# WASHINGTON, D.C. — U.S. Rep. Jack Hightower, D-Texas, expressed harsh criticism of the 1981 farm bill passed in the House of Representatives late Thursday, which was hotly debated in Congress the past three weeks.

debated in Congress the past three weeks.

"Our problem," explained the Vernon representative, "is that many people do not understand the reason, the philosophy, behind farm programs. Farm bills should be designed to assure an economic climate for agriculture that will make it possible for the farmer to continue to farm.

"This bill is a totally inadequate response to the very real crisis of our smaller farmers being squeezed out of business by low commodity prices, cheap foreign subsidized competition and the high cost of fertilizer, equipment and loan money."

Hightower went on to explain several reasons for the failure of Congress to pass a more favorable bill.

"First, we have an educational problem. Too many of our non-farmstate congressman lack an understanding of agricultural problems and

they see all this as a struggle between the farmer and the consumer. It's not that at all. They're really on the same side," Hightower said. "If the small farmer goes under, we'll see first a concentration of pro-duction in the hands of a few agribusi-

ness corporations, then we'll see food prices go up more and more steeply," he said.

Speaking of his efforts, Hightower emphasized his belief that higher commodity loan rates than are in the bill would have enabled many famers to survive longer financially.


"We did everything we could to raise the loan rate on commodities — something that wouldn't have cost the taxpayers any money — we could not get support from either the Administration or many of our urban congressmen.

tration or many of our urban congressmen.

"They just don't understand the problem despite years of explanations," the Congressman said.

He noted that farm-state representatives in Congress are heavily outnumbered by non-farm representatives, hence the difficulty in passing what Hightower called "solid, corrective legislation."

The legislation now will go to a conference committee of members of the House and Senate before going on to the President for his signature or veto.



State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office last week issued checks totaling \$37.9 million to Texas cities as their share of the one percent city sales tax for October.

#### **New Postage Stamps** To Be Issued

**Proposition Five** 

When the interpretation of our state Constitution causes inequities and more problems than aids, it is time to change or clarify that law. Such is the case concerning Proposition Five, one of seven proposed Constitutional Amendments on the November 3 ballot. The Texas Constitution says, in part, "farm products in

the hands of the producer are exempt from all taxation." We agree with this concept, both in theory and practice, as it tends to hold down production costs for food. However, a 1976 Texas Attorney General's opinion held that neither livestock nor poultry constituted "farm products" and were

Investock nor poultry constituted Tarm products and were therefore subject to property (ad valorem) taxation.

Some taxing entities, such as school districts, have imposed a tax on some livestock and poultry. Others have not. Some have studied the situation and, because of the difficulty of accurately counting livestock on the open range, have concluded that it would cost them more to administer the program than they would receive in additional tax revenues.

At the very least, an inequity exists when some producers are taxed while others are not.

At most, this is an important consumer issue. Approval of Proposition Five will mean that no meat producers will be taxed for either livestock or poultry, thereby decreasing their cost of production. In the long run, this is one positive step we can take which will help hold the line on increases in the cost of groceries we all buy.

For those school districts who decry losing these revenues, a point run that when their return if formula is adjusted to

we point out that when their state aid formula is adjusted to omit livestock, on the average, they will be compensated for one-half the lost revenues, and some will even gain more revenues than they lose. In addition, this inequitable tax, as

now applied, amounts to only an insignificant one-fourth of one percent of total revenues. In the final analysis, no one

not universally applied.

Surely it is worth it to all just-minded Texans to approve a

measure which will assure fair, equitable taxation for all food We strongly urge you to go to the polls November 3 and vote FOR Proposition Five.





#### It Can Pay to Become Familiar With the Fine Art of Firing

IRING AN EMPLOYE is still the boss's prerogative. There are no laws against dismissing someone. But the law prohibits discrimination against workers because of race, religion, national origin, age, gender, or because they engage in union activity.

Businesses increasingly run the risk of job discrimination complaints. "We see substantially more discrimination claims," says Charles Herf, a Phoenix, Ariz., labor lawyer. "It is an increasingly popular vehicle for someone who's been laid off." The federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission and state human rights agencies press discrimination complaints for employes. The National Labor Relations Board gets involved when union activity is the basis of the discrimination charge.

activity is the basis of the discrimination.

Losing a case can be costly, even though most are settled out of court. Often an employer must reinstate the worker, pay wages from the time of dismissal plus interest, and then put up with a disgruntled employe. Sometimes the company has to pay the employe's legal costs as well as its own. The strongest defense is proof that the dismissal was justified. "The best protection, of course, is to build a record of poor performance," notes a recent article in The Business Owner, a monthly publication for small-business owners.

OT HAVING formalized employment policies gets employers into trouble. "Small companies haven't usually thought out what their policy is about certain employe actions," says Carl Taylor, a Washington, D. C., labor attorney. "So they act in an ad hoc way." A worker might be fired for stealing, although another thief was only reprimanded. If the discharged employe charges discrimination really was behind his dismissal, it would be difficult to prove otherwise because he was treated differently from the other thief.

Some offenses are so bad that immediate dismissal is justified. A drunk delivery driver imperils himself, other persons and the business. After firing such a person, a memorandum of the incident should go into the employer's personnel files, Mr. Herf says, and a copy should be sent to the employe. It is important to explain fully to an employe why he is being fired, Mr. Herf says.

Usually a series of infractions results in someone being fired. When an employe is chronically late or absent, warnings should precede dismissal. "There should be progressive discipline," Mr. Herf suggests. The worker should be told his actions aren't acceptable, what can be done to correct them and what will happen if he doesn't shape up.

Firing people is a necessary part of business life, but it should be done with the least amount of risk to the company. "Getting rid of unsatisfactory employes," Mr. Taylor says, "is a good idea. But you better be sure you fire them wisely."
