Commissioners Court Meeting Report

The Motley County Commissioners Court met Monday, April 9 at 10:00 a.m. with Judge Billy J. Whitaker and Councilmen J.M. Russell, Bill D. Washington, Fraiser Watson and Franklin Jameson. J.M. Russell gave the invocation. County Clerk Lucretia Campbell read the minutes of the last meeting. They were approved as read, as were the bills for March.

Clerk Campbell showed the Court her certificate from the A&M Clerk Seminar. Clerks are now required to have 22 hours of continued education as are Judges, Commissioners and Sheriffs and Deputy Sheriff's required to have 16 hours per year as of 1990.

Items discussed were:

* high cost of prisoner upkeep, \$3,279.31.

* 1975 loader needs repair with estimate of \$3,200 with county doing labor.

* Joe Campbell, County Treasurer, reported an extra \$2,066.00 of incoming funds to county with \$5.00 vehicle registration fee.

* Russell had received numerous complaints of Prec. 3, 5 and 6, not getting to vote on J.P. in recent election.

* letter from Warren Chisum, State Representative, has filed a House Resolution asking the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to hold hearings in rural areas of Texas for variance to be granted for national standards under Subtitle D.

* use order #3651 as stated in minutes of 1981 Commissioners Court for county to build terraces and do other outside work for extra county revenue.

Bids were opened for county fuel, with one letter from Cooper Oil Co. gave no bid due to bid stipulations. One bid for sheriff and fire department fuel from Don's Conoco for unleaded \$1.02 retail. After discussion commissioners will check prices each time they need fuel, due to purchases under \$1,500 ruling.

Meeting adjourned.

Hoyle showed completion certificates for 6 EMT and ECA's having taken a

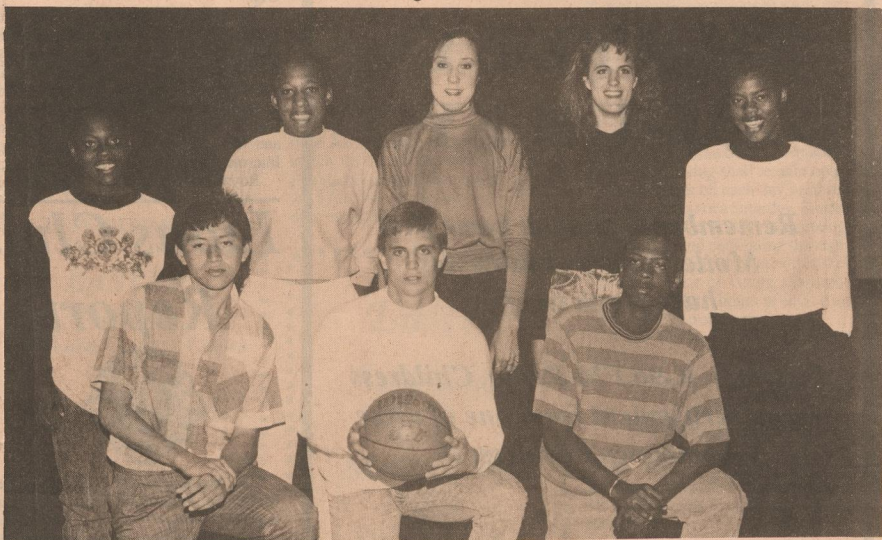
required class for "Hazardous Waste Treatment."

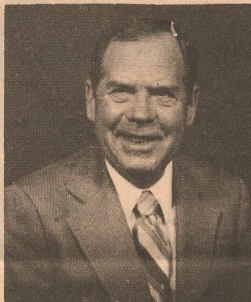
He died Thursday, March 29 in Collingsworth General Hospital in Wellington, after a brief illness.

Bird Meccas is Subject of Program at Meeting of Matador Garden Club

Although many places in Texas and Florida are said to be the hottest spots for bird watching in North America, Texas has the largest avifauna (all kinds of birds, considered collectively of a region), of any of the 50 states, Matador Garden Club members learned at their March meeting for a program on "Bird Meccas."

The meeting was March 19, at the Motley County Library, with Mrs. Edgar Lee presiding, and Mrs. W.B. Wason as program leader. During the business session, which included reading of the minutes by Mrs. Douglas Meador, secretary, Mrs. Lee announced that the club had received a state award which is to be picked up at the Texas Garden Club convention April 29-30, May 1-2, in San Antonio.

This club also received by mail, four certificates of award which had been made at the District One spring convention, March 6-7 in Odessa. The awards were for Yearbook, with a grade of 891/2, Honorable Mention; President's Report, second place; Scrapbook, third place; and a Citation for donation to the State Headquarters Endowment Fund. From the judge's critique on scrapbooks, Mrs. Lee read some "do's and don'ts" for preparing material for that project. A report was made by Mrs. Ted Elliott concerning the damaged planter boxes, with information about the probably cost of replacing them.

For roll call, members named things which they recycle and the purposes for which they are used.

The conservation program was given by Mrs. Alvin Stearns, whose subject was "Green Jay, Tropical Bird; Rockport, Texas: Mecca for Birds."

