

Savage Storm Destroys Crops in Southern Area of County

Damage Spread Over Extensive Acreage In Path of Hail and Torrential Rainfall

A SAVAGE STORM which spawned torrential rains and one of the most severe hail storms ever recorded in Motley County, swept away thousands of acres of young crops south and east of here late Friday.

The stricken area extended from McAdece west to Teepee Flat southeast of Matador, to Russellville, across the two Roaring Springs oil fields, and into Dickens County south to destroy most of the crops in Afton and East Afton communities.

Rainfall at Roaring Springs was recorded at four inches, but east into the oil fields 7 1/2 inches were measured by Roy Hankins who operates oil pumping equipment.

Dick Carpenter, QA&P Railway agent at Roaring Springs said he believed 10 inches fell in an area west of Russellville, where debris was measured nine feet on a telephone pole. A section of track was washed out and traffic was delayed on the line for 18 hours. The train was stopped at Paducah where water ran over the tracks west of town. A scout car with radio contact was sent out ahead of the train and found the washed out track near Russellville. The train was returned to Quanah.

Oil Field Power Out

Power was out on 25 of the 32 wells in the oil field. Hail and high winds took out 15 windows in the old Stearns Ranch house which was not occupied.

Massive slugs of hail pounded a new metal barn on the Avery Payne farm until "it looked like it had been beaten by a sledge hammer," he declared. The roof was destroyed on his home.

The hail stripped mesquite and other trees, levelled fence rows of grass and weeds while the rain left fertile fields looking like river beds. On the Stearns farms it was almost impossible to determine the direction the rows had been planted. On the Omar Parks and Sons farm water gaps were destroyed, windmill watering troughs swept away by the high water and crops destroyed. Parks and his sons farm 2000 acres and lost every foot of tilled crops. Avery Payne said he had a watering tank moved half a mile down the creek.

Dead rabbits and quail were found in the debris. Cattle on the Bennie D. Dillard ranch broke through fences when pounded by the hail. Mr. and Mrs. Dillard and children were in the storm which pounded a new pickup severely, breaking out the windshield and denting the cab.

Water was everywhere in the area east of Roaring Springs Saturday morning, despite the sandy loam soil which absorbs it rapidly. Drifts of hail three feet deep were on the Parks place at noon Saturday. Some residents of the area for 40 years said it was the most severe storm they had ever known. Many will remember the date, it was Friday the 13th.

Refugee From Storm

After the storm Friday night, James Stanley discovered a banded pigeon beneath his car, evidently a refugee from a distance, since there are none of the birds in this vicinity. Game Warden Ronald Vandiver has been on vacation this week, and it has not been possible to determine (from the numerals on the pigeon's leg band) where it was registered.

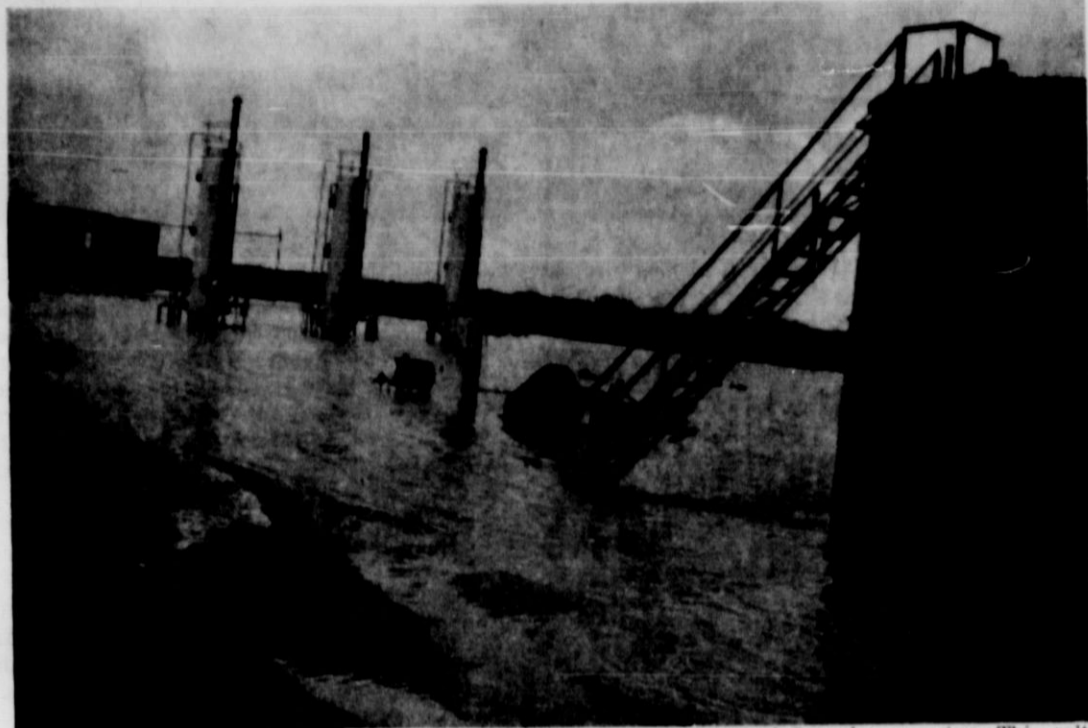

Afton Woman Dies In Shallow Water

A TRAGEDY which claimed the life of an Afton woman, Mrs. Sam Whitley, 48, can be attributed to the storms and heavy rains Friday night.

