Former Pen Pals Meet In Arlington

After their recent visit in Matador, Roaring Springs, Lubbock and Canyon, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Robinson and their guests, Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Chapman of Sussex, England, returned to the Robinsons' home in Arlington, and subsequently located Mrs. June (Seay) Latham, who also resides in Arlington. Mrs. Chapman as the former Doris Earthrowl, and June Seay had been pen pals during World War II. The following excerpts are from a feature in the Arlington Citizen-Journal, by Debbie Borek, a staff writer:

"Pen Pals Meet After 43 Years"
In 1938 June Latham was attending a two-room school near Roaring Springs when she wrote her first letter to an English pen pal.

The two continued their friendship by letter, (Mrs.) Latham writing about her life in a small West Texas community and Doris (Earthrowl) Chapman writing about London.

After the war started, the letters (from London) turned to vivid descriptions of the bombings and air-raid shelters. The letters, which provided an account of daily life in the war-torn country, were published in the Matador Tribune.

On Friday, July 10, the two met for the first time. (While in Matador, Mrs. Chapman met another war-time pen pal, Mrs. Jack Crider of Odessa, the former Mary Ola Tipton).

"We kept in touch up until my first child was born," Mrs. Latham said during the interview by the Citizen-Journal reporter.

"We wrote to each other for about 10 years. But you know how life does you. I married. I have five children and nine grandchildren. When you are

raising your children you don't have the time to write."

The Chapmans on tour of the United States that will take them from Texas to New England and then to California, planned their vacation to coincide with the July 4th celebration.

They have some interesting comments about what they've seen in this country so far.

Both think American drivers are more courteous than the European driver, they marvel at the price of gasoline and at all the extra services provided by restaurants and hotels. They have also seen what they call a terrific enthusiasm in the

young people they have met.

One thing they did not come prepared for was the Texas heat.

"It seems to me as though someone has put the central heat on outside," Ken Chapman says. "It was 69 degrees when we left England. Our summer was on the 23rd day of June."

And they had their first experience with a tornado watch while visiting in West Texas in search of Mrs. Latham. Listening to the weather reports on the radio, Mrs. Chapman was not alarmed until she pulled out a road map and realized they were smack dab in the middle of the state under the warning.

Telephone Cable Cut Near Idalou

Long-distance telephone service to nearly 4000 homes and businesses, including 400 persons in the Matador area, was cut off for about 4 hours Friday afternoon when an overhead pole cable was broken between Idalou and Lubbock.

A spokesman for General Telephone Company of the Southwest said the cable was apparently torn down accidentally by an unknown party about 1

p.m. Friday. Long distance service was severed to Petersburg, Crosbyton, Paducah, Roaring Springs, Matador, McAdoo, Afton and Dickens.

The cable, located along Texas 62-82, was snapped but the poles were not damaged. The damaged cable was suspended 25 to 30 feet off the ground. Service was restored to the communities at about 5 p.m.
