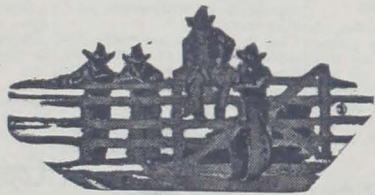

Have you ever known so many things to happen in Austin in so short a space of time as recent developments there? Without commenting on the merits of the matters, there have been:

The placing of the University of Texas on probation—a kind of publicity all over the nation that our State could very well do without;

The upheaval in the State Game, Fish and Oyster department;

The protest from some local law enforcement officials against a policy of pardons and paroles which, it is asserted, in three years has reduced the number of men in prison from 7,000 to 3,000 while the rate of crime is climbing.

Texas needs leadership. Have you ever been polled in a Gallup poll? I never have and it is a cherished ambition to lay eyes on a man who actually has been so interviewed, maybe even to touch him with the tip of a reverent finger.

The magically short time in which the great Texas citrus industry has developed may be grasped in epitome, from a statement by H. Raymond Mills of Weslaco that along about 1922, the Valley had six or seven cars of grapefruit for shipment to the outside world so Houston was selected and a delegation went to that city to advertise the product. Jewelry and other stores would put a grapefruit in the show-window and Houston became "citrus conscious" and the entire shipment was sold. Now, the Valley ships out about 30,000 cars of oranges and grapefruit a year.

A great woman recently passed away: Mrs. Clara Driscoll, "Saviour of the Alamo." When your

columnist made a race for the State office three years ago the afternoon before the primary, a letter arrived from Mrs. Driscoll saying, "I am voting for you," which was esteemed as a real honor. . . Many throughout Texas mourn the death of E. H. Whitehead, publisher of the Polk County Enterprise and for many years an outstanding executive in Chamber of Commerce circles, with the West Texas, the South Texas, Temple and Conroe organizations—a man of tireless energy, of great achievement, one who built for others, a true friend.

## Cox Advises Care In Selection Of Family Physician

AUSTIN, Texas, According to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, there are too many persons who approach the choice of a family physician casually. Viewing the doctor much as a fireman, whose services are re-

quired only in an emergency, such families wait until an illness strikes, and then get hold of the first doctor who can respond to the call. While such an attitude still reasonably assures one of satisfactory medical services, it can handicap the physician somewhat, and in the long run does not permit the supervision and close personal contact which only can exist by having a regular doctor.

"Knowing his patients enables a physician to give advice on maintaining health and prevent-

## Simple Precautions Can Curb Infantile Paralysis Spread

Although the term "infantile paralysis" strikes terror into the hearts of parents each summer, the chances of children becoming infected with this dread disease are exceedingly remote.

While more than 50,000 persons in the United States die each year of tuberculosis, and more than 150,000 of cancer, the total number of infantile cases reported in any one year is less than 10,000, according to an article in the August issue of Good Housekeeping magazine.

And this total could be substantially reduced if parents would take cognizance of a few fundamental facts set forth in the article, which states in part:

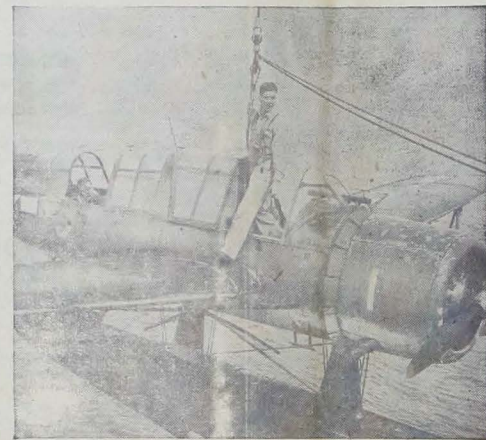
"When symptoms appear put the patient to bed and isolate him at once. Call a doctor.

"Doctors recommend that parents avoid removal of tonsils and adenoids when infantile paralysis is prevalent in the community.

"The virus of infantile paralysis is widespread in sewage and polluted water. Practice cleanliness. Avoid crowded swimming pools and bathing beaches during outbreaks of infantile paralysis.

"Teach children the importance of clean water, clean food, clean milk, and above all, clean hands when eating and drinking. Keep food away from flies. They have been shown to carry the virus.

"The infantile paralysis virus is widespread, but only a minimum number of those exposed are infected. Less than half of those infected are paralyzed."

ing disease, based on his intimate knowledge of the physical and mental make-up of the members of the family," Dr. Cox stated. "The casually summoned physician plainly cannot have this background or opportunity.