Her body was found about daylight Sunday, in a normally dry lake, face down in about 18 inches of water. Dickens Justice of the

Peace Horace Nichols ruled her death by drowning.

Mr. and Mrs. Whitley, residents of this area for 19 years, had lived on the E. E. Moss & Sons Ranch in East Afton for 11 years, where he is employed.

Mrs. Whitley had started to Matador about 7 o'clock Saturday evening, but apparently decided to return home on a side road. Her pickup was found bogged in the mud after she failed to return home.

A search party tracked Mrs. Whitley to the shallow lake Saturday night. It was approximately two miles from the pickup. It is believed she became confused in the darkness and waded into the water, possibly falling in the sediment and strangling.

The body was brought to Seigler Funeral Home here Sunday morning and transferred to Henrietta by Paul Hawkins Funeral Home. Funeral services were in Henrietta First Methodist Church at 2 p.m. Tuesday and burial was in the Joy Cemetery.

Survivors include her husband, Sam; a daughter, Cindy, of the home; one brother, Frank Wines Jr., of Seymour; and four sisters, Mrs. Lucille Brothers and Mrs. Pete Green, both of Henrietta; Mrs. Louise Slaughter of Leadhill, Ark.; and Mrs. Katherine Vernon of Lubbock.

Sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary, with some additional backing from various local civic clubs, Girls' State accepts young ladies who have completed their junior year of high school.

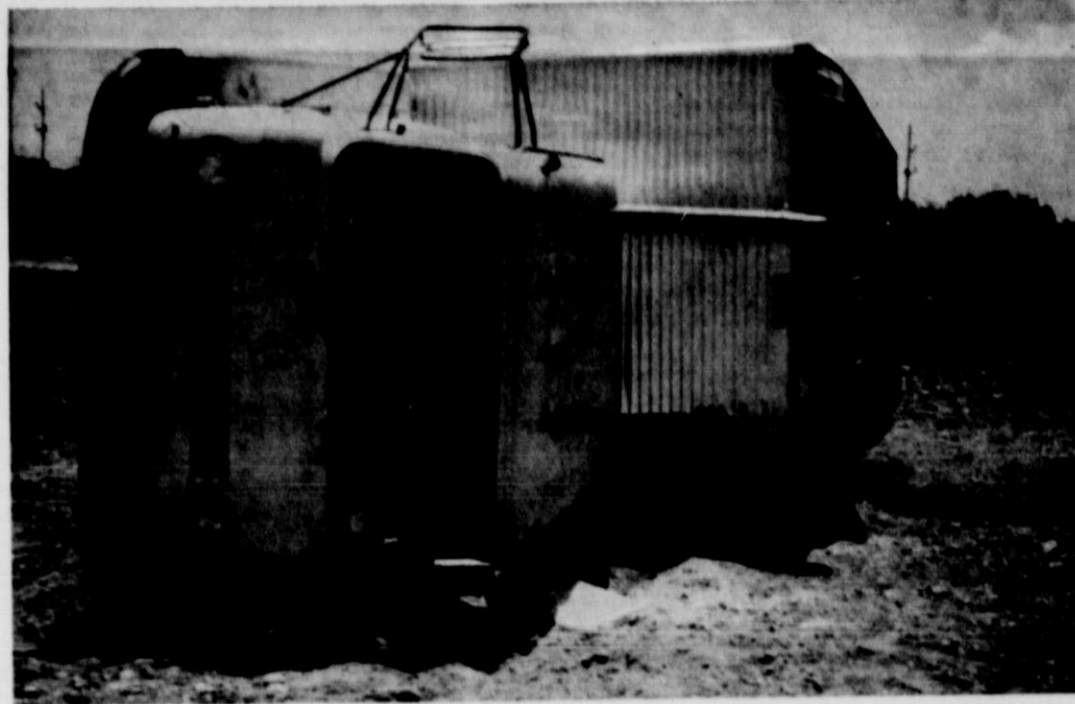

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

I know that some farmers must think I hunt up things for them to spend money on, so here is another thing for grain sorghum producers to think about.

Two diseases that can cause trouble are downy mildew and maize dwarf mosaic virus.

Downy mildew is characterized by down or a fuzzy type of growth on the underside of the leaf surface. Striping of young plants occurs when the plant is systemically infected. Infection causing this symptom occurs in the soil, and plants that are systemically infected are sterile and will not produce a normal seed head.

The fungus carrying downy mildew is carried from one season to another in the soil. One helpful control measure is rotating with a non-related crop, or you can also grow resistant or tolerant plants. I have a list of hybrids and varieties that are resistant to this disease, so if you suspect this plant disease, why not ask for a copy?