The best places in the United States to see the brightly colored Green Jay are Santa Ana National Wildlife Refuge and Bentsen Rio Grande State Park, she said. "Both are bordered by the Rio Grande

River, where dense thickets of acacia, mesquite, elm and hackberry attract these tropical birds that range from northern Bolivia, northward to the southern tip of Texas."

Due to expanding agricultural interests however, huge tractors have been uprooting the forest trees, clearing up the chaparral and plowing up the rich land to make room for the rapidly growing citrus orchards, she said. "These interesting birds will have to retreat across the Mexican border - leaving our fauna that much poorer." Adding interest to her talk were magazine pictures of the colorful Greenjays, which Mrs. Stearns brought to show the club.

"Rockport, Texas, near Corpus Christi has become one of the hottest spots in North America for bird watching, and is now as famous for its birds as for its fishing and beaches," she said. "The Whooping Crane has attracted more bird watchers to Rockport than any other bird species, although as many as 400 species have been reported there. Local businesses cater to the many 'birdies' as bird watchers are called, and there are several charter boat companies taking tours to see the 'Whoopers' and nesting colonies and rookeries across Aransas Bay - a 38-mile pilgrimage across from Rockport."

The leader gave a report from the Lone Star Gardener and to conclude the program, read the Thought from Henry Van Dyke: "Use what talents you possess; the woods would be very silent if no birds sang there except those that sang best."

Mrs. Meador was hostess and served refreshments of lemon ice box pie, Boston cream cake, coffee and hot spiced apple cider. Present were Mrs. Robert Darsey, Rachel Patton, Mrs. W.D. Lipscomb and Mrs. W.N. Pipkin, in addition to Mesdames Lee, Elliott, Wason and Stearns.

Former Resident's Daughter Awarded Airman's Medal for Heroism

EDITOR'S NOTE: This article was taken from the *Amarillo Globe News*. Joni Rigby is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sherril Rigby of Hale Center, formerly of Matador.

It's a script that's been kicked around Hollywood television studios for decades: The smallest kid in the class is the only one who can fit down the well and save the fallen puppy; the runt of the gang is the only one small enough to climb to the top of the tree and retrieve the frightened kitten.

The kid, naturally, becomes a hero. That doesn't happen in real life, of course. In real life, there's an accident on the side of the road that crushes a vehicle, and only a very small woman can fit through the condensed opening and render aid to the helpless victim.

The woman, naturally, becomes a hero. In January, Joanne "Joni" Rigby, 24, a native of Hale Center, was awarded the Airman's Medal for Heroism - the seventh highest honor the Air Force can bestow - for saving lives at the scene of a wreck near Grand Forks Air Force Base, N.D.

The accident occurred in August 1988. A senior airman stationed at Grand Forks AFB, Rigby was returning to base Aug. 26, 1988, after a visit with her aunt in Lakewood, Colo.

She slowed down as she approached a traffic jam on Interstate 25. There was a wreck ahead. "By the time I got to the accident site, a crowd was gathering, but no one was doing anything," Rigby said. "They were waiting for someone else to do it."

"I couldn't just stand there and let someone die because I didn't try to help them."

The accident involved a semi-truck trailer rig and a car, both of which were heavily damaged and crushed.

The truck was close to the highway and was crushed to such an extent that no one had been able to reach the badly injured driver.

"A man was trying to reach through the window to the driver, but couldn't get through," Rigby said.

The petite Rigby found an opening she could squeeze through and crawled to where she could aid the driver.

She applied compresses and pressure to stop the bleeding and told the man that help was on the way.

When she crawled out of the vehicle, she learned that a car had gone over the cliff and that a girl had been thrown from it.

"I checked her breathing and saw that she was going in to shock. We got coats and jackets to cover her and stabilized her with CPR."

"I recruited men standing around to maintain the pressure on her wounds to stop the bleeding while I checked the other victims," Rigby said.

Because of the location of the car, emergency vehicles couldn't reach the site. Again, Rigby's petite size allowed her to get to the trapped victims.

"I crawled into the car to see what I could do. I could tell that the two people in the back seat were dead, but the driver's heart was still beating."

"It was tough," she said. "I don't like to talk about it. I was in there for more than 45 minutes trying to keep the woman alive until they could cut the car and get her out. A woman paramedic stood by the car and told me what to do and handed me supplies and equipment."

"The car was damaged so badly that they started cutting the hood apart with me still in the car. It was such a small area, they couldn't see me."

"I wanted to quit, but I just couldn't." Rigby had been transferred to Wyoming before she learned that the two people had survived.

On Jan. 22, she was awarded the Airman's Medal by Lt. Col. Bradley A. Massjo for her heroism - a special order directed by President Bush from the Department of the Air Force.

The citation that accompanied the award notes that her "humanitarian efforts in administering first aid, and her conspicuous acts of valor climbing in and out of crushed vehicles with spilled fuel and broken glass everywhere, directly resulted in saving the lives of two of the accident victims. The exemplary courage and heroism displayed by Airman Rigby reflect great credit upon herself and the United States Air Force."