"People are far from being alike," he continued. "Bodily and mental characteristics markedly differ in members of the same family. Reactions to medicines of various types, the habits of the individual, environmental influences, and personal factors vary widely. Armed with an intelligent appreciation of these personal illness, but can act as an

advisor regarding disease preventions, living habits, and the facts, as applied to the members of the family, a physician possesses the maximum opportunity to render his best service." Dr. Cox declared that in such case not only is the physician in a better position to treat occa-

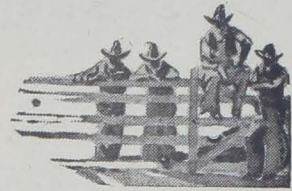
prising the family group. He thus not only is one who cures a specific illness, but becomes a

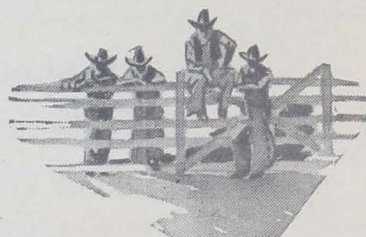

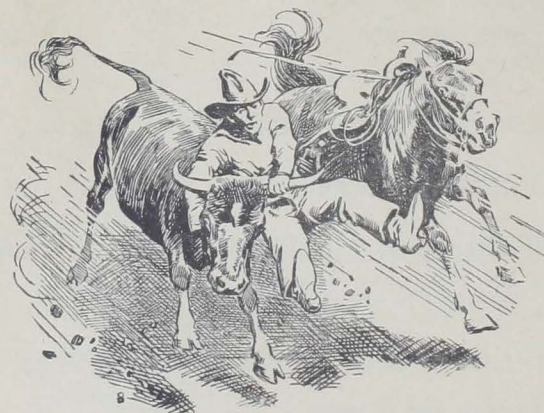

WITH THE 36TH "TEXAS" DIVISION OF SEVENTH ARMY, GERMANY (Special to the Tribune) Sgt. Wade H. Berryman, husband of Mrs. Minnie Berryman, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Berryman, all Matador, member of the 111th Engr. C. Bn. of the veteran 36th "Texas" Division, has been awarded the Bronze Arrowhead to wear on his European Theatre of Operations ribbon.

The Arrowhead has been awarded for participation in the Riviera invasion when he made the D-Day amphibious assault.

The 36th Infantry Division has seen action on two D-Days; Italy and Southern France. To its credit are such battles as San Pietro and Cassino, the Rapallo River, and Anzio. It fought at Montelima, where the German Nineteenth Army was annihilated, drove across the Sainte Marie Pass of the Vosges Mountains and breached the powerful Siegfried Line defenses at Wissembourg and completed four hundred days of actual plugging through Germany and deep into Austria.

HEADQUARTERS, 69th WING, CHINA (Special to the Tribune) T/Sgt. Lyman B. Campbell, Matador, has been decorated with the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy, according to an announcement from Maj. General C. L. Chennault, the Commanding General of the Fourteenth Air Force "Flying Tigers" in China. Sgt. Campbell was awarded the medal at ceremonies in the field by Brig. Gen. J. C. Kennedy,

commander of the 69th wing of the Fourteenth.

The citation accompanying the award said in part, "... during the Salween campaign, Sgt. Campbell made an outstanding contribution to the operation of the elaborate communications system. His ingenuity, keen appreciation of responsibility and determination enabled him to cope with the numerous problems encountered. The success of the campaign, in which communications played such a vital part, is a tribute to his high technical qualifications and devotion to duty and reflects the highest credit upon him as a soldier in the Army of the United States."

Campbell, who was engaged in the farming and ranching business before his entry into the service August 21, 1942, is a graduate of Texas A. & M. College with a B. S. degree in agricultural education. He attended high school at Matador. He departed the U. S. for foreign duty, October, 1943 and flew the "Hump" from India to China, January, 1944.

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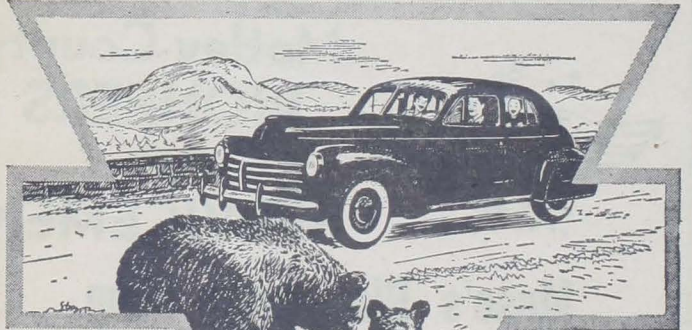

### CANNED PINEAPPLE SAVES MONEY FOR MOTLEY FAMILIES

Home-canned pineapple, put up this summer by club women of the county, resulted in a saving of \$1120.00, according to a report compiled by Mrs. W. N. Pipkin, chairman of the marketing committee, under supervision of Mrs. Lois Jo Krause, County Home Demonstration agent.

The report revealed that 273 families in the county purchased 320 dozen pineapples for \$3.50 per bushel, from which, 7040 pints were canned, with 1920 pints of juice. Figured at 42 points per pint, 376,320 blue points were saved in the canning.

In addition to the saving in finances, it was pointed out that the home-canned fruit improved nutrition for the families.
