+++ Did you know the North indorsed slavery during the Civil War? According to a study by Leroy Yarbrough in 1972 the North okayed a plan to put Apache Indians into slavery. Yarbrough said, "In 1862 Colonel John R. Baylor, governor of Arizona for the Confederacy, recommended an extermination policy for the Apaches, by which all adult males would be shot on sight and the women and children sold into slavery. Jefferson Davis rewarded him by relieving him of his command. Then General Carleton, in command of troops in the Southwest for the Union, recommended an identical policy which was accepted and put into effect by the North."

+++ People of West Texas have two more days to experience a once-in-a-lifetime event – seeing the puppet festival at Texas Tech campus in Lubbock. You may think that is silly, a puppet festival. But it really is great entertainment when you think that there will be performances by puppeteers from England, Czechoslovakia, Mexico, Canada, New York, California, Massachusetts, Mississippi and Florida.

Dear Editor

TEXAS Senator Bentsen was among 68 U.S. Senators who voted to 'pay-away' our canal to Castro-Moscow oriented Panama Dictator Torrijos in direct defiance to the will of a vast majority of our people. This has occured all too often as in the cases of forced busing, tax paid abortions, the ERA, and gun controls where our will was shamefully ignored.

Among those 68 Senators were 40 who have been involved with one or more of five groups having a common goal of "A New World Order" which would, in effect, replace the constitution they swore to defend. BENTSEN was on the CFR lists for 1973--1975 incl. Members of these five interlocking groups dominate Carter appointments to high offices with Carter, Mondale and canal negotiators Bunker and Linowitz having been charter directors of TC. The five groups are The Council on Foreign Relations (CFR), The Trilateral Commission (TC), Members of Congress for Peace through Law (MCPL), The World Affairs Council (wac) and The Bilderbergers (BB). These groups are closely interlocked as are Carter appointments.

CFR member Henry Commager drafted "A Declaration of INTERdependence" for SAC which was originally signed by 32 U.S. Senators and 92 U.S. members of Congress (incl. Texas congresswoman Barbara Jordon).

Ploys that "the canal was never ours" or "it won't cost taxpayers anything" are entirely false. The canal is OURS in all respects because we bought it with labor, money and lives and Carter and his bought votes of the Senate cannot legally 'pay-away' to our avowed enemies. Since 70 percent of all ships traversing the canal originate or end in U.S. Ports and since Marxist Torrijos will set tolls as he wishes, we will pay for the canal betrayal.

Company Denies Insurance Coverage To Methodist Church

Members of the Matador First Methodist Church are not sure where they stand as to getting their sanctuary roof fixed. A meeting of the building committee was held Sunday night to discuss possibilities which lie ahead of them.

The charch received word last week that the insurance company has determined that the cave in of the church roof on May 24 was not the result of any of the causes covered by the church's policy. Therefore the insurance company has stated they will not pay any amount toward the rebuilding of .the sanctuary.

No one was in the sanctuary that Wednesday night when the roof crashed down, pushing the west wall out, and sending bricks onto the west lawn. There were no injuries. Damage was estimated at close to \$300,000.

Members of the building committee have said they don't know where they need to go at this point. Some feel a law suit against the insurance company would be in order, but funds would limit a legal fight with the large company.

The insurance company spokesmen said their policy covered natural causes, but according to their investigation the building must have caved in due to structural fatigue, since the weather was calm and nothing physical hit the building.

The roof was checked last fall by an architectural firm and deemed safe.

The church will now wait for new developments and maybe an increase in funds to operate on, until a possitive course of action can be taken.
