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





On the other hand, drinking fil-tered coffee did not affect serum lipid Pharmacologists classify caffeine as a mild stimulant to the central nervous system and consider it one of the world's most widely used drugs. Caffeine, classified in a group of chemicals Generally Recognized as Safe (GRAS), was reviewed in 1978 and the safety of caffeine was reaffirmed. level

This is actually good news since 75 percent of all American coffee drinkers drink their coffee drip-filtered. The researchers speculate that the differences may exist because the boiled coffee is in contact with the grounds longer and at a higher temperature than drip-filtered

Decaffeinated coffee has also been tested. Dr. Robert Superko of Stanford University found that men who switched to decaffeinated coffee showed a 7 percent increase of their LDL cholesterol, which could increase the risk of heart attack by an estimated 12 percent. Superko suggests that this is true because stronger, more robust beans are used for decaffeinated coffees.

More research is needed to determine which of the 500 chemical components in the beans might be responsible.

It is important to remember that caf-feine has a long history of safe use by humans. So far, scientific studies do not indicate that people will suffer any harm from drinking available caffeine-contain-ing beverages in moderation.

AUSTIN -- Texas legislators were off to a fast start last week as a second special session began to reform the way the state's public schools are for ded

Session began to reform the way the state's public schools are funded. Another special session began Mon-day, April 2, just five days after the Legislature adjourned without passing a bill to equalize the distribution of funds among the state's 1,068 public school districts districts.

Lawmakers face a May 1 deadline, imposed by the State Supreme Court, to correct funding disparities between rich and poor school districts.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, presiding officer of the Senate, said last week the Senate will probably pass the same \$1.3 billion school funding bill approved during the just-ended session. That Senate bill was substituted in the House for a \$511 million first-year funding plan ultimately defeated in the House by a vote of 101-

45. In the House, Speaker Gib Lewis has given House members a 10-day deadline for bringing a bill to the floor for a vote. 

**Researchers Issue Severe Weather Safety Tips** 

Researchers with the Texas Tech Insi-titute for Disaster Research have studied natural disasters for the past 20 years. In their studies of the causes, effects and preventatives of damage form tornadoes, hurricanes and low-level blasts, the investigators have established safety guide-lines that could prevent loss of life when a tornado strikes.

-- Even persons who have limited ac-cess to broadcast storm warnings should

by as many interior walls as possible. -- Individuals should not waste time opening windows to counteract pressure differentials.

A common misconception is that build-

Most people who died in the April 1979 twister that struck Wichita Falls were killed while trying to escape the storm by driving in their automobiles, Peterson said.

-- When outdoors, individuals should seek shelter in a depression or culvert to

tornadoes developing in May. Late ter is the tornadic season in the Ohio River valleys.

Texas Tech researchers with the Insti-tute for Disaster Research are searching for ways to reduce weather-related destruction. The College of Engineering faculty members work in the fields of atmospheric sciences, wind engineering and glass testing to understand the dam-age caused by intense wind conditions. Reseachers from the institute have conducted field tests of natural disasters in the United States, Canada, Mexico and Australia.


