reduced price of .40 cents for lunch and .20 cents for breakfast.

To apply at any time during the year for free or reduced price meals for your children, complete the attached application and return it to the school. Within ten (10) days of receiving your application, the school will let you know whether or not your children are eligible.

If, during the school year, there are changes in your family size or substantial changes in your income, you should report such changes to the school's officials in order that appropriate eligibility adjustments be made.

Proof of Current Family Income - If you have applied for free or reduced price benefits in other school years, you will note some changes to the application form. The application now requires the name and social security number of all adult family members. Adults without social security numbers must indicate that they do not have one. Schools may verify the source and amount of income as well as household composition.

Foster Children - In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If you have foster children living with you and you wish to apply for such meals for them, please notify us or indicate it on the application.

Nondiscrimination - All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, creed, color or national origin.

Fair Hearing - If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application, you may wish to discuss it with the school. If you wish to review the decision further, you have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing Mr. Johnson, Drawer 310, Matador, Texas 79244, Phone 347-2676.