Maize dwarf mosaic virus requires a living host at all times. It is carried over from season to season in rhizomes of Johnsongrass. Shoots of Johnsongrass come out in the spring before grain sorghum is planted, aphids feed on these shoots, and then migrate to the grain sorghum, carrying the virus.

Elimination of the Johnsongrass is an effective control measure of the virus in some areas, but tolerant hybrids should be planted, especially if Johnsongrass is a problem. I also have a list of these varieties which you are welcome to.

Finally, while checking fields, watch for other diseases, such as headsmut, anthracnose, and seedling diseases. All can cost you if become established in a field, and the time to decide whether to spend money to combat them is not after the loss has occurred, but when first detected.

Horn flies are a continuous problem on beef cattle in Motley County during the warm months, and these blood-sucking parasites frequently develop large populations in herds.

In addition to the direct damage through blood losses, horn flies cause annoyance and irritation to animals. The constant attempt to fight flies is a continuous drain on the animal's energy and nutrition, as well as disturbing the grazing of the animals. We know how annoying flies can be, so just multiply this several hundred times, and you have the picture of the animal's annoyance.

These horn flies can be controlled with modern livestock insecticides. Numerous insecticides and methods of treatment are available so that the operator has a choice to fit his individual operation. Leaflets on materials and methods are available in my office, but before buying and using any material, carefully read the label; pay particular attention to precautions and restrictions; and observe strictly the slaughter intervals as stated.

Another parasite that causes loss to livestock producers is the

to all county cotton producers. We hope that these guides won't be needed, but in case why not read now and be ready if heavy infestations do develop.

When predator insects are not of sufficient number to control cotton insects, and numbers of damaging insects increase, you have a choice. Apply controls, or let the insects have the crop. This guide lists the proper chemicals to use, rates of mixture, and all precautions. Most important, it also gives the percent insect infestation where controls are economical.

A few harmful insects are generally always found in a cotton field, but in many cases the cost of control is more than the value of the cotton these few insects would ruin. Add this to the elimination of the beneficial insects, and you see the problem created by unwarranted spraying.

In conclusion, insect control has a place and is often needed, but if you can't answer the following questions to your satisfaction, consider finding the answer before acting.

1. WHY am I spraying?
2. WHAT am I spraying for?
3. WHEN should I start spraying?
4. WHO (insects) do I want to eliminate?
5. WHERE is control justified?
6. HOW is the best way to do the job?

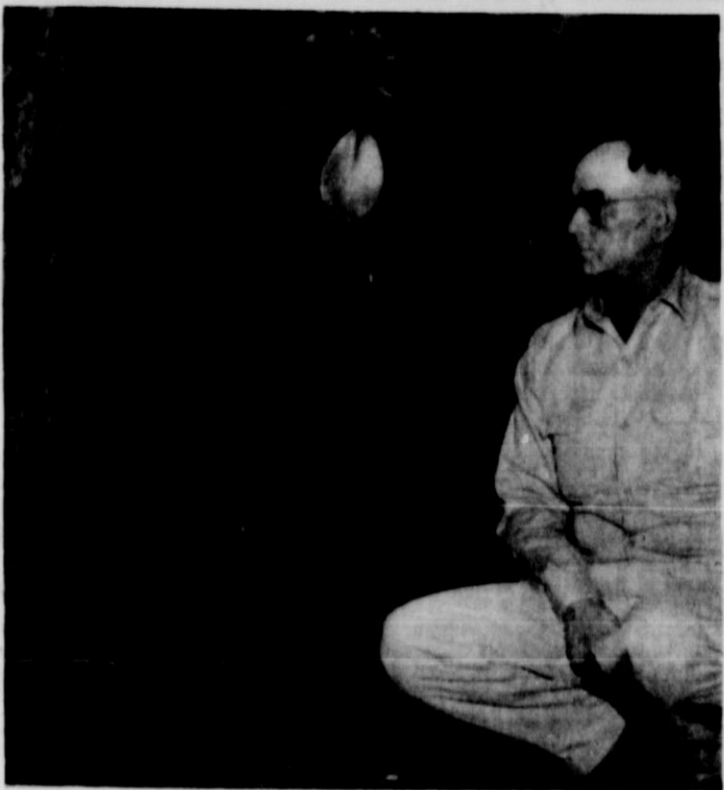

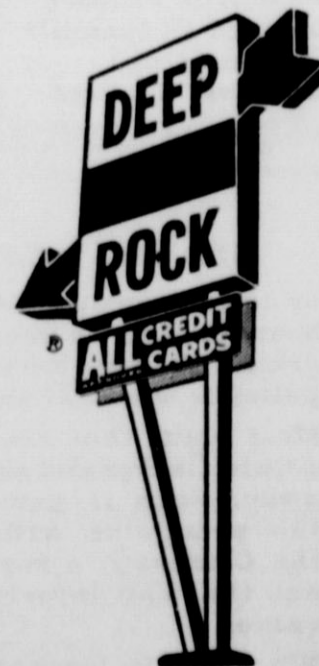