Rigby learned about first aid while living in Hale Center. Her father, Sherril Rigby, is a longtime ambulance volunteer with Hale Center's Emergency Medical Service.

"Although Joni hasn't had any formal EMS training, she absorbed quite a bit when living at home," her father explained. "And, as anyone who knows Joni will say, she isn't afraid to get involved."

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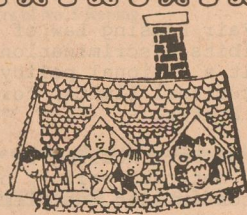

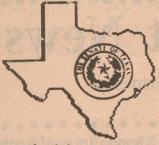

TEXAS SENATE WEEK IN REVIEW

AUSTIN -- Texas legislators were off to a fast start last week as a second special session began to reform the way the state's public schools are funded.

Another special session began Monday, April 2, just five days after the Legislature adjourned without passing a bill to equalize the distribution of funds among the state's 1,068 public school districts.

Lawmakers face a May 1 deadline, imposed by the State Supreme Court, to correct funding disparities between rich and poor school districts.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, presiding officer of the Senate, said last week the Senate will probably pass the same \$1.3 billion school funding bill approved during the just-ended session. That Senate bill was substituted in the House for a \$511 million first-year funding plan ultimately defeated in the House by a vote of 101-45.

In the House, Speaker Gib Lewis has given House members a 10-day deadline for bringing a bill to the floor for a vote.

The Senate may also resume efforts this week to reform the state's judicial selection process although a federal appeals court said last week the state is not under an immediate order to enact

reforms until appeals are heard in late April.

The court's new order gives lawmakers a temporary reprieve from a previous order to change the way the state selects its district judges.

Last year, a federal district judge ruled that the countywide, at-large system of electing judges is discriminatory because it dilutes the minority vote in the state's most populous counties.

Also this week, the Senate Health and Human Services Committee will hear continued testimony from officials at the Department of Human Services (DHS) on a projected \$850 million deficit at the agency.

Without additional funding from the state, a number of DHS programs that serve some of the state's neediest citizens face cutbacks.

DHS Commissioner Ron Lindsey and DHS board chairman Rob Mosbacher are scheduled to testify before the committee this week.

Lindsey was criticized during his last appearance before the Health and Human Services Committee for failing to provide figures on the magnitude of the DHS deficit. Those figures are expected to be available to senators at this week's meeting.

Researchers Issue Severe Weather Safety Tips

Researchers with the Texas Tech Institute for Disaster Research have studied natural disasters for the past 20 years. In their studies of the causes, effects and preventatives of damage from tornadoes, hurricanes and low-level blasts, the investigators have established safety guidelines that could prevent loss of life when a tornado strikes.

-- Even persons who have limited access to broadcast storm warnings should closely observe any rapidly changing weather conditions that could signal a tornado, such as a progression from intense hail to deafening quiet.

-- When in homes, persons should seek shelter in a closet or room protected by as many interior walls as possible.

-- Individuals should not waste time opening windows to counteract pressure differentials.

A common misconception is that buildings will explode if windows are closed, according to Richard E. Peterson, director of the atmospheric science group at Texas Tech.

-- Individuals should never remain in their cars or mobile homes. Often vehicles are picked up and smashed by tornadoes and high winds.

Most people who died in the April 1979 twister that struck Wichita Falls were killed while trying to escape the storm by driving in their automobiles, Peterson said.

-- When outdoors, individuals should seek shelter in a depression or culvert to avoid flying debris, the cause of most damage and injuries. Persons should not take shelter in drainage ditches.

-- Individuals should be aware of tornado season in their region. Tornadoes are most likely to occur in April, May and June on the South Plains, with the most tornadoes developing in May. Late winter is the tornadic season in the Gulf region and southern-tier states. In late March and April, tornadoes tend to strike the lower Mississippi, Tennessee and Ohio River valleys.

Texas Tech researchers with the Institute for Disaster Research are searching for ways to reduce weather-related destruction. The College of Engineering faculty members work in the fields of atmospheric sciences, wind engineering and glass testing to understand the damage caused by intense wind conditions.

Researchers from the institute have conducted field tests of natural disasters in the United States, Canada, Mexico and Australia.

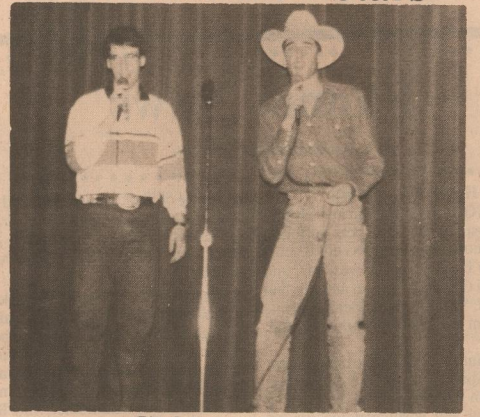
One more thing that bothers the U.S.A., when are the Japs going to start paying for the attack on Pearl Harbor and the damages they had made by their sneak attack.

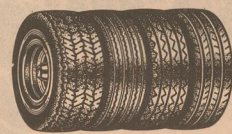
