Daylight Savings Time To End This Sunday

Daylight savings time ends in most of the nation next Sunday but it may be that next year it will start sooner in the year.

Congress is thinking of extending the period—adding in March and all of April—not only because it helps conserve energy but also because it may make for safer streets.
The official time change comes at 2 a.m. local time, October 25, when it automatically becomes 1 a.m. Most people find it easy to set their timepiece back one hour before retiring Saturday night.
Many use the phrase "spring forward, fall back" to remember which way to turn their clocks each six months.

Now, for the first time since 1975, Congress is considering extending daylight time again.

"Of all the reasons we have talked about over the years, the apparent benefit is street crime prevention seems to have gotten the proposal a significant amount of attention on Capitol Hill this year." said Robert Ross, an attorney with the Transportation Department, which administers the act.

"If you can get people home off the streets while the sun is shining, not only do you make the trip home safer, but they are less vulnerable to street crime, which thrives in darkness," he said.

The Transportation Department has been pushing the concept of extended daylight time since 1975, with the support of every administration beginning with Gerald Ford's.

Agency studies estimate the traffic death toll could

the months of March and April also were on daylight time, which provides an extra hour of daylight in he evening.

A second study estimated daylight time could save the equivalent of 100,000 barrels of oil aday, and a third indicated all alleviated street crime. Hearings were held in June by committees of both the House Energy and Commerce/ Committee approved a bill now awaiting floor action that would provide eight months of daylight time, from the first Sunday in March through the last Sunday in October. Action is the Senate is not expected before next year. Although there is apparently some resistance in the Senate Commerce Committee, We are sensing, on the basis of our contacts, a lot of support in the Senate for the House bill would let states exempt themselves from the law and would preserve existing exemptions.

It also would let the Federal Communications Commission make adjustments in the broadcast time of AM stations that are normally restricted to daylight broadcasting. Otherwise, those daylight stations would lose significant revenues from being unable to broadcast during morning rush-hour traffic.

MCHS Beats Swifts 28-7 In Tough District Battle

The Motley County Matadors scored four touchdowns in the fourth quarter to come from behind and defeat the Nazareth Swifts 28-7

"Nazareth was ready to play Friday," Coach Gene Griffin said. "I'm just thankful we were ready to

The Matadors' only points of the first half came on a field goal by Glen Calvert early in the second quarter. The score remained 3-0 the rest of the first half.

Nazareth received the kickoff to start the second half and drove 66 yards in 15 plays to score from seven yards out. After the extra point the Swifts led 7-3, and had kept the ball half of the third quarter before MC had a chance to

field their offense.
On the first play of the fourth quarter Darrell Moore rounded right end, received good blocks and broke two tackles to score the Matadors' first TD of the game. The point after try failed, but MC had recaptured the lead 9-7.
The teams exchanged punts and then the Swifts tried another punt. It was a bad snap and the punter was sacked and MC took over the ball on the Nazareth 30. Seven plays later the Matadors faked a field goal and Shawn Bearden passed to Jerry Long, wide open in the end zone, for six points. Again the PAT failed. With 4:35 left in the game MC had extended their lead 15-7.
Nazareth fumbled and MC got the ball back on the Swifts' 42. Four plays later Tim Shannon ran around left end 30 yards for a touchdown. The PAT was good by Calvert and with 1:41 left MC led 22-7.


